PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Tenth of May last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who fhould voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majefty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who fhould conceal thomselves, is near expiring : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for fome Time longer ; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Acrice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Szaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen refpectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of July next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last : And likewife, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Thirteenth Day of July next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

I S Majefty came this Day to the Houle of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes feated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, the Honourable Sir Henry Bellenden, Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majefty to the Houfe of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houfe of Petrs. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

A FTER fo long and diligent an Attendance upon the Public Business, it is Time that I should give you some Recess. But I cannot

put an End to the Session, without expressing My entire Satisfaction in the many Proofs I have received of your Zeal and Affection for my Person and Government, and for your unseigned Concern for My Honour and real Support.

The Succour and Prefervation of My Dominions in America have been my conftant Care. And, next to the Security of My Kingdoms, they shall continue to be My great and principal Object: And I have taken such Measures, as, I trust; by the Blessing of God, may effectually disappoint the Designs of My Enemies in those Parts.

I have had no other View, but to vindicate the juft Rights of My Crown and Subjects from the most injurious Encroachments; to preferve Tranquillity, as far as the Circumstances of Things might admit; and to prevent Our true Friends, and the Liberties of Europe, from being oppress'd or endanger'd by any unprovoked and unnatural Conjunction.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

I thank you for the large Supplies which you have fo chearfully and unanimoufly given Me. It affords Me great Pleafure, that the frugal Ufe made of the Confidence reposed in Me the last Year, has been an Inducement to you to renew the same; and you may be affured, that it shall be applied only to the Purposes for which it was intended.

I fhall be particularly attentive to reduce all unneceffary Expences, in order the better to provide for the great and requisite Services of the War.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have nothing to defire of you, but what is equally effential to your own Intereft, and to My Service. Let it be your conftant Endeavour to promote Harmony and good Agreement amongft My faithful Subjects; that, by Our Union at Home, We may be the better able to repel and fruftrate Abroad, the dangerous Defigns of the Enemies of My Crown.
