P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Tenth of May last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of July next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of July next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Constantinople, May 2. By Letters from *Bassora*, dated the 30th of Dec. and 8th of Jan. we have Advice from *Perfia*, that *Ispahan* has again changed its Master, *Azad Khan* is once more in Possession of that City, *Hussein Khan* is withdrawn to *Missendroon*, and *Carem Khan* is Master of *Schiras*. Every City or Town of that Kingdom has an oppressive Master, and every petty Governor acts like an absolute Monarch.

Madrid, May 23. Their Catholick Majesties continue at their Royal Seat of *Aranjuez* in perfect Health. Letters from *Cadiz* have brought Advice of the Arrival in that Bay on the 7th Instant, of one of the *Caracas Company's* Ships named the *San Sebastian*, which sailed from *la Guayra* on the 6th of January; her Cargoe consisting in 6,334 Dollars, 6,095 Fanegas of *Cacao*, 800 Hides, and other Effects.

Turin, May 25. On Saturday last the 21st, his *Sardinian Majesty* and the rest of the Royal Family removed from hence to the *Venerie*.

Dresden, May 29. The *Prussian Generals* here, *Baron Wylich* and *M. Bornslett*, have received an Account from the Camp before *Prague*, that they began to batter the City on the 24th, but that they had thrown no Bombs into it on the 25th. The *Austrians* have Provision enough, but begin to want Forage, so that their Horses must soon feed upon *Mexil*. On the 24th they attempted to sally out with a Body of Troops, consisting of upwards of 10,000 Men, but were happily repulsed and driven back; on which Occasion *Prince Ferdinand*, the King of *Prussia's* youngest Brother, had a Horse killed under him, and was himself slightly wounded. The *Duke of Bevern*, with the Army of Observation, has pitched his Camp near *Kolin*; and, if he offers to advance, the *Austrians*, under *General Daun*, withdraw. As it was impossible to carry the large Magazine the *Prussians* took at *Pilsen* to their own Camp, which was then at the Distance of 12 German Miles, they entirely burnt and destroyed it. The second Transport of *Austrian Prisoners*, brought hither

hither on the 21st Instant, consisted of 1068 Men, of which about 400 engaged in the Prussian Service. Some Days after, several Austrian Prisoners, not dangerously wounded, were also brought here upon the Elbe at Night; so that the Number of Prisoners now in Town, including those that were taken at the Action of Reichenberg, and in other Skirmishes, amounts to upwards of 3000. The Number of the Prussians wounded in the Battle near Prague, and likewise brought hither, amounts to about 1800.

Cologne, June 2. The 26th the Camp of Ruremonde marched to Wesel. The 28th the First Division of the Camp of Horse at Neufs followed. The 29th the Second Division marched, and the Regiment of Royal Roussillon brought up the Rear Guard. Yesterday the Regiment of Nassau Larbruck passed here, making the Rear of Marshal d'Etrées Army.

Brussels, June 3. We learn by Letters from France, that Marechal d'Etrées's Army is to be reinforced by a Body of six thousand Men, which were to begin their March as Yesterday from Lille, and other neighbouring Garrisons.

Brussels, June 7. All the Regiments that remained in the interior Parts of France, and many of those that are in Brittany and Normandy, have received Orders to march directly into Alsace, where they are to form an Army of about 40,000 Men, to be commanded by the Prince de Soubize, who is to proceed with all possible Speed to the Assistance of the Empress Queen. Our last Letters from Nuremberg mention the Arrival of a Body of Prussians before the Gates of that Town, and that their Van Guard was advanced as far as Forchheim in the Bishoprick of Bamberg.

Whitehall, June 10.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint his Grace Augustus Henry Duke of Grafton, to be Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotorum of the County of Suffolk.

Admiralty-Office, June 11.

The Lords of the Admiralty have received an Account, That on the 30th of last Month, between One and Two in the Morning, His Majesty's Ships the Eagle and Medway, being about 48 D. North, and 2 D. West Longitude from the Lizard, gave Chace to a large Ship under French Colours, standing to the Eastward; and, coming up with her about Four, they attacked her with a very brisk Fire for about three Quarters of an Hour, when she struck. She proves to be the Duke d'Aquitaine, commanded by the Sieur d'Esquelen, of about 1500 Tons, mounts 50 Guns upon two Decks, all 18 Pounders; had on Board 493 Men, and

belonged to the French East India Company. She lost in the Engagement about 50 killed, and a great many wounded, 22 very dangerously; and all her Masts, Sails and Rigging broke away and fell over board before Night. She came from Lisbon, where she landed, some Months ago, a very rich Cargo from the East-Indies; and, when taken, was only equipped for War, with Orders to cruize for 15 Days, ten or twelve Leagues off the Rock of Lisbon, in order to intercept the Mermaid, one of our 20 Gun Ships, which was on the Point of sailing from Lisbon with a Convoy. During her Cruize, she took an English Brigg from Cadiz, bound to Cork, which was ransomed for 200 l. The Eagle had 10 Men killed, and 32 wounded in the Engagement with the Duke d'Aquitaine; but, as the Medway's Fire could only be employed in raking her, she had only ten Men wounded.

General Post-Office, December 20, 1756.

WHereas the Post Boy carrying the Worcester Mail from hence to Southall, was, on Sunday Morning the 12th instant, between the Hours of Four and Five of the Clock, attacked and robbed on the Road near Shepherds Bush, by a Footpad, who laid hold of the Bridle of the Post Boy's Horse, and bid him dismount, and afterwards led the said Horse into a Lane near the great Road, and from thence into a Field adjoining, and there near to a Hay Rick took off the Mail from the Horse, opened it, and afterwards the Letters contained in the following Bags, viz: *Camden, Chipping-Norton, Eversham, Burford, Whitney, Woodstock, Oxford, Ludlow, Bromyard, Worcester, Thame, Southall, Gerrard's Cross, Uxbridge, High Wickham, and Baconsfield.*

Note, The following Bags in the said Mail were unopened, viz. *Shipston, Enson, and Tenbury*; and the said Foot-pad, after detaining the Post-Boy upwards of two Hours, mounted the said Post-Boy's Horse, and rode off with the same towards Acton, which Horse was found the same Morning about Eight o'Clock near the Turnpike at Hyde Park Corner.

The Person who committed this Robbery has since put off several of the Bank Notes, and indorsed the Name of James Wilson thereon, to several Innkeepers on the Road to Caxton, by travelling Post in Post-Chaises with four Horses, by the Way of Barnet, Hatfield, Stevenage, and Bugden, and returning from Caxton by Way of Royston, Ware, and Enfield to London, where he was set down at Gray's Inn Gate in Gray's Inn Lane, about Twelve o'Clock at Noon, on Tuesday the 14th instant. This Person is described to be rather above the Middle-size, of a brown Complexion, very thin Visage and Body, with an effeminate Voice; he had on a Silver-laced Hat with a Cockade, blue Surtout Coat with Brass Buttons, a dark brown close-bodied Coat underneath, a Pair of Breeches with Silver Gartering at the Knees, his Wig or Hair, or both mixed was a dark brown, and tied behind with a Ribbon.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of *Two Hundred*

Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

The following very remarkable Case of the Right Hon. the Marquis of Lindsey, Son to his Grace the Duke of Ancafter, is published by his Grace's Permission:

ON Friday the last Day of December 1756, the Marquis of Lindsey, a Child of twenty Months old, on suspicion of the Measles, was bled to five Ounces, and no Signs of Inflammation appeared.

On Saturday the 1st of January 1757, about Five o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Measles appeared.

On Sunday the 2d they appeared full on his Face and Body.

On Monday the 3d they began to decline, and a Hoarseness, cough, and a Fever came on.

On Tuesday the 4th, in the Morning, they had quite disappeared, without leaving the least Redness, and the bad Symptoms increased. He was then bled to five Ounces, the Blood shewing no Signs of Inflammation; and about Three in the Afternoon, the Apothecary, who attended him, found more violent Symptoms, such as increased Heat, wheezing Cough; universal languor, and fluttering Pulse, on which he immediately applied Blisters to the Back and Arms, and Dr. Baker, Physician at Stamford, was sent for, who arrived about Eight o'Clock on Tuesday Night, and found the Fever very high, and the Cough violent.

On Wednesday Morning, the 5th, the Symptoms rather abated, a Clyster was given him, and at Three in the Afternoon, (at which Time the Fever was very violent) three Ounces of Blood were taken from him, which shewed no Marks of Inflammation. He bore this Bleeding so very Ill, that it was with great Difficulty he was brought to himself; however, on his Recovery from the Faintings, he appeared relieved, and had a tolerable Night.

All Thursday Morning, the 6th, he continued easy, but, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, he was seized with great Difficulty of Breathing, and seemed in the utmost Danger. On Friday Morning, the 7th, about Three o'Clock, the Fever left him, and he continued free from it 'till Nine at Night, when his Pulse rose a little; between Ten and Eleven he took four Grains more of the Powder, which, in forty Minutes, made him extremely sick; he had several Strains for two Hours, but never vomited.
