We are informed from Wezel, that Comte Maillebois is marched at the Head of between three and four Thousand French and Austrians, to diflodge a Party of Pruffians who have taken Poffession of Count Kaunitz's Caffie at Rittberg. Since last Post, the French Regiments of Dauphin Etranger Cavalry, of two Squadrons, and Colonel General Dragoons, of four Squadrons; have passed through this Place. According to our Advices from Breft, the French Squadron, under M. d'Apcher, was fill there on the 10th Inftant, as were likewife the Eaß India Company's Ships at Port l'Orient.
