AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 9th Day of *August*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty Third Day of September

next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Dantzic, Aug. 3. The Polish Chancellor came here three Days ago to prevail on the Magistrates of this City to advance his Polish Majesty a Sum of Money. There are still 16 Russian Men of War lying in this Harbour or Road; mostly in a sickly Condition, and do not seem as if they intended undertaking any Thing further suddenly. Their Army in Prussia act in the same slow Manner ever since the taking of Memel.

Dresden, Aug. 7. Marshal Keith arrived at Budissin as last Friday; and, by the latest Accounts from the King of Prussia's Army, he had advanced to Weissenburg, two Miles East of Budissin, with the Corps he led into Lusatia; leaving the other Part of his Army at Budissin. The Austrian Army is posted between Gorlitz and Ostritz, having the River Neiss behind them. The two Armies are now within one March of each other. The Corps under Prince Maurice of Dessau remains still at Cotta, to guard the Gorges of the Mountains, and to cover Pirna and this City.

Munich, Aug. 9. The Margrave of Anspach died on the 3d Instant of an Apoplexy. The Elector of Bavaria sets out To-morrow to review his Troops at Straubingen.

Cologne, Aug. 12. Marshal d'Etrées set out from the Army the 7th, with his own Equipage; and will go very slowly to Aix la Chapelle.

Cologne, Aug. 15. By Letters from Bonn, the Elector intends visiting the French Army.

Hague, Aug. 12. The States of Groninguen are assembled extraordinarily upon the Arresting of the Dutch Effects and Estates in East Friseland, by Order of the Empress Queen. By Letters from his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Head Quarters of the 9th Instant, the Army arrived at Verden the Day before, after having taken out of Nienburg all the Wounded and Sick which were in a Condition to be transported, and likewise brought away all the Remains of the Magazines of that Place, Artillery and Ammunition.

Hague, Aug. 16. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland was still at Verden on the 12th Instant. Mr. Keith, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to the Court of Vienna, arrived here this Afternoon, and will proceed to England in a few Days.

Brussels, Aug. 16. Mr. Dayrolle, His Britannick Majesty's Minister to this Court, is preparing to leave this Place, on his Return Home.

Ostend, Aug. 18. The Hospitals here fill very fast; and at Neuport it is still worse, almost half the Garrison of that Place being sick.

Ostend, Aug. 19. According to Letters from Ghent, General Pifa is to march this Day from Antwerp, with the Garrison of that Place, to command at Embden. He is to have four Battalions under him, viz. Charles Lorraine, Plats, Colorado, and Salm, and one Free Company. The two Battalions of Ligne, that are at Bruges, march To-morrow for Mons; so that this Country will be entirely evacuated by the Empress Queen's Troops, except one Free Company left at Blankenberg.
