AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 9th Day of *August*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty Third Day of September

next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Warsaw, July 20. The 14th Instant Marshal Lehwalt left his Camp at Insterburg, and is now encamped with his whole Army in the Neighbourhood of Welaw, which will enable him to cover Konigberg, and obstruct the March of the Russians under General Fermor. Marshal Apraxin's Army advances very slowly, if at all.

Warsaw, Aug. 3. The last Accounts from Lithuania say, that Marshal Apraxin has sent several small Detachments into Prussia, and is with his whole Army within half a German Mile of the Frontiers. M. de Sibilki, a Polish General now in the Russian Service, is to have the Command of a considerable Body of Cossacks, and other Light Troops, with which he is to enter the Southern Side of Prussia; Felt Marshal Lehwalt continues in his Camp at Welaw, but has sent a considerable Detachment to guard the Coasts of Prussia, and prevent the Russians landing.

Dresden, Aug. 14. The Letters from the Prussian Army say, that since the Arrival of the Convoy there is great Plenty in their Camp, but the Austrians are very ill supplied, and that this Scarcity of Provisions occasions a great Desertion among their Troops. Prince Maurice with his Corps remains at Cotta; his Out-Parties have frequent Skirmishes with the Pandours, but he still keeps Possession of Gottleube and Gishubel. The Prince Royal of Prussia is still here.

Dresden, Aug. 17. Prince Maurice of Dessau has changed his Position, and the Corps he commands is now encamped between Zeitz and Pirna, so as to be able to succour and defend this Town.

Dresden, Aug. 21. Letters from the Prussian Army say, that the King of Prussia is advanced towards Ostritz and Zittau; that the Austrians had retired, and occupied a strong Post; that his Prussian Majesty was endeavouring to march round them, and cut off their Provisions, which come from Bohemia. In some late Skirmishes the Prussians have had the better; and it is said they have cut to Pieces two Austrian Regiments of Hussars, and taken the Equipage of General Nadafti.

Head Quarters at Rothenburg, August 28. His Royal Highness the Duke having received Advice on the 24th, that the Enemy had laid two Bridges, in the Night, over the Aller, and had passed the River with a large Body of Troops, ordered the Army to march to secure the important Post and Passage of Rothenburg, lest the Enemy might attempt to march round on his Left; and his Royal Highness encamped that Night at Ahausen, having detached Lieutenant General Oberg, with eight Battalions and six Squadrons, to Otterberg, and the next Day marched to this Place, and encamped behind the Wummer.

Whitehall, September 6, 1757.
