AT the Court at *St. James's* the 10th Day of *May*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Lisbon, May 3. Abraham Castres, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court, died here Yesterday, and will be interred To-morrow, in the burying Ground belonging to his Britannick Majesty's Subjects, according to his own Desire. His Pall is to be supported by Eight of the Principal Persons of the Factory. The Body will be attended by his Household Servants; and the Secretary of State has offered a Guard of Horse to accompany it.

Madrid, May 10. The King has received Advice, by an extraordinary Dispatch from the President of the Board of the Indian Trade at Cadiz, that, on the 30th of last Month, his

Majesty's Frigate the *Nuestra Senora de la Concepcion*, and a Merchant Ship called the *Victorioso*, anchored in that Bay, the former on her Return from *Carthagen*, and the latter from *Vera Cruz*. The Cargo of the first, belonging to his Majesty and the Merchants, consists of 629195 hard Dollars in Silver, and in coined and wrought Gold; 964 C. of Sugar, 1216 C. of Shells, 52 C. $\frac{1}{2}$ of Woad, 553 Fur Skins, 762 Quintals of Cocoa Nuts, with other Fruits and Effects. The Cargo of the *Victorioso* consists of 39156 Dollars, 2011 C. $\frac{3}{4}$ of Cochineal, 1643 C. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Woad, 321 C. of Jallop Root, 3392 C. of Sugar, 393 C. of Tobacco in Rolls, 107 C. $\frac{3}{4}$ of Cocoa Nuts, 1944 tanned Hides, 1064 Quintals of Copper, 500 Quintals of *Campechy Wood*, and other Effects.

Camp before Pragus, May 18. Since the 11th Instant, a great Number of Deferters have come in. The Prisoners are sent to *Budin*, and, by all Accounts, the Victory has been more compleat than was at first apprehended. The King of *Prussia* has sent Detachments beyond the *Beraun*. They met with no Resistance, every Thing in that Part of the Country having been abandoned by the *Austrians*. The Troops that fled that Way were dispersed, and many of them have straggled into the *Upper Palatinate*, and neighbouring Countries. Those beyond the *Safawa* are said to be assembling at *Beneschau*, but their Number is not yet considerable. The only Army we hear of, is that of *Count Daun*, which advanced from *Koniggratz* towards *Boemischbrod*; but, upon the Approach of the Detachment commanded by the *Prince of Bevern*, retired, and now occupies a strong Post between *Suchdol* and *Kuttenberg*. *Count Daun's* Army is said to be augmented to 25 or 30,000; and the King of *Prussia* has reinforced the *Prince of Bevern's* Detachment, which is at *Krzib*, within one Mile and half of the Enemy. *Lieutenant Colonel Meyer*, Commander of an independent Battalion, was detached the Day after the Battle, with one Battalion of *Prussian Pandours*, and 400 *Hussars*, to destroy the Magazine at *Pilsen*, in which he has succeeded: That Magazine is said to be very considerable and valuable. He has likewise burnt several lesser Magazines, and is since gone into the *Upper Palatinate*. *Col. Meyer's* Conduct is greatly applauded, as what he has done will effectually cut off the Succours the *Austrians* might have expected from the Empire; which, if they should march, cannot now find Subsistence. In *Prague* every Thing is very quiet, hardly a Cannon Shot fired; they are busy in Repairing the Ramparts and Parapets. The *Prussians* are active and vigilant: They have raised Redoubts and *Flèches* in the proper Places.

Cologne, May 30. The Regiment of Vaubecourt marched Yefterday with the Duke d'Harvé. This Day Roche Aimont followed, and to Morrow the Royal Grenadiers of Solare. They go to Hattinguen, there to be joined by four Regiments of Horfe, and the Huffars, as alfo by the 6000 Palatines, if the Court of Manheim will permit them to ftir, which feems not yet determined; and, it is faid, they are to march under the Command of M. de Chevert to Caffel, to make a Diverfion on that Side. The Head Quarters of the French have been ever fince the 25th at Munfter, and, by the Movements of the feveral Camps, it appears as if Marfhal d'Efrées was determined to advance towards the Wefer, having ordered feveral Roads to be made for the March of the Army. This Day arrived here 50 battering Cannon, with 15000 Bombs and Balls, efcoorted by two Battalions of Royal Artillery. The Cannon are to proceed directly; but the Bombs, and the the greateft Part of the Balls, are to wait the Arrival of another Divifion of Artillery, confifting alfo of Bombs, Bullets, Mortars, &c. and then to proceed together. One Battallion of Cone, and Royal Allemand, Horfe, have paffed here this Day.

Extract of a Letter from Capt. Hood, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Antelope. Dated Spithead, June 1, 1757.

On the 13th of May A. M. in Lat. 47 D. 50 M. I faw three Sail to Windward, and gave Chace to them. At Noon they brought to, hoifted French Colours, and made Signals to one another; and, upon my hoifting French Colours alfo, they made Sail, and edged down to me. About One o'Clock the largeft Ship hoifted a Pendant, and fired a Gun to Leeward, and about Half an Hour after another; which not being answered by me, the foon after fired two Shot, hawl'd her Mainfail up, took in her Top-gallant Sails, and bore directly down, being then not two Miles off. Upon which I hoifted my proper Colours, and fhortened Sail to the Forefail and Topfail, expecting to be attacked; but, in a few Minutes after, ſhe hawled up, and made all the Sail ſhe could. The other two, one a Frigate-like Ship, the other a Snow, continued before the Wind. I purfued the War-like Ship as faft as poffible, and before Four was within point-blank Shot of her. About 20 Minutes after we brought our Broadfide to bear, and was very clofe, and kept a continual Fire upon her till 40 Minutes after Five, when we had the Breakers fo near under our Lee, that we could not wear, and had but barely Room to ftay clear of the Enemy; but ſhe came about, and while in Stays, the French Ship ſtruck upon the Rocks, and loſt her Mizzen Maſt. I ſtood off for near an Hour, to put the Ship in a workable State; then ſtood in again, with an Intention to run as clofe to the Enemy as poffible, in order to deſtroy her; but found that Buſineſs to Appearance done; as ſhe had beat over a Ridge of Rocks, which

were too far without her for me to do her further Injury. Where the French Ship ſtruck, is the North Part of Hodiern Bay. I had three Men killed and 13 wounded, and much ſhattered in my Rigging and Sails, the mizen Maſt ſhot through.

On the 24th I took a ſmall Snow from Bourdeaux for Canada, with Wine, Brandy and Flour; and the next Day a ſmall Privateer of 6 Guns, 10 Swivels, and 50 Men, that came out of Port Louis the Evening before, and was the Snow in Company with the Man of War the Day I drove her on Shore, whoſe Captain and Officers give the following Account of her: That ſhe was called the Aquilon, mounting 48 Guns, but pierced for 56, and had on board 450 Men, 30 of whom were killed and 25 wounded; in the latter was the Captain: That the Rocks were through her Bottom in ſeveral Places, and that ſhe was irrecoverably loſt.
