SENT, R E The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of April last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for fome Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of June next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of June next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Camp before Prague, May 18. Since the 11th Instant, a great Number of Deserters have come in. The Prisoners are sent to Budin, and, by all Accounts, the Victory has been more compleat than was at first apprehended. The King of Pruffia has fent Detachments beyond the Beraun. They met with no Refiffance, every Thing in that Part of the Country having been abandoned by the Auftrians. The Troops that fled that Way were dispersed, and many of them have straggled into the Upper Palatinate, and neighbouring Coun-Those beyond the Sasawa are said to be assembling at Beneschau, but their Number is not yet confiderable. The only Army we hear of, is that of Count Daun, which advanced from Konigingratz towards Boemischbrod; but. upon the Approach of the Detachment commanded by the Prince of Bevern, retired, and now occupies a strong Post between Suchdol and Kuttenberg. Count Daun's Army is faid to be augmented to 25 or 30,000; and the King of Prussia has reinforced the Prince of Bevern's Detachment, which is at Krzib, within one Mile and half of the Enemy. Lieutenant Colonel Meyer, Commander of an independent Battalion, was detached the Day after the Battle, with one Battalion of Prussian Pandours, and 400 Hussars, to destroy the Magazine at Pilsen, in which he has succeeded: Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at That Magazine is said to be very considerable and valuable. He has likewise burnt several leffer Magazines, and is fince gone into the Upper Palatinate. Col. Meyer's Conduct is greatly applauded, as what he has done will effectually cut off the Succours the Austrians might have expected from the Empire; which, if they should march, cannot now find Subfistance. In Prague every Thing is very quier, hardly a Cannon Shot fired; they are bufy in Repairing the Ramparts and Parapets. Prussians are active and vigilant: They have raised Redoubts and Flêches in the proper Places: to harrass the Besieged, if they should attempt These little Forts are joined by to come out. Lines cast up in such Places where the Ground admits of them, and in a very few Days the

Bombardment will begin.

Cologne, May 30. The Regiment of Vauhe-court marched Yesterday with the Duke d'Havré. This Day Roche Aimont followed, and to Morrow the Royal Grenadiers of Solare. They go to Hattinguen, there to be joined by four Regiments of Horse, and the Hussars, as also by the 6000 Palatines, if the Court of Manheim will permit them to stir, which seems not yet determined; and, it is said, they are to march under the Command of M. de Chevert to Cassel, to make a Diversion on that Side. The Head Quarters of the French have been ever fince the 25th at Munster, and, by the Movements of the several Camps, it appears as if Marshal d'Estrées was determined to advance towards the Weser, having ordered several Roads to be made for the March of the Army. This Day arrived here 50 battering Cannon, with 15000 Bombs and Balls, escorted by two Batallions of Royal Artillery. The Cannon are to proceed directly; but the Bombs, and the the greatest Part of the Balls, are to wait the Arrival of another Division of Artillery, consisting also of Bombs, Bullets, Mortars, &c. and then to proceed together. One Batallion of Cone, and Royal Allemand, Horse, have passed here this Day.

Extract of a Letter from Capt. Hood, Commander of His Majesty's Ship Antelope. Dated Spithead, June 1, 1757.

On the 13th of May A. M. in Lat. 47 D. 50 M. I saw three Sail to Windward, and gave Chace to them. At Noon they brought to, hoisted French Colours, and made Signals to one another; and, upon my hoisting French Colours also, they made Sail, and edged down to me. About One o'Clock the largest Ship hoisted a Pendant, and fired a Gun to Leeward, and about Haif an Hour after another; which not being answered by me, she soon after fired two Shot, hawl'd her Mainfail up, took in her Top-gallant Sails, and bore directly down, being then not two Miles off. Upon which I hoisted my proper Colours, and shortened Sail to the Foresail and Topsail, expecting to be attacked. tacked; but, in a few Minutes after, she hawled up, and made all the Sail she could. The other two, one a Frigate-like Ship, the other a Snow, continued before the Wind. I pursued the War-like Ship as fast as possible, and before Four was within point-blank Shot of About 20 Minutes after we brought our Broadfide to bear, and was very close, and kept a continual Fire upon her till 40 Minutes after Five, when we had the Breakers fo near under our Lee, that we could not wear, and had but barely Room to stay clear of the Enemy; but she came about, and while in Stays; the French Ship struck upon the Rocks, and lost her Mizen Mast. I stood off for near an Hour, to put the Ship in a workable State; then stood in again, with an Intention to run as close to the Enemy as possible, in order to destroy her; but found that Business to Appearance done; as the had beat over a Ridge of Rocks, which

were too far without her for me to do her further Injury. Where the French Ship struck, is the North Part of Hodierne Bay. I had three Men killed and 13 wounded, and much shattered in my Rigging and Sails, the mizen

Mast shot through.

On the 24th I took a small Snow from Bourdeaux for Canada, with Wine, Brandy and Flour; and the next Day a small Privateer of 6 Guns, 10 Swivels, and 50 Men, that came out of Port Louis the Evening before, and was the Snow in Company with the Man of War the Day I drove her on Shore, whose Captain and Officers give the following Account of her: That the was called the Aquilon, mounting 48 Guns, but pierced for 56, and had on board 450 Men, 30 of whom were killed and 25 wounded; in the latter was the Captain: That the Rocks were through her Bottom in feveral Places, and that she was irrecoverably lost.
