AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 9th Day of *August*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next; enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty Third Day of September

next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Rome, Aug. 6.* The Pope is so well re-established in his Health, as to be able to go daily Abroad in a Chair. On the 18th past he held a Consistory, in which he disposed of eleven vacant Bishopricks in divers States, agreeable to the Nomination of the respective Sovereigns.

*Leghorne, Aug. 8.* On Friday last sailed from hence Admiral Osborn, with six Ships of the Line, two Frigates, and a Tender. The next Day arrived his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Ambuscade, with four French Prizes taken by Men of War and Privateers, with her own Prize the Vainqueur, a French Privateer of 24 Guns, nine and twelve Pounders on one Deck, and 360 Men, which he took off of Cagliari, after about one Hour and three Quarters close Engagement. The Vainqueur had a Companion, a Xebec, who also engaged with him, but made off just as the Vainqueur struck. This Privateer was one of the largest that was out of Marfeilles, and had done great Mischief to the English Trade in these Parts. This Morning sailed from hence two French Xebecs, one of 20 and the other of 18 Guns; they have been here for some Time, and have directed their Course towards Corsica.

*Turin, Aug. 10.* M. Chauvelin, the French Ambassador, returned Yesterday to this City from Parma, where he went after he had settled with the Duke of Modena at Milan, all that related to the Marriage Contract of the Princess Fortunata.

*Venice, Aug. 16.* On Saturday Evening Signor Foscarini, appointed Bailo from this Republick to the Ottoman Porte, embarked in a Man of War for Constantinople.

*Florence, Aug. 13.* Agreeable to the Articles of Reconciliation, which were lately settled and agreed upon between this Regency and the Court of Rome, a new Building is erecting for the Inquisition, and its Prison contiguous to the publick Prisons, in Lieu of the private one, which belonged formerly to that Tribunal.

*Dresden, Aug. 17.* On the 9th Instant, 1200 Waggon, loaden with Bread, Meal, and Forrage, went from this City to the Camp about Bautzen, escorted by a Battalion of Grenadiers, the Regiment of Fusileers of Rohr, a Battalion of the Regiment of Lange, and 300 Hussars. The same Day, early in the Morning, a great Number of Austrian Pandours surrounded a little Town, near the Frontiers of Bohemia, called Gottleube, in which a Prussian Regiment was quartered, with a Design to take it by Surprise. The Austrian Pandours attacked it on all Sides; and, in the Beginning, killed 29 Prussians, and wounded several others; but the Prussians having rallied, repulsed the Austrians with great Loss, and made several Prisoners. The Austrian Army, under Marshal Daun, has withdrawn between some Hills and Mountains, where they have posted and intrenched themselves.
