Berwiek, Odob. 14. Ne Wednestay last Captain Browna Scotch Privateer, brought up to Leith Road, three Dutch Vessels two of them of 400 Tuns apiece, laden with French Salt and Vinegar, the other of 300 Tuns, with Salt only, befides feveral other Prizes taken, which are daily expected; the great florms have not happened without some damage to our Coiliers. One Vessel belonging to Harwich, and another to Newcastle, being cast away near the Cocquet-Island and this Coast, but the Mariners all faved.

Pendennis, Odsb. 15. Here arrived the last night three ships, one a small one from Bruges, of twelve Tuns and eight Guns; a second from Ojlend, of 160 Tuns, bound for Bourdeaux; and a third a Swede, bound for Bilbos. An Hamburger, that about three weeks fince went out from hence, is again brought in by florm, but neither of these bring any news with them.

Plymouth, Offober 16. Three Oftenders are here arrived from the Isle of Oleron, laden with Salt, they report the Fleet to be fill at Breft, where they intend to continue for this winter. The Capers have of late much infested these Coasts, but we hear not of much hurt they have done, besides the taking of a small vessel of Apsom, bound for London, and the pillaging some Oftenders about the Li-

This day came in the Saphire and Fotrefter from Ireland, bringing in under their Convoy, four thips richly laden from Guing, belonging to the Royal Company.

Milan, Octob. 2. On the 25 past, her Imperial Majesty in order to her fo emn entry, went incognite out of this Towa by the Gate Tioinese, to a place fitted for her reception; near to which were drawn up many Companies of Foot, well Armed, and in excellent equipage, with their Officers. At the specarance of the Empres, Don Louis Ponte du Leon, the Governor, with a great Train of leveral Officers of his Catkolick Maj: fty, and of the Courts Soveraign, made his addresses to her, and immediately gave order for the march, which at the discharge of all the Guns from the Cittadel, followed by those from the Walis, with many vollies of small shor, began in this order.

First marched the Marquels de los Balbaces (Spino!a) a Grandee of Spain, and at present, General of all the Milan Cavalry, with a great number of Officers Trumpers, and led Horses, richly caporison'd, at the head of eight Troops of Curiaffiers, compleaely armed and habited, with Scarffs and Fenthers, all of the same fashion and colour. After them a great company of private Lords, Knights, Counts Marquesses, and other persons of greatest quality, very richly habited, and mounted on excellent Horses, who rid without any order of precedency, in a confused heap, attended by a great number of Footmen, in excellent variety of Liveries. After them came the Colledge of the Juriss, the sixty Decurions, all the Officers of the long and short Robe, with the Magistrates, the Chief Justice, the whole Senate, with the Swiffe Guard, and then the Privy Council all on

Then followed the Duke d' Albuquerque,, a Grandee of spain, and Major Domo for the present to the Empress, with the Governor on his left hand, immediately preceding the Empress, who was carried in an extraordinary rich and magnifacut Chariot, mide like an Imperial Throne, having a

Canopy all the way carried over her fuccessively, by Trielve Doctors of the Colledges of Jurists. After her Chariot followed many rich Coaches with fix Horses, and in them a great number of Ladies, richly covered with Jewels to an infinite value, Next after them were led thirty seven Mules with their Sumpter Cloaths, nobly embroidered with Gold of which, twenty five bore the Arms of the King of Spain, the other twelve those of the House of Cueva d' Albuquerqe, the rear of all, closed with several Troops of Horse.

In this order, after three falves from the Ramparts, with the like from the Artillery of the Castle, she was received at the Gate of the City, under a Triumphal Arch, by the Sieur Gero!amo Viscomii, the Vicar-General, who presented her with she Cross, which she kist. Passing afterwards through the principal Streets, which were on both fides hung with Fai peftry: the Cittzens ranged on each fide of the way in order; till she arrived at the Great Church, which was richly hung with Tapestry of excellent work, and lighted by an infinite number of Tapers of White Wax: where at the door she was again received by the Bishops and Clergy of that Province, the Cardinal LittaMetropolitan, being then absent, After, Te Deum fung with excellent Musick, and the usual Service for fuch solemities finished, the Empress returned to ber Chariot, and in the same order as besore, went to the Ducal-Palace, where the night approaching, the windows were filled with infinite number of Torches, as were also the Streets, through which the past from the Church. After which, she was entertained with a Spanish Comedy, and a great Banquet; that night and the two following, being folemnized through the City with Lights and Bonfires, with all possible testimony of joy. Which Ceremony ended, the Empress is now preparing for her removal from hence, which is now appointed to be on the fifth instant.

Rome, Octob. 3. Upon the arrival of the Ordinary from Milan, with the news of the refusal of the Popes Brief, excufing the Cardinal Chifyes. from his Letation, a Courier was immediately dispatcht to Cardinal Garafa at Bologne, but the particulars of his message are not known.

The young Prince, the only Son of the Duke of Guaftalla; of the House of Gonzague, and Heir presumptive to the Dutchy of Mantua, is lately dead, to the great grief of his aged Father, and as much bewailed by his Mother, who is Sister to the Cardinal d' Este, and the late Duke Francis of Modera.

The Count de Vindisgratz, Commissioner from his Imperial Majesty, for the composure of the differences between Mantua and Modena, which were referred to the judgement and decision of the Emperor, after all his pains and frequence visits made to both parties, has not been able as yet to effect any thing in that bufiness, but is like to leave it in the same posture he found it,
