AT the Court at *St. James's* the 10th Day of *May*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Whitehall, May 10.

Letters from Hanover received this Morning, of the 29th of April and 1st Instant, mention his Royal Highness the Duke's Intention of setting out the Tuesday following, in order to put himself at the Head of the Army of Observation; about which Day 25 Battalions and 20 Squadrons of his Majesty's Troops were to assemble at Bilefeld, under the Command of General Sporken. The first Division of the Troops of Brunswick Wolfenbuttle arrived at the Camp at Hamelen, on the 29th past; whether they were conducted by the Hereditary Prince in Person; who, the same Evening, went to make his Report to his Royal Highness the Duke at Hanover.

His Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel had sent Colonel Riedesel, one of his

Aide de Camps, to Hanover, in order to concert with his Royal Highness, Measures relating to such of the Hessian Troops as are in Germany, who are in full March to the General Rendezvous.

There are Advices by the Way of Holland; that the Transports, with the Hessian Troops on board, passed by the Texel on the 4th Instant with a fair Wind.

Extract of a Letter from Marshal Schwerin's Army at Konigshoff on the Elbe, April 20, 1757.

The 18th we began our March in five Columns, and entered Bohemia at five different Places in so many Columns. Our Design was so well concealed, that the Austrians had not the least Mistrust of any Thing; and we were not discovered till we were past the Frontiers. They immediately filled the dangerous Defile of Gulden Oelfe, (which our Troops had never passed without the Loss of some Hundreds killed and wounded) with Pandours to dispute the Passage with us; but they were no sooner discovered, than two Battalions of Grenadiers attacked them with their Bayonets fixed, and routed them. This Beginning has discouraged them, and nothing has since interrupted our March. The Day before Yesterday the Right Wing of the Army encamped and cantoned at Trautenau and in the Neighbourhood, as did the two Columns of the Left Wing at Starckstatz and Eypel. Yesterday the Right passed the Elbe at Konigshoff, and To-day the Remainder is coming together again. To-morrow we shall continue our March thro' the Plain of Gitschen, where the Enemy will be obliged to give us Battle, or to abandon their Magazines. Hitherto the Country have fled before us to Jaromiz. If they appear to make a Stand there; we shall fall upon them To-morrow. Our Troops never entered the Field in so good Condition. The Enemy is not so; neither their Recruits, Horses, nor Dispositions are complete. General Leopold Daun, who is to command the Army against us, does not leave Vienna till To-morrow. All this promises good Success.

From the Head Quarters at Cotta in Bohemia, April 21. Prince Maurice of Dessau is this Day at Commotau. Tomorrow we are to march forward. This whole Enterprize was well concerted, and kept secret till the last Moment. The Austrian Army is not yet assembled, and will find great Difficulty in doing it.

Dresden, April 21. A Courier is this Moment arrived from Zittau with the good News; that the Prince of Brunswick Bevern Yesterday attacked the Austrians between Reichenberg and Kratz, and has entirely defeated them. We do not yet know any other Circumstances, than that the Austrians have lost a great Number of Men; that the Regiment of Wirtemberg has taken three Standards from the Enemy, and that the Prince is still pursuing them.

The King entered early yesterday Morning with his whole Army into Bohemia, having left the Baggage behind.

Marshal Schwerin will be to Day at Jung Buntzlau; he has successfully passed the Defiles near Gulden Oelfe and has entirely defeated and dispersed the Croats and other Troops that guarded that Pass. At Trautenau, they were very near taking two Austrian Generals, and the two Princes Xavier and Charles of Saxony.

From the King's Head Quarters at Linay in Bohemia, April 24.

His Highness the Duke of Bevern having marched the 20th at the Head of a Body of the Army which was in Lusatia from the Quarters of Cantonment near Zittau, possessed themselves immediately, without the Loss of a single Man, of the first Post of Bohemia at Krottaw and Grafenstein, drove away the Enemy the same Day from Kratzen, and marched towards Machendorf, near Reichenberg. The same Morning Putkammer's Hussars, commanded by their Colonel and by Major Schænfeld, routed some Hundreds of the Enemy's Cuirassiers, commanded by Prince Lichtenstein, who were posted before Kohlig, and took Prisoners, 1 Captain, 2 Subalterns, and above 60 Horse; The rest were entirely dispersed, and scarcely able to rally near Kratzen. The Night coming on, obliged the Troops to remain in the open Air till the next Morning. The 21st at Break of Day, our Troops marched in two Columns by Habendorf towards the Enemy's Army, posted near Reichenberg, and commanded by General Count Königseg, and 28,000 strong; as soon as the Lines were formed, they advanced towards the Enemy's Cavalry, which was ranged in three Lines of about 30 Squadrons. The two Wings were sustained by the Infantry, which was posted among felled Trees and Intrenchments. They immediately cannonaded the Enemy's Cavalry, who received it bravely, having on their Right a Village, and on their Left a Wood, where they had entrenched themselves with felled Trees and Pits. But the Duke of Bevern having caused 15 Squadrons of Dragoons of the second Line to advance, and ordered the Wood on our Right to be attacked at the same Time by the Battalions of Grenadiers of Kahlden and of Moellendorff, and by the Regiment of the Prince of Prussia, who cleared all the felled Trees and the Intrenchments there, our Dragoons, who had by this Means their Flanks covered, entirely routed the Enemy's Cavalry. The Generals Normann, Katt, and the Prince of Wurtemberg, signalized themselves extremely on this Occasion.

Colonel Putkammer, and Major Schænfeld, with their Hussars, have likewise particularly distinguished themselves, by giving the Horse Grenadiers a very warm Reception; notwithstanding the Enemy's Artillery took them in Flank. Lieut. General Lestewitz, at the same Time, attacked with our Left Wing the Redoubts which covered Reichenberg. Though there were many Defiles and rising Ground to pass, which were all occupied by the Enemy, yet the Regiment of Darmstadt forced the Redoubt, and put to flight and pursued the Enemy, after some Discharges of their Artillery and small Arms, from one Eminence to another, for the Distance of a Mile, as far as Rochlitz and Dorffel. The Loss of the Enemy amounts, as far as we can learn at present, to 1000 killed and wound-

ed. We have made about 20 Officers and 400 Soldiers Prisoners, and have taken three Standards. Cannon and Ammunition Waggons are said to have been found among the felled Trees and Entrenchments, but the Departure of the Courier prevents our giving an exact List of them at this present Moment. General Porporati is supposed to have been killed, because some Letters directed to him have been found upon the Field of Battle. The Action began at half an Hour after Six o'Clock, and continued till Eleven. On our Side there were seven Subalterns, and about 100 Men killed; General Norman, Major de Mellin of the Regiment of Amstel, Col. Lettow of D'Armstadt, Majors de Platen, de Normann and de Beyern of Wurtemberg, the Captains de Pabstein, de Normann, and de Putkammer of Amstel, seven Subalterns, and 150 Men were wounded. The Officers and private Men equally deserve the highest Commendations. His Highness the Duke of Bevern in particular, who had before distinguished himself in so signal a Manner in former Campaigns, and last Year at the Battle of Lowositz, in this Action gave fresh Proofs of that Skill and Courage, which will transmit his Name to Posterity.

Dresden, May 1. By Letters from the King's Army we learn, That Feldt Marshal Schwerin has not only entered Bohemia, but has joined the Duke of Bevern, and has made himself Master of the greatest Part of the Circle of Buntzlau. In Jung-Buntzlau he has taken a considerable Magazine of the Austrians, whom he dislodged. Advices received since from Bohemia say, that the Prince of Anhalt Dessau has drawn near to the King of Prussia's Army with his Corps, and that his Majesty has advanced with his whole Army as far as Budin, from whence the Austrians, who had an advantageous Camp there, had retired to Welwarn, half-way between Budin and Prague. The King of Prussia having passed the Egra, the Armies of his Majesty and Feldt Marshal Schwerin are so situated, that they can act jointly, and there is great Reason to believe, there will shortly be an Action, or else that the Austrians will retire under Prague.

Dresden, May 1. Old Marshal Schwerin has seized a considerable Magazine of the Enemy at Jung Buntzlau, consisting of upwards of 40,000 Bushels of Oats, and above 2000 Barrels of Meal.

Torgau, April 23. The Ice is broken at last, and the King has entered Bohemia with three considerable Armies. The grand Army, which the King himself commands, was preceded the 21st by 7 Battalions of Grenadiers, who were to drive the Austrians from Peterswald, where there must have been warm Work. Two or three different Engagements will happen in a few Days.

Vienna, April 23. Accounts came the Day before Yesterday, of Marshal Schwerin's having entered Bohemia with a considerable Body of Troops, and of his having taken Possession of the Town of Trautenau, from whence the Austrian Garrison had but just Time to retire; it is said there was a small Magazine of Oats there which has fallen into the Hands of the Prussians; who are likewise in Motion on the Side of Egra, if they have not already attempted to enter into Bohemia somewhere in that Neighbourhood. This may be looked upon as the Beginning of the Campaign, and the Armies are said to be assembling as fast as possible on all Hands. Prince Charles will, we hear, set out from hence towards the Beginning of next Week, and the few

General Officers remaining here, and the Volunteers, are getting every Thing in Readiness to be able to leave Vienna about the same Time.

Vienna, April 25. Last Night an Officer arrived here from the Frontiers of Bohemia, with the News, that the Prince of Bevern having advanced with a Body of 25000 Men, had attacked and forced Reichenberg, where General Count Konigsegg was posted with 10000 Austrians. The Action was very obstinate, and lasted near six Hours; so that it is thought the Prussians must have lost a great Number of Men. The Loss on the Side of the Austrians is computed at 2000, killed and wounded. General Count Porporati, and Count Hohensfeldt, of the Regiment of Lichtenstein, are killed. Prince Charles Lichtenstein is said to be dangerously wounded. General Konigsegg retired in good Order with the Remains of his Troops to a Post in the Neighbourhood. It is thought the Prussians will endeavour (if they have not already attempted it) to make themselves Masters of the Passes of the Mountains about Peterswald and Auffig. In the mean Time, that Part of their Army which had appeared near Egra, retired soon after. General Count Serbelloni is entered into the strong Camp near Konigsgratz with a Body of near 30000 Men. General Schwerin is still with his Army at Braunau, Trautenau, and that Neighbourhood. The Prince of Deux-Ponts set out last Night for the Army, as does General Luchesi this Evening, and General Pretlack To-morrow. It is said, that Prince Charles's Departure is fixed for Friday next, and that he will be followed the next Day by Marshal Daun.

Florence, April 23. On the 19th Instant, his Britannick Majesty's Ships the *Jersey* and *Syren*, sailed from Leghorn for England, having under their Convoy several English Merchant Ships. We are informed from Corfica, that General Paoli had, by a Stratagem, drawn M. Matra, who was at the Head of the Genoese Party in the inland Parts of that Island, into an Ambuscade, in which he was killed and his whole Party dispersed.

Cologne, May 2. Marchal d'Estrées, who arrived at Wesel, the 27th past, at Four in the Afternoon, is still there. Yesterday 250 Waggon, of four Horses each, loaded with Powder, Ball, Bombs, Pick Axes, &c. arrived at Liege; and that State is to furnish 700 Horses to carry them to their Destination. The Departure of the Duke of Orleans is put off for some Days.

Cologne, May 5. The Marshal de d'Armentieres, Lieutenant General, is to command the Siege of Gueldre. He will have eight Major Generals and 17 Battalions under him. The Swiss, who have refused to cross the Rhine, are to be Part of the Battalions employed in the Siege. This Day the Palatin Troops are to encamp near Derendorff below Duffeldorff. The French have built a Bridge on the Rhine below Duffeldorff, to facilitate the Passage of their Troops.

Brussels, May 3. The Letters from Prague of the 23d of April, which arrived last Sunday, brought an Account that the King of Prussia's Army had forced their Passage into Bohemia, at four different Places, and that, in Particular, in the Attack which was made on the Side of Silesia, by the Troops under the Command of Field Marshal Schwerin, the Austrians had been obliged to quit all their Posts, with the loss of General Porporati, and Count Hohensfelds, who were killed in the Action; upon which Occasion, the Prince de Lichtenstein, and Count Mansfeld, had

been dangerously wounded. On Saturday the Regiment de la Reine Cavalry, of two Squadrons, arrived here, and continued their March the next Morning. This is the last Corps of the second Division of the French Army that was to pass through this Place. This Day the Siege of Gueldre is to be opened.

Brussels, May 6. Hitherto we have but very confused Accounts of the Military Transactions in Bohemia, since the Entrance of the Prussian Troops into that Country. All the Advices however agree, that at the Attack on the Side of Reichenberg, the three Regiments of Cavalry of Charles Palfi, Lowenstein and Lichtenstein, had suffered very considerably, as had also eight Battalions of Foot. It is not yet known for certain how far the Prussians, under the Command of Marshal Schwerin and the Prince of Bevern, were advanced; though there are some Letters which say they were got as far as Jung-Buntzlau the 23d of April, and that the Austrian Army, under the Command of Marshal Daun, was then assembling at Konigsgratz. As to the Operations on the Side where the King of Prussia commands in Person, we are well informed, that, on the 25th, the Regiments of Arberg and Los Rios retreated from Auffig into the Camp at Budin, to which the Troops that were at Lowozitz retired likewise, and marched the next Day to the Camp of Martinowitz. We have no Accounts here yet of the Siege of Gueldre, from whence it is inferred, that the French have found more Difficulties in raising their Batteries than they expected. The Letters from Breff inform us, that, on the 22d of April, M. d'Apcher sailed from thence for L'Orient, where the East India Company's outward bound Ships were waiting the Arrival of his Squadron, in order to proceed on their Voyage.

Hague, May 3. Marshal Apraxin's Army is distressed by Scarcity of Forage and Provisions. Some of his Cossacks, who had stopt and plundered several Prussian Peasant Waggon upon the Frontiers of Courland, were severely punished, the Waggon sent back, and the Peasants had Money given them.
