Netherlands, the States have resolved to send to Regiments of Foot, to reinforce such of the Spanish Garrifons, as lye most exposed to the attempts of the French, and it is faid, that these Troops have already Orders The beginning of the next week his Highto march. ness the Prince of Orange will part hence for Cleves, in order to the holding a Conference with the Elector of Brandenburg, who according as his Minister here affures us, will be there about that time. It is expect ed that Count Waldech will in few days return hither from Vienna, where, as we are told, he hath very well succeeded in the Matters he went to Negotiate. The Minister that is here from the States of Linge, hath two days fince given in a Memorial to the States General, reprefenting, that the French being about quit-ting of Mafeyek, have declared, that they would spare the Walls of that City, in case the Allies will folemnly promise not to possess themselves of that place during the War, which Memorial hath been referred to the Ministers of the several Allies, residing here. It being not at all doubted, but that the French will accept of Nimegen, for the place of Congress, as this State and their Allies have already done, at the Mediation of his Majesty of Great Britain, The States have already refolved to fend three Deputies thither, to prepare the place for the Reception of so great an Affembly, which it is hoped will be now begun very suddainly, in order to the restoring a general Peace to Christendom, so much defired and wished for, the only obstacle which remains to the forming of the faid Assembly, is the affair of the Prince of Furfienberg. We are told, that his most Christian Majesties last Declaration upon that subject was, that he would be content the Prince should be put into the hands of some Newtral Prince; and that his Imperial Majesty has an-Level thereupon, to the Ambassador of Sweden, just before his departure from Vienna, that all that he could yield to was, That he would cause the Process depending against the said Prince, to be stops till the conclufion of the Peace.

Paris, March 15. We have n. w aparticu'ar account from Messina, of Monsteur de Vivonne's arrival there, and the advantage obtained by him over

the Spanish Fleet, viz.

The 29 of J. nu.ry, the Duke de Vitonne parted from Thoulan, with 9 Men of War, one light Fregar, 3 Fireships, and 8 Victualers, laden with Provisions for the Messineses, the Winds were so favourable, that the 11 past he came within fight of the Spanish Fleet, not far from the Fare of Meffina; the Duke divided his Flect into three Squadrons, the Sieur du Quesne led the Van, as Vice Admiral, having with him, the Ship called the Espril, on board of which he was ; the Faithful, Commanded by the Sieur de Cogoulin, the Amiab'e, Commanded by the Sieur de Barr, and one Fireship, The Duke was in the middle on board the Scepter, with a light Fregat and a Fireship, the other two Men of War of his Squadron wer the Happpy, Commanded by the Sieur de la Bretesche, and he Perfeet, the Sieur Chisseureuf, Captain; the Marquis de Prewilly d' Humieres, in the St. Michael, had the Rear, the other Ships of his division, being the Are"o the Sieur de Fourbins, Captain ; the Valiant, the Sieur de Septeme Commander, and a Fireship. In this Order the Duke had put himself, when the Spanish Fleet of 20 Men of War, Commanded by Don Metchior de la Cuevi, and 17 Gallevs, of which the Marquis del Piso was General, came down upon him with a fair windithe Van, Commanded by the Sieur de Queinc bore the Enemies first attack, but the Duke de Vivonne foon came in to his affritance; and thefe two divisions maintained the Fight with the Spaniards whole Fleet | the least Truth,

several hours, for the Marquis de Peuilly in the Reat, being to Leeward, could not come up to them, which the Duke de Vivonne observing, tacked, and stood towards him, accommodating in the mean time his Rigging and Sails, which were forn, & c. and the Sieur de Quefne did afterwards the like. Things were in this posture, when about noon the Chevalier de Vallelle appeared with his Squadron of fix Men of War, coming before the Wind from Messina, directly towards the Spaniards; the Duke thereupon so ordered his course, as to get the Enemy between him and Monfieur de Valbette, which he should have gone, but that they began to give way, though in some order; the Sieur de Luejne, whose Ship sailed the best, j yned with the Chevalier de Valbelle; who being likewise come within shot of the Enemy; several discharges passed between them, but it feems the Spaniards being unwilling to continue the Engagement with the French, after fo considerable a reinforcement, as the Chevalier had brought them by whom they had been fo ill Treated, before, they quitted the Fight, and retired in confusion; the Chevalier de Valbede, and two other Men of Wars finding out their Chaloups, manned with Soldiers, they took a Spanish Man of War, who being disabled, could not keep way with the rest, called La Madont ael Popola, mounted with 40 Guns and 200 Men. The night coming on, hindred the French from continuing the purfuit; and befices, the Duke was unwilling to lofe any time to succor the Melsineses, whom he heard were in great extremity; the next day being the 12, he arrived at Messina, to the unspeakable joy of those people, and to the affonishment of the Spaniards, who thereupons quitted feveral Posts about the City. The same day arrived a Vessel at Messina, the Matter of which reported, that the night before he passed through the Spanish Fleet sailing towards Naples, that it consisted only in 15 Mea of War, one of which was without any Mails, and the other very much torn and shattered, that 4 of their Ships being very leaky, had funk in the night. The Spanish Gallies are, as is said, put into Me-14270. On the French side, about 200 Seamen have been killed and wounded, with some Officers, the Duke himself has received three light hurts.

Ditto, March 16. His Maiesty having received the particulars of the Duke de Vivonnes arrival at Melfine, hath resolved to send immediately thinker 4500 Foot of his old Troops, which is not doubted, but will sufficiently enable those People to defend themfelves against the Spaniards. The King has named the Prince de scubige, Captain Lieutenant of his Gensd' Arms, the Marquis de la Tro ffe, Captain Lieutenane of the Dauphins Gendarms, the Marquis de Kanne, Colonel-General of the Dragoons, the Sieurs de Chageron, de Monclar, Calue, and Wornas, to ferve as Mareschals de Camp in his Armies this next Campagne. 'It is expected that in a day or two his Majetty will likewise declare the Lieutenant Generals, and the Brigadiers of the Cavalry. Yesterday was a general review of the Troops of the Kings Houshold, as well Horse as Foot, the several Companies being very compleae, and in excellent order. The King has given a Regiment of Horse to the Prince of Guimene, who has these two years served in quality of Captain of Light Horse. The Duke de Vitry, who hath long refided on the part of his Majesty, at the Court of Bavaria, is returned hither; and we understand, that the Sieur de la Hay, formerly Ambaffador at the Port, is arrived at Munich, to remain there in the same employment. The Enemy hath, we hear, spread abroad several reports concerning a Plot, which its faid, hath been difcovered at the Court of that Elector, though without
