P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Tenth of May last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of July next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of July next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable William Earl of Home, to be Lord Lieutenant of the Shire of Berwick in North-Britain—His Lordship this Day took and subscribed the Oaths of Allegiance and Abjuration, and also subscribed the Affu-

rance, conformable to what is required by an Act passed in the First Year of his late Majesty's Reign.

Vienna, June 1. Marshal Daun's Army is still at, or near *Czassau*, and is said here to consist of 41,000 regular Foot, and 11,000 Horse and Dragoons, besides 15,000 Irregulars. It is composed of 46 Battalions, and between 30 and 40 Companies of Grenadiers; 16 Regiments of Horse and Dragoons, besides 18 Squadrons of Saxon Cavalry; 8 Battalions of Croates, as many Companies of Grenadiers, and about 5,000 Hussars, with a Train of Artillery of above 100 Pieces of Ordnance; and the Day before Yesterday 45 Pieces of Cannon, from 12 to 3 Pounders, were sent from hence to join that Army; and 50 more are getting ready in the Arsenal, to be sent thither forthwith. Marshal Daun still expects a Reinforcement of four other Battalions of Foot, besides the three of the Garrison of *Vienna*, which marched out of this City last Week. The Troops that were gathered together at *Beneschau*, are now dispersed in the Villages upon the Skirts of *Moravia* and *Austria*; and they are busy here in getting ready Arms, Tents, and Accoutrements for them. It is said that in the late Battle 13 Imperial Regiments lost their regimental Chests. Last Week the Empress Queen demanded, and obtained, of the States of Lower *Austria*, a Loan of 900,000 Florins, to be paid in three Months, in equal Payments; and, besides, a Sum of 100,000 Crowns for Carriages, &c. Count *Czernichew*, a Major General, arrived here within these few Days, from the Russian Army, with an Account that the Troops of that Nation were defiling from all Quarters, and would be all at the General Rendezvous as on the 30th of last Month.

Camp before Prague, June 1. The 24th and 25th the Prussian Army was kept alert, as another Sally, from the Town, was expected, but, it was not, however, attempted, and, except a few slight Skirmishes, between the Austrian and Prussian Pandours, nothing happened till Sunday the 29th of May, when, at Midnight, (for some Hours before which there had been heavy Rain and Thunder,) his Prussian Majesty's Army, by the Signal of a Sky-Rocket, thrown for that Purpose, from the King's Battery, began firing upon the Town from one Battery on this Side the *Moldau*, and from three other Batteries on the other Side of that River, all which Batteries, being extremely well served, have continued firing incessantly ever since; and the Bombs and red hot Balls have had their Effect, by setting the Town on Fire in several Places, which burnt furiously last Night, and this



this Day a new Fire is seen to be kindled. It is impossible to determine the Damage the Bombardment has already done, or what Effect the Fires in the Town will have upon the Garrison, they having yet made no Proposition whatever; but it is remarkable, that since Yesterday Morning, hardly one single Shot has been fired from the Town, which is imputed either to their Want of Ammunition, or perhaps of proper Artillery. The Shot already fired from the Town have been of six Pounds and some of Twelve, from whence it is conjectured that the Artillery they have is chiefly the Field Pieces belonging to the Battalions. This Morning early about 5000 Horse, supported by as many Foot, came out of the Town, on the other Side of the River, near the Wischerad. They advanced towards the Redoute on the Left of the King's Camp, where Prince Henry Commands, but were there so warmly received by the Fire from the Redoute, that they returned into Town again; and it is conjectured from this, that in Prague the Forage for Horses begins to fail.

Warsaw, June 1. The Russians are transporting the Magazines they had at Grodno, to Keydany and Kownow, which two Towns are, it is said, to be the Places of General Rendezvous.

Turin, June 1. His Sardinian Majesty has lately made the following Ecclesiastical Promotions, the Abbé Scarampi, one of the Royal Chaplains, Bishop of Vigevano; the Abbé des Rouffi, Bishop of Alexandria; the Abbés Martinian and St. Martin Bishops of St. Jean de Maurienne and Asti.

Cologne, June 9. By Accounts from Dusseldorf, we are informed, That the Corps of Palatin Troops, encamped near that City, had received Orders to join the French Army, and that they were to march, as this Day, or Saturday next. According to our Advices from Warendorff of the 5th Instant, The French then had their Right at Widembrugge, their Left at Telligt, and the Center at Warendorff; and, it was expected they would march forward on the 6th or 7th.

Cologne, June 13. Eight Boats are arrived here from France; three loaded with Corn, three with Straw, and two with Cannon Balls, &c. The Corn was immediately sent to the Mills to grind, in order to its being conveyed to the Army; and every Swiss Captain of the two Battalions here, is obliged to furnish a Cart, with four Horses, to carry the Flower to the Army. There is come to Liege seventeen Casks, each containing Five Hundred Thousand French Livres, in all Eight Millions Five Hundred Thousand Livres, for the Payment of the Army; the Controleur General having experienced, that the Circulation of Money, by Amsterdam, costs the King too dear. We have received Accounts which mention, that, on the 9th Instant, Marshal d'Estrées had been at the Castle of Rheda, to take a View of the Left of his Royal Highness the Duke's Army, with an Intention to attack it in a few Days, if it is found attackable; so that we expect to hear of an Action.

Brussels, June 10. It is confirmed, by all the Letters from France, that the Regiments which are remaining in the Interior Parts of

that Kingdom, as well as many others, from Brittany and Normandy, have received Orders to march with all possible Speed into Alsace.

Brussels, June 14. Besides the 12 Battalions of Militia that are ordered to march from Lille, and the neighbouring Places, to garrison the Towns in Germany in the Possession of the French, there are likewise ordered to join Marechal d'Estrées Army, the Swiss Regiment of Wittemer, of 1440 Men, the Volontaires de Flandres, and Volontaires de Haynault, each of 420 Men, and 20 Companies of Militia Grenadiers, called Grenadiers Postiches, which were to begin their March from Lorraine thro' the Dutchy of Luxembourg on the 10th Instant. The 12 Battalions of Militia are to pass through this Town.

Hague, June 10. Letters from the Empire say, That the Elector of Bavaria has actually signed a Convention of Neutrality with the King of Prussia, and that the Minister, who was sent with it to the Camp before Prague, has already passed through Ratibon on his Way home, with his Prussian Majesty's Ratification of it. The States of Holland are to meet next Week, when they are to take into Consideration the Situation of their Trade in the North, and the Measures it may be necessary to take in Consequence thereof. Letters from Wesel of the 7th Instant advise, That they had prepared an Hospital there, in which there were 5000 Beds. That the Regiment of Bergh, which was quartered at Wesel, marched the 4th for Munster: That a Battalion of the Royal Artillery, which arrived the 7th at Wesel, was to depart from thence the 8th for the same Place; and that the Transportation of Forage and Ammunition, from Wesel to Munster, still continued: That the 34 Squadrons of Horse, which had encamped a Month ago at Ruremond, were still there, though they had been, for several Days past, expecting, every Instant, to march from thence.

Hague, June 14. The last Letters from the French Army say, That His Royal Highness was extremely well posted. The two Armies were so near one another, that they had frequent Skirmishes, but nothing of Importance is yet come to our Knowledge. His Royal Highness had withdrawn his Posts from Paderborn and Rittberg, after having taken away every Thing which could be of any Service to the French. Marshal d'Estrées has not above 40 Squadrons of Horse with him, and the Cavalry, which was encamped at Ruremonde and elsewhere, had not marched towards Wesel, by the last Advices received from those Quarters. They write from Wesel of the 10th Instant, That Marshal d'Estrées Army, which had marched to Warendorff, was, that Day, to march to encamp at Rheda: That it consisted of 70 Battalions, 40 Squadrons, and 52 Pieces of Cannon. The Body of Horse, which encamped at Ruremonde, was expected, the same Day, the 10th, at Wesel; but, however, by the Letters of To-Day, we have not yet Advice of its Departure from thence. All the Horses of the Army, even those of the General Officers, have been put to green Forage. A great Number of Officers and Soldiers of the Army fall sick, and the Hospitals begin to fill.

And that all Out-Pensioners who are at a greater Distance than Twenty-five Miles from London (as

well those in England, as those in Scotland and Ire-land) are required to apply themselves forthwith to one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the Neighbourhood where they reside, and make Oath, that they are Out-Pensioners belonging to the said Hospital; mentioning in their Certificates, the Regi-ment to which they did belong, how long they served in the Army, their Age, in what Manner wounded or disabled, their present Place of Abode, reciting the Village or Hamlet, with the Marke Town adjacent to it, and that they are no otherwise provided for by the Government; to the Intent, that the Commissioners for the Affairs of the said Hospital may be satisfied that they are the same Persons that have passed their Examinations.

Whereas by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His Majesty, [entitled, "An Act for granting to His Ma-jesty several Rates and Duties payable by all Persons, and Bodies Politick or Corporate, having certain Quantities

"Quantities of Silver Plate,"] all Persons, Bodies Politick or Corporate, were required to give Notice, and make true Entry in Writing, at the several Offices of Excise in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick upon Tweed, of their owning, using, having, or keeping Silver Plate, and of the Number of Ounces of such Plate chargeable by the said Act, with the Rates and Duties therein mentioned, wheresoever the same or any Part thereof shall be kept, and of the Parish or Place, or Parishes or Places where such Persons shall respectively inhabit, or where such Bodies Politick or Corporate shall respectively be situate, distinguishing in such Notice, whether the same be on their own Account, or on the Account of any other, and what Person or Persons, or Body or Bodies Politick or Corporate.

And whereas by the said Act, all Persons, Bodies Politick or Corporate, who did give, or were obliged to give such Notice as aforesaid, are required to give, within Thirty Days next after the Commencement of each Year, for which the said Rates and Duties shall be payable, a fresh Notice in Manner aforesaid, and pay down the respective Annual Rates and Duties mentioned in the said Act, according to the Number of Ounces of Silver Plate chargeable thereby, which they shall then respectively own, use, have, or keep, as long as they shall respectively continue to own, use, have, or keep any Quantity of Silver Plate chargeable thereby.

This is therefore to remind all Persons, Bodies Politick and Corporate, that the Time for making the said fresh Entries and paying the said Duties for the subsequent Year, will commence on the 5th Day of July next ensuing; when, or within Thirty Days after, all Persons, Bodies Politick and Corporate, are obliged by the said Act under the Penalties therein set forth, to give such fresh Notices, and pay the respective Duties chargeable by the said Act on the Silver Plate, which they shall then respectively own, use, have, or keep.

The following very remarkable Case of the Right Hon. the Marquis of Lindsey, Son to his Grace the Duke of Ancafter, is published by his Grace's Permission:

ON Friday the last Day of December 1756, the Marquis of Lindsey, a Child of twenty Months old, on suspicion of the Measles, was bled to five Ounces, and no Signs of Inflammation appeared.

On Saturday the 1st of January 1757, about Five o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Measles appeared.

On Sunday the 2d they appeared full on his Face and Body.

On Monday the 3d they began to decline, and a Hoarseness, cough, and a Fever came on.

On Tuesday the 4th, in the Morning, they had quite disappeared, without leaving the least Redness, and the bad Symptoms increased. He was then bled to five Ounces, the Blood shewing no Signs of Inflammation; and about Three in the Afternoon, the Apothecary, who attended him, found more violent Symptoms, such as increased Heat, wheezing Cough, universal languor, and fluttering Pulse, on which he immediately applied Blisters to the Back and Arms, and Dr. Baker, Physician at Stamford, was sent for, who arrived about Eight o'Clock on Tuesday Night, and found the Fever very high, and the Cough violent.
