**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Vienna, May 14.* Yesterday a Courier arrived here from Count Daun's Army, and brought a Letter, written from Prague by Prince Charles, which had been carried to Count Daun

by a Huntsman of Count Lacy's, who had found Means to get through the Prussian Post while M. Lacy made a Sally; which Letter gives an Account, that his Royal Highness, and most of the General Officers with him, were in good Health. Count Daun has removed his Camp from Boemischbrod to Planian, and from thence is to march to Kollin, to cover the great Magazine, and to wait for the different Reinforcements of Troops that are marching to join him; and it is believed, that the Troops, which had assembled themselves at Beneschau after the Battle, to the Number of 3000 Foot and 5000 Horse, will be, by this Time, arrived at his Camp.

*Hague, May 24.* By the last Advices from Bohemia we hear, that on the 10th Instant the heavy Artillery were come up, and that they were working at their Batteries. In the mean while, they have taken Possession of the Czifca Berg, which commands the Town, and where the Austrians had a strong Redoubt, from whence they were drove. They have since made a Sally from the Town, in order to retake that Post, and were drove back again. As Count Daun with his Corps had stopt at Boemischbrod after the Battle, the King of Prussia detached the Prince of Bevern with 20 Battalions and 30 Squadrons, to attack him, which the Austrian General chose to avoid, and retired immediately to Kollin. What has happened since we do not know. Our Advices from the Frontiers agree, that the Want of Subsistence and Forage stops the Progress which the French Army might otherwise have attempted to make. Marshal d'Estrées is out of Order at Wesel.

*Hague, May 27.* The last Letters from the Prussian Camp are of the 16th, at which Time the Prince of Bevern was encamped at Kollin. Letters just received from Westphalia, of the 23d, mention General Zastrow's being in Possession of Paderborn and the adjacent Places. The Letters from Dresden say, that the Prussian Batteries would be ready to fire upon Prague as on the 20th Instant.

*Cologne, May 26.* Marshal D'Estrées went the 21st from Wesel, to observe his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Motions. The Duke of Orleans had the Command of the Army at Wesel, consisting of 16 Battalions and 10 Squadrons.

Squadrons. Orders have been since sent for that Corps to advance towards Munster, it being the Marshal's Intention to establish his Head Quarters there. The Duke d'Havre quits this Town next Sunday, with the Regiments of Vaubecourt and Rocheaymond; and the 800 Hussars, at Duitz, march to Hallinguen, where they are to arrive on Tuesday next. Vast Numbers of Carts are ordered to carry the Magazines from Wesel towards Munster; but very little Provision, and no Forage, arrive from France, which proves they are determined to live at the Expence of the Countries about them. This occasions a general Murmur throughout the Electorate, and two Dutchies. It is said the French Cavalry cannot be subsisted in Westphalia till the End of June; notwithstanding which it is assured, they begin to move forward from Ruremond and Neufs; the last Regiment of which is to arrive here the 1st of June.

*Brussels, May 27.* Letters from Vienna say, that Prague was so closely invested, that, in order to favour the Passage of a Messenger from his Royal Highness Prince Charles of Lorraine to the Empress, they had been obliged to make a Sally under the Command of Major General Lacy, in which great Numbers had been killed on both Sides. They add, that it was expected, that, before the End of this Month, Count Daun's Army would be strong enough to go to the Relief of Prague.

#### General Post-Office, March 21, 1757.

**W**hereas the Post-Boy bringing the Norwich Mail from Epping, to this Office, was, this Morning about Four o'Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road, by the Obelisk, or High Stone, near Laytonstone, in the County of Essex, by a single Highwayman on Horseback, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy, at the same Time ordering him to deliver him the Mail, otherwise he would blow his Brains out, which obliged the Post-Boy to unstrap the Mail, and deliver it to the Highwayman, who took the whole Norwich Mail before him upon his Horse, and rode away with it full Speed towards Epping.

*N. B. The Norwich Mail contains the following Bags, viz. Norwich, Swaffham, Attleborough, Windham, Thetford, Lynn, Stoke, Bury St. Edmunds, New Market, Saffron-Walden, Cambridge, Bishop Stortford, Sarubridge-worth, Downham. Epping, Ongar and Ely.*

The Man who committed this Robbery is described to be a middle sized Man, and had on a white or very light coloured Riding Coat, with a plain Hat—He rode a brown or dark coloured little Horse, with a swish Tail.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of *Two Hundred Pounds*, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
