AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 9th Day of *August*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty Third Day of September next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

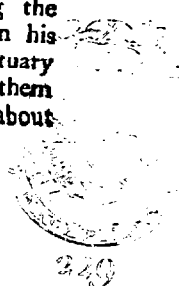

G O D Save the KING.

Constantinople, July 1. The Ramazan has passed here with the utmost Tranquility, and Bairam succeeded on the 19th past; at which Time several Changes were made, as usual, in the subordinate Offices of the Government. The one of the most Importance was that of the Captain Pascha, who is ordered to remain at a Village on the Asia Side of the Archipelago. He is succeeded by Aly Pascha, Beglerbeg of Rumelia, who is married to a Sultana, a Niece of the Sultan's; and the Pascha of Tripoly in Syria is appointed Beglerbeg of Rumelia. There has not been any Fire-works exhibited to the People, nor any publick Treats among the Ministers. The Grand Seigneur, who, on his Accession to the Throne, ordered Sumptuary Laws to be put in Execution, has renewed them about



about Dress, and has prohibited the Subjects wearing Scarlet, or other lively coloured Clothes. The Sultan has given three Days Diversion to his Ladies, at a Seraglio on the fresh Water River.

Berlin, August 2. According to our last Letters from Prussia, of the 28th past, the Russians have not yet made any further Progress since the taking of Memel; and though Marshal Apraxin approaches nearer the Frontiers of the Kingdom, he does not seem desirous to come to an Engagement. The Garrison of Memel is still detained, contrary to its Capitulation.

Brussels, Aug. 9. On Saturday last Lieutenant-General de la Motte arrived here, and has since taken the same Oaths to the Empress-Queen, for the Government of Ostend, that are usually taken by the Dutch Commanders in the Towns of the Barrier.
