The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen refpectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of August next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of August next, discover any Seaman, or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereos all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Whitehall, July 23.

By Letters from Vice Admiral Watton, dated the 31st of January, off Calcutta, in the River Hughley, there is an Account, That having failed the 16th of October last, with all the Squadron, and the Walpole and Marlborough Indiamen, from Madrass for Bengal, he anchored, after a tedious Passage, on the 5th of December, in Ballafore Road; and having croffed the Braces on the 8th, proceeded up the River, and arrived at Fulta on the 15th, where he found Governor Drake and the Gentlemen of the Council on Board fuch Ships and Veffels as

failed with the Kent, Tyger, Salisbury, Bridgewater, and King's Fisher Sloop. The next Afternoon Colonel Clive was landed, in order to march and attack Busbudgia Fort by Land, at the same Time that the Squadron appeared before the Place, which anchored, and began to cannonade about Eight o'Clock in the Morning on the 30th; and, at Half past Eight, the King's Troops were landed to support Colonel Clive. The Ships foon filenced the Enemy's Fire; and, at Seven in the Evening, 100 Seamen were landed under the Command of Captain King. At Half past Eight, the Body of the Fort was on Fire; and, immediately after, News was received that the Place was taken; but the few People in it had all escaped. One of the Company's Captains was killed, and four Soldiers This Fort was extremely well fituwounded. ated for Defence, having a wet Ditch round it, but badly provided with Cannon, only 18 Gune, from 24 Pounders and downwards; and about 40 Barrels of Powder, with Ball in Proportion, being found in it. On the 1st of January the Kent and Tyger anchored between Tanna Fort, and a Battery opposite to it, both which the Enemy abandoned as the Ships approached. About 40 Guns, some 24 Pounders, and all mounted on good Carriages, with fome Powder and Ball, were found in this Fort and Battery; and the Admiral left the Salifbury as a Guardship to prevent the Enemy from regaining them. In the Night the Admiral fent the Boats, mann'd and arm'd, up the River, to burn a Ship and some Vessels said to be filled with Combustibles, which was executed without Opposition. The next Morning, early, the Company's Troops were landed, and immediately began their March to Calcutta. The Kent and Tyger foon after proceeded up the River, together with the 20 Gun Ship and At 40 Minutes after Nine, the Enemy began to fire upon the Tyger, from their Batteries below Calcutta, which they abandoned as the Ships approached. At 20 Minutes paft Ten, the Tyger and Kent made a very warm Fire, infomuch that the Enemy were foon drove from their Guns, and presently after ran out of the Fort, which Capt. Coote, with the King's Troops, and an Officer from the Kent, enter'd a little before Eleven. Four Mortars, 91 Guns of different Sizes, and a confiderable Quantity of all Kinds of Ammunition, were found in this Fort. The Ships have suffered very little in their Masts, Yards, and Rigging, and have only loft nine Seamen and three Soldiers killed, and twenty-fix Seamen and five Soldiers wounded. An Expedition was then proposed against Hughley, to be executed by the 20 Gun Ship and Sloop, the Boats of the Squadron had escaped falling into the Hands of the Moors. As the Pilots would not take Charge of the Ships till the Springs were over, the Admiral nadiers, and 200 Seapoys, which were to be could not proceed higher till the 28th, when he | landed under the Command of Major Killpatrick 5

trick; and every Thing being prepared, they failed the 5th of January, under the Command of Captain Smith, of the Bridgewater; and, on the 11th, the Admiral received an Account of the taking that Place, in which was found 20 Guns, from 24 Pounders downwards, with a Quantity of Ammunition. The City of Hughley has fince been burnt and destroyed, together with the Granaries and Storehouses of Salt, situated on the Banks of each Side the River, which will be of great Prejudice to the Nabob, as they contained a Store for the Subsistance of his Army, while in that Part of the Country.

WHEREAS by an Act of this Session of Parliament it is enacted, that for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall not take out either a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, or a Licence for retailing of Beer. Ale, or other excisable Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament imposing any Duties on Stampt Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Five Pounds.

For every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall take out a Licence for retailing Beer, Ale, and other excisable Liquors, but shall not take out a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Duties on Stampt Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional-Duty of Four Pounds.

And for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be engrossed, written or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall also take out a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Li quors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Duties on Stampt Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Forty Shillings

And whereas by the faid Act it is further enacted, that from and after the 5th Day of July 1757, no Person whatsoever, unless he or she shall be authorised and enabled by Licence under the Hands and Seals of two or more of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Stamp Dutics, shall sell or utter Wine by Retail, that is by the Pint, Quart, Pottle or Gallon, or by any other greater or less retail Measure, or in Bottles in any less Quantity than shall be equal to the Measure of the Cask or Vessel in which the same shall have been or may lawfully be imported, any kind of Wine or Wines, or any Liquor called or reputed Wine, upon pain to forseit for every Offence the Sum of 1001. one Half to any Person who will inform for the same.

The Commissioners do therefore give Notice, that (in pursuance of the said Act) they are ready to grant Licences, under their Hands and Seals, to such Persons who shall by themselves or Agents apply to them for the same, at their Office in Lincoln's Inn,

London; every Person applying for such Wine Licence, producing their Licence to sell Ale, and also to sell Spirituous Liquors, if they have any such Licences.
