P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 9th of April last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the 29th Day of October next — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time — His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said 29th Day of October next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition". — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, The Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of August last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Fifteenth Day of November next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Fifteenth Day of November next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Rome, August 20. A Criminal, who had murdered his Master at Milan, having taken Refuge in this City, was, a few Days ago, at the Request of the Government of Milan, arrested, and conducted by a Party of Bailiffs to the Confines of the Legation of Ferrara, there to be delivered to those sent from Milan, in order

order to be brought to Justice. The King of Naples, at the Request of the Grand Master of Malta, has approved the Choice of the Prior of that Cathedral, to succeed in the vacant Bishoptick of that Island. The Pope is so well recovered as to be able to go frequently out in a Chair to take the Air.

Rome, August 27. Sollicitations are continually made to the Pope to dispose of the vacant Hats in the College of Cardinals, to which he seems at present inclined.

Florence, August 27. On the 23d sailed from Leghorne four Maltese Gallies and two Xebecs, which, a few Days before, had anchored at that Port to provide themselves with Necessaries. His Britannick Majesty's Ships the Ambuscade and the Lyme are still at Leghorne; the former is to sail on Monday with the Trade to Gibraltar.

Florence, Sept. 3. On the 29th past sailed from Leghorne for Gibraltar His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Ambuscade, Capt. Gwynn, convoying the Trade for England. Sailed also from that Port His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Lyme for Genoa, to convey the English

Merchant Men from that Port to Leghorne. On the 30th past, at about Half an Hour after Two in the Morning, a severe Shock of an Earthquake was felt here, which though it alarmed People so much as to induce many to run into the Streets and open Places, yet did no Mischief: It was preceded for many Hours by a very high Wind, which ceased immediately after the Shock was over.

Turin, Sept. 7. On the 1st of this Month his Sardinian Majesty, accompanied by the Duke of Savoy and the Duke of Chablais, went to view the Fortifications of Coni, and to give Orders for the Addition of some Works upon the Mountains near the Fortrefs of Demont; the 5th the King of Sardinia and their Royal Highnesses returned to Turin. The Count St. Vitale, Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to the Infant Duke of Parma, had his Audiences Yesterday of the King of Sardinia, to thank his Majesty for all the Attentions shewn to the Infanta during her Journey: He was afterwards presented to the rest of the Royal Family, and returns back in a few Days to Parma.

Articles of Capitulation proposed by the Director and Council for the French East-India Company's Affairs at Chandernagore to Vice-Admiral Watson, with his Answers, 23d March, 1757.

ARTICLES of Capitulation for Fort D'Orlean of Chandernagore, proposed by Peter Renault, Esq; Director General, and the Gentlemen of the Council for the French East-India Company's Affairs, to Charles Watson, Esq; Vice-Admiral of the Blue Squadron of His Britannick Majesty's Fleet; and Commander in Chief of all His Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed in the East-Indies; and of the Marine Force of the United Company of Merchants trading to, and in these Parts.

ANSWERS made by Charles Watson, Esq; Vice-Admiral of the Blue Squadron of His Britannick Majesty's Fleet, and Commander in Chief of all His Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed in the East-Indies; and of the Marine Force of the United Company of Merchants trading to, and in these Parts, in the Name of His Britannick Majesty, to the Proposals made by the Governor and Council for the Affairs of the French Company at Chandernagore.

Article 1.

2. All the Officers of this Garrison shall be Prisoners on their Parole of Honour; that they shall have Liberty to carry with them all their Effects, and go where they please, on promising they will not serve against His Britannick Majesty during the present War.
3. The Soldiers of the Garrison shall be Prisoners of War, so long as the present War continues; and when Peace is made between the King of France and the King of England, they shall be sent to Pondicherry, and till then be entertained at the Expence of the English Company.
4. The Seapoys of the Garrison shall not be Prisoners of War, they shall have Leave on the contrary to return on the Coast in their Country.
5. The Officers and Men of the Company's European Ship St. Contest, shall be sent to Pondicherry in the first English Ship which goes to the Coast.

The Admiral likewise agrees with this Difference only, that instead of sending the Soldiers to Pondicherry, they shall be sent to Madras or to England, as the Admiral shall hereafter think proper; and that such Foreigners, who are not of the French Nation, and choose voluntarily to enter into the English Service, shall have Liberty.

5. The Officers and Men of the European Ship shall be upon the same Footing as the Soldiers, and to be sent to Madras or to England as soon as possible.

6. The French Jesuit Fathers shall have Liberty to exercise the Functions of their Religion in the House which has been assigned them, since the Demolishing of their Church: The Silver Ornaments, and every Thing that belongs to the Church, shall be given them, and also their Effects.
7. All the Inhabitants, of what Nation or Quality soever, as Europeans, Mustees, Christians, Blacks, Gentils, Moors and others, shall be put in Possession of their Houses, and all in general as shall be found belonging to them, either in the Fort, or on their Estates.
8. The Factories of Cassembuzar, Dacca, Patna, Jeuda, and of Ballasore, shall remain at the Command of the Chiefs who directs them.
9. The Director, Counsellors, and those employed under them, shall have Leave to go where they please, with their Cloths and Linen.
6. The Admiral cannot agree to any Europeans residing here, but that the French Jesuits may go to Pondicherry, with all the Ornaments of their Church, or where-ever they please.
7. In regard to this Article, to be left to the Admiral, who will do Justice.
8. To be settled between the Nabob and the Admiral.
