AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 8th Day of *July*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of August next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Thirteenth Day of August next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Warsaw, July 6. There are Letters from Prussia of the 2d Instant, which say, that the Russians have actually invested Memel. Those Letters make no Mention of Felt Marshal Apraxin's Motions; but it is generally believed here, that great Part of his Army has passed the Niemen.

Brussels, July 21. On Tuesday last Lieutenant General de la Motte, at the Head of three Battalions of French Troops, was received in Ostend, in order to replace the Austrian Garrison, which was to quit it as Yesterday with their Commandant General Piza, and the Etat Major. The Town of Nieupoort is likewise to receive a French Garrison.

Hague, July 22. By Letters of the 15th and 18th Instant from Afferden on the Weser, Major General Hardenberg was marched towards Gottingen on the 15th, with the Grenadiers, and the 2d Line of the Army was marched to support him, and to attack, as it was imagined, a Body of French Troops, which encamped between Golmbach and Wurbsen in the Balliage of Forst. It was not imagined that all Marshal d'Etrées's Army would be over the Weser before the 20th Instant. We have no News of Consequence from Bohemia.

The King has been pleased to appoint James Read, Esq; to be His Majesty's Consul General to the Emperor of Morocco.

Admiralty Office, July 30.

His Majesty's Ship the Southampton, commanded by Captain Gilchrist, is put into Weymouth, and he gives an Account, that in his Way from St. Helens for Plymouth, on the 25th Instant, about Eleven o'Clock at Night, off the High Land of St. Albans, he fell in with five Sail of French Ships, two of which appeared to him to be of equal Force with himself; one of them he engaged upwards of an Hour and Half: She attempted to board him several Times, but meeting with a warm Reception, and receiving so much Damage from him, she made Signals for the other to bear down to her Assistance, which she immediately did, and he was for some Time between two Fires, one upon the Bow, the other on the Quarter, and continued engaging him upwards of an Hour longer; but Capt. Gilchrist luckily got his whole Broadside to bear on the first Ship, and by breeching his aftermost Guns ast, and his foremast Guns forward, he gave her a whole Broadside, which silenc'd her entirely. The other Ship then came up, and began a very smart Engagement for about a Quarter of an Hour, after which she dropt a-stern. By that Time the Southampton was left a perfect Wreck, and in no Condition to follow either of them, having received eight very dangerous Shot between Wind and Water, had ten Men killed, and fourteen reported by the Surgeon to be mortally wounded, and as many more slightly wounded, he was obliged to put into Weymouth to repair her Damages. The said five Ships are reported to be two Frigates, with three small Privateers; and the Frigates Weight of Metal is the same with the Southampton's.

His Majesty's Ship the Isis, Capt. Wheeler, is arrived at Spithead, and has brought in with him three Privateers, viz. the Presieux, 26 Guns, 240 Men, commanded by M. Dubois, belonging to St. Maloe; the Conte de Herville, 16 Guns,

16 Guns, 180 Men, Dehoan, of Bourdeaux; the Prince of Turin, 10 Guns, 84 Men, De Bras, of Havre de Grace: He likewise has retaken, and brought to Spithead, the Minerva, Hicks, Master, of London, which came from Antigua, under Convoy of the Anson.

Lieutenant John Peighin, Commander of the James and Thomas Tender, gives an Account in his Letter of the 28th Instant, that in his Way from Rye to Spithead, on the 27th, at Five o'Clock in the Evening, being off Fair-Lee, he saw five Sail standing to the Eastward, one of which was a large Snow, with a Teer of Guns fore and aft, six or seven of a Side, with English Colours: At Seven coming up very fast with him, he prepared and got every Thing ready for Action, ordered every Man to Quarters, to lay close down, and had run in his few Guns by way of Deception, hoping he would run up along Side of and board him; and told every Man singly, that if they did attempt it, soon as they received his Orders, that Instant to enter her. At Eight o'Clock he fired three or four Musquets into the Tender, hoisted French Colours, hailed and told Lieutenant Peighin, that if he did not immediately strike, he would fire a Broadside into him. Just as he spoke, Lieutenant Peighin hoisted his Colours, repeated his Directions to his People to lay close, and not a Man fire till he received his Orders. Two Minutes after hailing, the Frenchman fired a Broadside and all his Musquetry into the Tender, and rather seemed to edge from her. Lieutenant Peighin then bore down towards him, in Hopes of getting a Longside of him, when he received a second Broadside, which carried away the Tender's Fore-top-sail, that the Yard fell upon the Cap, tore the Jibb Fore-top-mast-sail, Fore-sail, and Top-sail very much; when finding he could get no nearer than the Frenchman pleased to let him, he ordered his Men to begin and fire into him, and continued it a full Hour and Half, in which Time the Frenchman shot a-head, and got to Windward of him, and kept firing all the Time not above 20 Yards from them; and at Half after Nine, put about and stood from the Tender; and not coming near her again, and she being in a shattered Condition, Lieutenant Peighin made for the Downs, and arrived there the 28th. He had four Men kill'd and seven wounded in the Action.

WHEREAS by an Act of this Session of Parliament it is enacted, that for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall not take out either a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, or a Licence for retailing of Beer, Ale, or other excisable Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament imposing any Duties on Stamp Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Five Pounds.

For every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall take out a Licence for retailing Beer, Ale, and other excisable Liquors, but shall not take out a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Duties on Stamp Vel

lom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Four Pounds.

And for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall also take out a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Duties on Stamp Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Forty Shillings.

And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, that from and after the 5th Day of July 1757, no Person whatsoever, unless he or she shall be authorized and enabled by Licence under the Hands and Seals of two or more of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Stamp Duties, shall sell or utter Wine by Retail, that is by the Pint, Quart, Pottle or Gallon, or by any other greater or less retail Measure, or in Bottles in any less Quantity than shall be equal to the Measure of the Cask or Vessel in which the same shall have been or may lawfully be imported, any kind of Wine or Wines, or any Liquor called or reputed Wine, upon pain to forfeit for every Offence the Sum of 100l. one Half to any Person who will inform for the same.

The Commissioners do therefore give Notice, that (in pursuance of the said Act) they are ready to grant Licences, under their Hands and Seals, to such Persons who shall by themselves or Agents apply to them for the same, at their Office in Lincoln's Inn, London; every Person applying for such Wine Licence, producing their Licence to sell Ale, and also to sell Spirituous Liquors, if they have any such Licences.
