AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 8th Day of July, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of August next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of August next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace Augustus Henry Duke of Grafton, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Suffolk, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

*Warsaw, June 25.* We have as yet no Account of the Russians having left their Camp in the Neighbourhood of Kowno.

*Vienna, June 27.* Yesterday Morning the Emperor and Empress assisted at the Te Deum,

which was sung at the Cathedral of St. Stephen, for the Deliverance of Prague; and, in the Evening, their Imperial Majesties appeared at the French Comedy, with the three eldest Archdukes, and the four eldest Archduchesses. The Empress Queen has promoted M. Vettes, who brought the first News of the Victory, to the Rank of Colonel.

*Copenhagen, July 2.* The Swedish Squadron, consisting of six Men of War and two Frigats, is arrived here, and proposes speedily to joit with that of Denmark, at Fleckery on the Coast of Norway.

*Cologne, July 7.* The three States of this Electorate sent Yesterday a Deputation to wait on the Elector at Aix la Chapelle, and humbly to represent to his Electoral Highness the tyrannical Manner in which the French treat his Subjects, and to shew the Impossibility of furnishing the 400 Waggon, with four Horses each, which Marshal d'Estrées has demanded, to bring up Provisions to his Army. There begins to pass daily some Boats with Wheat, Rye, Oats and Straw; they come four or five together without any Convoy; and this will continue for some Time, as it is determined to furnish from Alsace the Magazines at Wesel, and to make a large one here, that the Troops may not suffer as they have done since they enter'd into Westphalia. Advices from the French Army say, that the Empress had ordered two Regiments of Hussars to march to reinforce Marshal d'Estrées. M. Kinkel, the Imperial Commissary, arrived the 3d at Leer in East Friesland, to concert with Marquis D'Auuet (who commands the French Troops in that Country) the Measures to be taken upon the Submission of the Country. Last Tuesday the Volontaires de Flandres and Hainault arrived here, and this Morning they marched to Paderborn. We hourly expect two Battalions of Militia to pass; and the 17th two more, to remain in Garrison here.

*Brussels, July 8.* According to our last Letters from Marshal d'Estrées's Army, the French are said to be in full Possession of the Principality of East Friesland, and all Communication cut off through Westphalia between the Electorate of Hanover and the United Provinces. The last Advices we have here from Bohemia, are of the 26th of June, when the Austrian Army was encamped at Kolodieg near Auwal, not far from the Spot where the Battle was fought on the 6th of May.
