A^T the Court at Kenfington, the 9th Day of August, 1757,

PRESĖŇT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July laft, For paying the respective Bounties therein menti-

oned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and allo to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer ; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty binnings of Every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Land-man, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen respectively, who fhall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last : And likewife, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who shall, on or before the faid Twenty Third Day of September next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

The King has been pleafed to conflict and appoint the Right Honourable George Lord Abergavenny to be Lieutenant and Cuftos Rotulorum of and in the County of Suffex.

A^T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 10th Day of September, 1757,

PRÈSENT,

The Lords of His Majefty's most Honourable Privy Council.

His Majefty having been pleafed to appoint the Right Honourable George Lord Abergavenny to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Suffex, his Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

From the Pruffian Head Quarters at Bernstadel, Aug. 21. On the 15th the (Pruffian) Army came in Sight of the Auftrian Camp, and within Cannon-Shot. So foon as they perceived us; they flruck their Tents, and drew up in Order of Battle at the Head of their Camp. The King formed his Army over-against them, and immediately went to reconnoitre the Ground between the Armies; but as it was then late, he deferred the more exact Examination of the Ground till next Day. The two Armies continued all Night under Arms.

On the 16th, at Day-Break, the King returned to reconnoitre the Situation of the Enemy with the utmost Exactness. He found them encamped with their Right at the River Neisse: The reft of their Army extended along a Height to a Mountain covered with Wood, which protected their Left. Before their Front, at the Foot of the Hill, on which they were drawn up, was a small Brook passable only in three different Places, and that for four or five Men a-breaft.

Towards the Left of the Auftrian Army, there was an Opening, where three or four Batallions might have marched in Front; but behind it they had placed three Lines of Infantry; and, on a Hill which flanked this Opening within Mufket-Shot, were placed 4000 Foot, with 40 or 50 Pieces of Cannon; fo that really this was the ftrongeft Part of their Camp.
