AT the Court at Kensington, the 8th Day of July, 1757,

PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of June last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring : Ard whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Thirteenth Day of August next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the faid Thirteenth Day of August next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Vienna, July 14. Considerable Numbers of battering Cannon are daily sending off from hence.

Vienna, July 18. Baron Pretlack, General of Horse, is here in his Way to the Army of the Empire; and his Brother, the Major General, is actually upon his March, at the Head of the Regiments of Cuirassiers, Pretlack and Trautmansdorff, and Desoffi's Hussars, in order to join that Army.

Cologne, July 25. They write from the French Camp at Warbsen, that the Hanoverians had routed and put to Flight 150 of the Volontaires Royaux the 16th; and the 18th the Hanoverian Hunters had killed Brigadier Connetablie as he was making his Round with an Escort of Carabiniers. The Cavalry, camped at Ruremonde, has received Orders to delay their March towards the Upper Rhine till the 29th.

Hague, July 26. By our Letters from the Weser, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland had marched with a Body of Troops towards Winkensen, with a Design to attack a Part of the French Army that was advanced to that Place; but the French had Intelligence of his Motions, and retired with Precipitation. Marshal d'Etrees complains of the Sickness of his Army, and the Want of Provisions, as well as of the great Difficulty he finds in advancing in a Country so woody and mountainous.

WHEREAS by an Act of this Session of Parliament it is enacted, that for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall not take out either a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, or a Licence for retailing of Beer, Ale, or other excisable Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament imposing any Duties on Stampt Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Five Pounds:

For every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet

For every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be ingrossed, written, or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be

granted to any Person who shall take out a Licence for retailing Beer, Ale, and other excisable Liquors, but shall not take out a Licence for retailing of Spirituous Liquors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former Act or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Dusies on Stampt Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Four Pounds.

And for every Piece of Vellom or Parchment, or Sheet or Piece of Paper, on which shall be engrossed, written or printed, any Licence for retailing of Wine, to be granted to any Person who shall also take out a Licence for retailing or Spirituous Li quors, over and above all other Rates and Duties payable by Virtue of any former A t or Acts of Parliament, imposing any Duties on Stampe Vellom, Parchment and Paper, an additional Duty of Forty

Shillings.

And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted, that from and after the 5th Day of July 1757, no Person whatsbever, unless he or she shall be authorised and enabled by Licence under the Hands and Seats of two or more of the Commissioners of Fiis Majelly's Stamp Duties, shall sell or utter Wine by Retail, that is by the Pint, Quart, Pottle or Gallon, or by any other greater or less retail Measure, or in Bottles in any less Quantity than shall be equal to the Measure of the Cask or Vessel in which the same shall have been or may lawfully be imported, any kind of Wine or Wines, or any Liquor called or reputed Wine, upon pain to forseit for every Offence the Sum of 1001 one Half to any Person who will inform for the same.

The Commissioners do therefore give Notice that (in pursuance of the inid Act) they are ready to grant Licences, under their Hands and Scals, to such Persons who shall by themselves or gents apply to them for the same, at their Office in Lincoln's Inn, London; every Person applying for such Wine Licence, producing their Licence to sell Ale, and also to sell Spirituous Liquors, if they have any such Licences.
