AT the Court at *St. James's* the 10th Day of *May*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Madrid, April 25. On Wednesday the 20th Instant their Catholick Majesties set out from

their Palace de Buen Retiro for *Aranjuez*, where they arrived the same Day in perfect Health; and where they are to be attended, by the whole Court, during the usual Time of the present Season, most of the foreign Ministers having already repaired thither.

Brussels, May 10. The last Advices arrived here from *Bohemia* are of the 30th of April, at which Time *Marshal Brown* was assembling his Army at *Mikowitz*, about two German Miles from *Prague*, and half-way between that Place and *Welvarn*. The main Army of the *Prussians*, commanded by the King, was then at *Schlan*, and posted in such a Manner, as to make it very difficult (as it is apprehended here) for the Corps under the Duke of *Aremberg*, which was marching from *Pilsen*, to join *Marshal Brown*. According to the same Advices, Count *Konigsfegg*, with the Troops from *Reichenberg*, was arrived at *Brandeis*, about three German Miles from *Prague*, and General *Serbelloni* had quitted his Camp at *Konigsgratz*, and was then arrived at *Nimbourg*. It seems as if the French had laid aside, for the present, their Design of besieging *Guedre*. The Prince de *Condé* is expected here on the 14th Instant, in his Way to the Army, and will be followed on the 16th by the Duke of *Orleans*. Yesterday Morning Prince *Ferdinand de Ligne*, a Field Marshal, and Colonel Proprietor of a Regiment of Dragoons in the *Empress Queen's* Service, was found dead in his Bed.

Whereas the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attleborough, Windham, Thetford, Lynn, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sawbridgeworth, Downham, Epping, Ongar and Ely.

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swift Tail.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
