AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 9th Day of *August*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eighth of July last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty Third Day of September next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twenty Third Day of September

next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Dresden, Aug. 31.* On the 28th the Army which the King of Prussia brought out of *Lusatia*, came and encamped under the Walls of this Town, on the Right Side of the *Elbe*, near the Black and White Gates of the Town. His Majesty and Prince Henry lodged near the Black Gate, in a House belonging to a Valet de Chambre of Count *Bruhl*, the Prime Minister. Yesterday Afternoon his Majesty, at the Head of his Van Guard, consisting of eight Squadrons and six Batallions, passed over the River, and through this Town, followed by Prince Henry at the Head of the Infantry. The Van Guard encamped Yesterday Evening behind the *Ooster Weyde*, on the left Side of the *Elbe*, from whence both the King and Prince Henry marched this Morning, at Four o'Clock, taking the Road towards *Nossen*. This Morning likewise the whole Army, which laid before the New Town, is marched, and are passing through this Place, in order to encamp this Evening at the same Place which the King left this Morning. Prince Maurice's Corps came Yesterday from *Sedlitz*, and encamped in the Evening behind the Great Garden, close by the Heights of *Kesseldorff*, in order to join the King's Army. The Duke of *Bevern*, General *Winterfeld*, and his Royal Highness Prince Ferdinand of Prussia, remain in *Lusatia* with about 30000 Men, and are retired from *Bernstadt* to *Gorlitz*, in order to defend the Frontiers of *Silesia* on that Side: There is still a strong Prussian Garrison in *Budissin*, to consume the Provisions remaining there;

there; after which it is to join the Prince of Bevern's Army. Upon the King of Prussia's quitting Lufatia, the Austrian Army is retired back into Bohemia. It is however supposed, that General Nadaffi's Corps will be detached to Silesia, in which Case the Army under the Prince of Bevern will also go thither, or, at least, a Part of it. Marshal Keith is in this Town, and goes away with the Army Tomorrow to join the King.

*Turin, Aug. 31.* M. Chauvelin, the French Ambassador, returned here the 29th, after having accompanied the Infanta Dutchess of Parma to Pont Beauvoisin. Her Royal Highness has made very considerable Presents to all those who attended her. On the 21st of this Month the Court went into Mourning for the Death of the late Queen Dowager of Prussia. Orders have been given that it should last a Month.

*Cologne, Sept. 2.* The Emperor has sent a Rescript to each particular Member of the Circle, enjoining them, under Pain of Execution, to march their respective Contingents immediately, without waiting one for the other.

*Hague, Sept. 9.* Letters from Dresden have brought an Account of the King of Prussia's having passed through that Town with his Detachment on the 31st past, and that he is marching, directly by the great Post Roads, to Erfurth, leaving Leipzick on the Right Hand.
