P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Constantinople, April 15.* The Changes in the Ministry, which for some Time past have been more frequent than common, doth not yet seem at an End. A few Days ago the Reis Efendi was deposed, and ordered to remain at his House, where he still continues; and one Bechir Efendi has succeeded him in that Office, a Man of great Experience and Abilities. Since that Time several subordinate Officers, in his Department, have been removed, and others reinstated. The Captain Pascha being to depart in a few Days, with five or six Men of War, and some Gallies, for the Archipelago,

the Foreign Ministers are successively visiting him, as usual, before his Departure.

*Warsaw, April 27.* Some Detachments of the Russian Cavalry are advanced as far as Kownow in Lithuania; but as they are often obliged to shift their Quarters for Want of Forage, it is thought they cannot continue their March till the Spring is far enough advanced for them to get Grass for their Horses.

*Warsaw, May 4.* The last Letters from Lithuania say, that the Russian Cavalry, which has been for some Time past at Orza and Dulranow, and in that Neighbourhood, is now certainly marching towards Minsk and Wilna; but as they have a long March before they can join the great Army, which has not yet begun to move, it is impossible that the Russians should begin their Operations before the Month of June.

*Vienna, May 9.* This Day we received an Account of a Victory obtained by his Prussian Majesty over her Imperial Majesty's Forces on the 6th Instant, after a very obstinate and bloody Engagement.

*Vienna, May 11.* The Account of our Defeat, on the 6th Instant, is confirmed; but no Particulars are yet arrived. The Weight of the Battle fell upon our Right Wing, who, after a very vigorous Resistance, were at last driven off the Field of Battle; and the Remains of them, which are said to amount to 10 or 12000 Men, are now assembling at Beneschau, under M. Pretlack, General of Horse. The Left Wing, where Prince Charles was in Person, are now with his Royal Highness in Prague. Marshal Daun with his Army is at Boemischbrod; but the Prussians are so spread over the Country, that there is no direct Communication between Prague and Boemischbrod; to which last Place an Officer was dispatched from hence last Night.

*Camp before Prague, May 11.* The City of Prague is now compleatly invested by the Prussian Troops on both Sides of the River, the King commanding on one Side, and Marshal Keith on the other. Prince Charles of Lorraine, Marshal Brown, the two Princes of Saxony, Prince Louis of Wirtemberg, the Prince of Modena, the Duke of Aremberg, &c. &c. are said to be in Prague. Advices being received, that Count Leopold Daun is advancing with a Corps of 15,000 Men from Konigsgratz; the King of Prussia has detached the Prince of Bevern with 12 or 15 Battalions and 50 Squadrons to offer him Battle. It is said that the Austrian Army is assembling at Beneschau, about two Miles beyond the Zafawa.

*Hague, May 10.* 'Tis not yet certain whether Guelder is to be besieged in earnest, or only blockaded

blockaded. The Post which came in Yesterday from Westphalia, brought us very little News. Upon His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's advancing a Body of Troops over the Wefer, the French have reinforced the Corps which had crossed the Rhine. There is no Appearance yet of Marshal d'Estrées being able to move forward with his whole Force.

*Hague, May 13.* The French began to encamp at Wesel on the 8th Instant, but the Want of Subsistence, and particularly of Forage, embarrasses their Operations so much, that they do not seem to know when they shall be able to move forward with their Army.

*Hague, May 17.* Since His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Arrival at Bielefeldt, the French begin to be uneasy about their advanced Posts, and they have determined to support them if possible; and accordingly they have encamped about 30000 Men at Wesel, and begun to move forward towards Munster, where they talk of establishing the Head Quarters.

*Hague, May 20.* The French continue to give out that they will march forward immediately, but a great Part of their Cavalry is still dispersed along the Rhine, for the Convenience of Subsistence, for Forage is very scarce, and the States General have just renewed their Placart, prohibiting the Exportation of Bread, Corn, and Oats, for six Weeks longer. The French, who were in the Dutchy of Cleves, are all marched towards Wesel; they are not nearer Embden than they were, having only a Post at Meppen, in the Lower Bishoprick of Munster. The King of Prussia has sent Orders to defend Embden, where they Work very hard, to put themselves in as good a Posture of Defence as possible. The Hessians who arrived from England, were to be, as this Day, encamped between the Aller and the Wefer, and consequently at Hand to join his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.

*Vienna, May 16.* By Letters from Prague there is an Account, that the Number of Troops in that City is between 30 and 40000 Men, and that the King of Prussia keeps the Place closely blockaded, having thrown up Intrenchments upon all the Avenues leading to the Town, and having Parties patrolling about on all Sides: It is likewise said that his Prussian Majesty has detached a Body of above 30000 Men, who have directed their March towards Boemisch-brod, from which Place Count Daun decamped some Days ago, and was, by the last Account, encamped near Kuttenberg, having been joined by the Troops from Beneschau, to the Number of 15000 Men. They are very busy here in providing Tents, Saddles, &c. to supply those lost in the late Action; and Orders are said to have been sent to Hungary and Italy, to the Troops quartered there, to march forthwith towards this Country. The Duke of Wirtemberg proposes to set out in a few Days for Count Daun's Army. M. de Broglie, the French Ambassador to the King of Poland, arrived here on Friday last from Paris, in his Way to Warsaw.

*Cologne, May 23.* The 19th the Duke of Orleans arrived at Liege about Midnight; as he set out early the 20th, he must have reached Wesel the 21st. The 20th the two Battalions of Salaru arrived, and were quartered here; so we have eight Battalions in Garrison. The same

Day Royal Roussillon Cavalry marched through here: To-Morrow the King's Dragoons pass. The 24th the Grenadiers Roiaux, called Salare, are to arrive and stay here. The 28th we expect Rochefoucault; the 1st of June Nassau, both Cavalry: They bring up the Rear of the Troops that pass this Way. The Camp of Wesel is of 26 Battalions and 30 Squadrons. As yet the Order for the March of the Palatine Troops is not come from Manheim.

*Whitehall, May 28.*

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Salisbury, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor John Gilbert, late Bishop thereof, to the Archiepiscopal See of York; and also His Majesty's Letter, recommending to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor John Thomas, now Bishop of Peterborough, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Salisbury.

At a Meeting this Day of the Justices appointed by the Lords of His Majesty's Privy Council, by the Order of the 25th of November, 1745, to put in Execution His Majesty's several Orders of Council within the County of Middlesex, in Relation to the infected Cattle.

**W**HEREAS the Time draws near for holding the Fair in this County called Welch Fair, for the selling Horned Cattle, which said Fair used to be held at Islington, but lately has been held at Barnet, and whereas we have Cause to believe the said Infection, which during the Summer Time in this County has greatly decreased, has for some Years, by Reason of this Fair, broke out again and raged very much during the Months of September, October, and November.—Therefore, in order to prevent such spreading of the said Distemper, and in pursuance of the said Powers and Authorities given, as well by His Majesty's Orders in Council as by the several Acts of Parliament in that behalf made, We do Order and Direct that no Fair or Market, or other publick Place of Sale, be held or kept within this County, for the Sale of Horned Cattle, (except fat Cattle for immediate Slaughter) from the 15th Day of August next, to the 10th Day of October following; and that no Person or Persons shall or do presume to drive, send, or remove, or caused to be driven, sent, or removed, any Horned Cattle (except fat Cattle for immediate slaughter) to any Fair, Market, or other publick Place of Sale in this County, within the Time beforementioned, under the Pains, Penalties and Forfeitures, mentioned, sett, or imposed by His Majesty's said Orders in Council, or the said Acts of Parliament, or any of them, in that Case made.—And for the notifying this Order it is further directed, that the same be forthwith inserted in the London Gazette, the Daily Advertiser, and the London Evening Post.
