AT the Court at Kensington, the 20th Day of September, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of August last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Fifteenth Day of November next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Fifteenth Day of November next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Rome, Sept. 13. We have received an Account from Monte Pulciano, of a violent Hurricane that happened there last Week, by which several Houses, and a Convent of Nuns, were thrown down, under the Ruins of which many of the Nuns perished. The Pope, in Compliance with the frequent Solicitations from the

Court of Spain, to confirm many vacant Bishopricks and other considerable Benefices, which the King has already disposed of, has fixed a Conistory for the 19th Instant, for that Purpose. The Court of Rome has agreed with the Grand Master of Malta, for the Release of 159 Moors, who were taken lately by the Pope's Frigates and Gallies. On the 4th sailed from Civita Vecchia the Maltese Gallies on their Return to that Island.

Florence, Sept. 17. The Palace is getting ready for Marquis Botta with all Expedition, he being expected here towards the latter End of this Month; and Dispositions are also making to place the Chancery of the Imperial Fiefs of Italy in the Old Palace. For these three Posts successively we have been deprived of the English and Dutch Letters. Those from Germany had been retarded for a Week by the Overflowing of some Rivers, by which a great Tract of Land in the Venetian State was laid under Water; the City of Verona in particular has suffered considerably. Last Week died the Duke Salviati, Grand Veneur of Tuscany.

Hague, Oct. 4. On the 20th past Marshal Apraxin was at Tilsit with his Army, and had continued his March Homewards on the following Days. We hear that Marshal Richelieu entered the King of Prussia's Dominions with his Army on the 27th, 28th, and 29th past, in three Columns; upon which Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick has retired with his Detachment towards Magdebourg. We do not know any Thing further with Certainty about the King of Prussia's Army; though the Reports are, that that Prince intends to turn his Force towards Marshal Richelieu; and if the latter does not chuse to risk a Battle, at least to cover Magdebourg and Halberstadt, and prevent the French from taking Winter Quarters there.
