A Proclamation, prohibiting the Importation of Cordage and Cable Y arn from Forreign parts.

CHARLES R:

He Kingsmost Excellent Majesty being informed, that the Importing of Cordage and Cable Yarn, ready wrought, and Manufactured in Forreign parts, doth not only Indangeribe Lives and Ships of many of His Majefties Subjeels by reason the same C. rdage and Yarn, is for the most part deceitfully made, but doth allo tend to the great prejudice and impoveristment of the Rope makers of this His Realm, who for want of imployment, are reduced to great necelsity; His Majesty therefore for sheir better incouragement, and the prefervation of fo nleful an Artand Manufacture among His own Sub-jests, is Graci-ufly pleased by this His Royal Proclamation (with the advice of His Privy Council) strictly to Charge, Prohibit, and Command, That from the first day of May next, no Perfon or Perfons, Natives, Aliens, or others, do, or shall import, Bring, or Con-vey, or cause to be imported, Brought, or Conveyed, into the Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, or Port or Town of Berwick upon Tweed, from, or out of any part or place beyond the Seas, by way of Merchandize, or to be fold or exchanged, any Cordage or Cable-Yarn what oever, ready wrought, and made in parts beyond the Seas (other then fuch as shall be made in Russia, of the Hemp of the growth of that Countrey) upon piin of forfeiting all that by Law is Forfeitable, and fuch other puaishment as by the Law, or His Majestics Prevogative Royal, may be inflicted upon the Contemners of His Royal Authority. And His Majesty doth further Charge and Require the Commissi-oners of His Customs, Controllers, Searchers, and Officers of His Ports, and all other Persons whatsoever, 10 feize any Cordage or Tarn, that shall be Imported, Sold, or Exchanged, contrary to His Majefties plea. fure herein d-clared, and to be diligent and careful in the preventing the Importation of the Cordage and Tarn hereby Prohibited, and the discovery of the same, to the end the Offenders may be duly Punished; His Majesty also Commanding all Justices of the Peace, Mayors. Sheriffs, Bayliffs, Constables, and other Officers what fever, to be aiding and assisting in all things requifite for the observation and duc execution of this Hin Majeflies Royal Proclamation. Given at Our Court at Whitehal, the 20 day of February, 1674. in the Seven and twentieth year of Our Reign

Warfam, Feb. 25. We are told, that the King has received about a month fince, Letters from the Sieur Bogdan, who five years agone was fent from hence with the quality of Envoye to the Sophy of Perfia, in which he affures his Majefty, that the Sophy was marched into the Field with a great Army which encreafed every day very confiderably, and that he was peremptorily refolved to make War against the Turks. Dorofensko cannot yet be brought to fubmit himfelf to the King. Genona, March 7. By a Veffel come in here, we have advice, of the arrival of the Spanish Armada at Naples, after having been engaged fome Leagues from Messina, with feveral French Men of War, under the Command of Monsieur de Vivonne, who it feems, forced his way through them; and that Ten Men of War of the Armada were fitting out again to go to Sea. Another Vessel arrived from Palerina, gives us an account; that the Spanish Gallies are put into Melazzo, Trepany, and Lippary; that Monsieur de Vivonne, immediately after his arrival at Messina, had taken the Tour de Fare, where the Spaniards had erected a Fort, and planted 12 pieces of Cannon. The French have taken a Ship, bound hither from Sicily, laden with Salt, Honey, Fish, and some of the Prince de Ligne's Equipage.

Hamhnrg, March 11. We hear nothing farther of the Swedes, they continuing as formerly, their Quarters in the Elector of Brandenburgs Territories, without committing any hoftilities; The Prince D' Anhalt, his Electoral Highnefles Lieutenant-General, makes in the interim, all poffible provision for the defence of the places under his Government, in cafe they should be attacked by the Swedes.

Coblents, March 12. The French, we hear; have poffeffed themfelves of Brougfal, in the Bishoprick of spire, and confequently, belonging to the Elector of Mayence. From Strasburg they write, that that Ciry continues firm in the interests of the Emperor, that the Marquis de Vaubran hath been declared by the most Christian King, Governor of Bristack, and of the upper and lower Alsatia; and that the Marquis of Baden Dourlach, who is quartered with his Troops at Estimguen in Suabia, is ordered by the Dyet to return with them to Strasburg, to take care of the defence of the Bridge there. Six Brandenburg Regiments have taken their Quarters in the Circle of the Upper Saxony, to the great diffatisfaction of his Electoral Highnels of Saxony. The Circle of Franconia is obliged to pay 100 000 Crowns per month, to the Brandenburg Troops, to the great vexation of that Countrey. If is reported that the Bishop of Wirtsburg is lately dead but without any certainty.

but without any certainty. Strasburg, March 15. The French begin to march³ in Lorrain, towards Mompeillard, where is appointed the general Rendezvous. Monfieur de Turenne is expected there the beginning of the next month; In the mean time, vaft quantities of all forts of Provisions are laid up by the French in fuch places, as they judge moft convenient. Strong parties of 1000, and 800 Men each, come frequently from Burgundy, for the frengthening of Monfieur de Turenne's Army. The Garrifont of Philipsburg has made an incursion into the Bailage of Nemstads, belonging to the Elector Palatine, and hath done much mischief. The French demand Contributions of the Bishoprick of Spire, and have feized on Brougsal, in the faid Bishoprick, not far from Philipsburg, which they intend to fortify, for the greater fecurity of Philipsburg.

Cologne,

Colegae, March 15. From & ipstadt of the 12 inflant we have advice, that the Elector of Brandenburg arrived affere the day before, with her Electoral Highness, and his whole Court; and that he intended to part from thence again the 13, to be the 16 inflant at Gleves, where he will have a Conference with the Prince of Orange. This Diocefs having hitherto refused to pay the Contributions demanded by the French, they have proceeded to execution, having burnt certain Houfes in the Bailage of 10 spen. The Imperialifts pretend to erect a Magazine here, and to that end; are buying up great quantities of Corn, Ort.

Bruffels, March 15. His Excellency has fent the Marquis of Westerioo in great halte to the Prince of Orange, to defire his Highness to fend hither forthwich five or fix Regiments of Infan ry at the least, for the reinforcing our Garrifons; it being fo abfolutely necef-fary, that without them, all our Towns will be great-ly endangered. The Marelchal de Crequi is ftill about Charleroy, from whence he has fent a confiderable Convoy to Maestricht : His Army continues between the Sambre and the Meufe, without attempting any thing as yet, more then preparing for the approaching Campagne; and having an Eye, as we fuspect, to any fuccors that shall be fent to Cambray, and the Garrifons in Hainsult, which are all in equal danger, being unfurnished of Men, and by the erecting fuch a vaft Magazine at Charlesoy, we fear he may beliege Namur, to cut off all correspondence between that Province and Luxemburg. We are assured that the Duke of Enguyen is expected at Tournay, before the end of this month, and that the Prince of Conde will foon follow. Letters from Holland of the 12 inftant fay, that the Prince of Orange is making great preparations for the Campagne, and that he has given Orders to all Officers, to have their Companies and Troops in readinefs, by the 1 of April.

Ditt o, March 19. Our Letters from Madrid tell us, that the Queen and Council have ordered the late Viceroy of Sicily, together with the General, and Lieutenant-General of the Gallies, and the Admiral of the Flect, to be fent prifoners to 4 feveral Caffles, and that the Prince de Montefarchio fhould Command as General, both the Fleet and Gallies; that Don fuan was to go as Vicar-General of Italy, for the reducing of Mefizia, with Orders to attack it vigororfly by Land. The Governments of the three vacant Provinces here, were not then disposed of. We are told, more Moncys have been remitted hither by this Ordinary, for the better carrying on the preparations for the Campagne. The Prince de Croye, and the Count de Rocs, have lately quitted their Regiments, which have fince been Reformed. We hear from the Frontiers, that the French Troops are drawing down in great numbers, towards the Province of Artois, the whole Countrey being full of Soldiers from Amiens to Abbeville, and all that Countrey round, as well as on this fide towards Charle-107

Oftend, March 21. Our Letter from Holland fay, that the Prince of Orange will be in these Provinces the next month, and hold his Rendezvous about Aloft, in order to which, 30000 Rations of Corn are arrived at Antwerp from Holland, and as much more is faid to be shipped in fix great Vessels, to be laid up at. Ipres, where they intend to make a Magazine ; all the Soldiers that were at Bruges, except two Walloon Regiments are marched to Ipres, and in their rooms they expect a Garrifon of Hollanders.

Hague, March 9. Yeflerday towards evening, his Highnefs the Prince of Orange parted hence on his way to Clever, where the Elector of Brandenburg is fupposed to have been ever fince Saturday. His Highness intends to be back here by Monday next or sooner. After which, his Highness may in 14 or 15 days part towards Brabant, where his Army will Rendezvous. The Duke of Hanoucr. can, as we are told, by no means be perswated to'quit his Engagements with the Crown of Sweden, he declaring, that his only defigne is, to procure a general Feace, and the quiet of the Empire. The Danish Ambaffador continues to give this State great affurances of his Mafters good intentions; provided the Subfidies promifed, are puctually paid. On Saturday last, trial was made here of a new fort of Boats, they are of Tinn, and not above 665 pounds weight, yet big enough to carry 40 perfons, and are supposed to be very useful for the making of Bridg-

es, in order to the passage of Rivers. *Paris, March* 20. His Majefty has, its faid, déclared his re-folution of parting from hence the 24 of the next month to-wards Flanders. In the interim the Troops begin to march to the places aligned for their Rendezvous, and all things are preparing, in order to the opening of the Campagne. Here is an Envoye from the King of *Dermack*, who has had Au-dience of His Majefty, whom he affured, as is faid, of the refolution of the King his Mafter, not to engage himfelf in the refolution of the King his Mafter, but the second th
