is likewife gone from Bon, to pay his refpects to his Eletoral Highneis. The Imperial Troops that are lodged on the other fide of the Rhine, continue in their Quarters; but those that are on this fide, have all orders to march towards the Meuse, to firengthen the Imperial Forces in the Countrey of Liege,

Antwerp, March 21. The great preparations of the French against the approaching Campagne continue still, and we are certainly informed that all the Troops in the French Conquests designed for the Field, have orders to be ready to march by the 15 of the next month; and that his Most Christian Majesty is expected there in perfon before the end of the fame month, fo that in all appearance these Countries will be made the seat of the War again this Summer. We expect several Regiments from Holland, in order to the Reinforcing our Frontier plaçes; and a confiderable quantity of Corn is already arrived here from thence, to be laid up for the ufe of the Armies at Ipres. The French are very defirous to fet the Countrey of Waes under Contribution, which hath hitherto escaped the ruines and defolations of the War, and not been difturbed by the Enemy. Laft night they came 1500 ftrong, having with them three small pieces of Cannon, to a place called Westeren, about half a league from this City, where by favor of certain Boats they found there, they paffed the Schelde; the Country People, who were on the Watch, were foon difperfed by them. They burnt a very fine Houfe, with feveral Barns and Out-houses belonging to it ; but understanding the whole Countrey was alarmed, and begun to rife, they retired again : fo, that 600 Men that were fent, out from hence, to join the Countrey People, came not till the Enemy was gone.

Hague, March 22. The 16 instant, the Deputies of the Provinces of Gelderland and Overyffel, were introduced into the Affembly of the states General, and took their places there as formerly, for the first time fince their return into the Union. The 16 of the next month is appointed to be a General Thankfgiving-day, for that it hath pleafed God to reftore the state, after feverakot its Members had been violently torn from it, to its former Union. Two days fince was finished the state of the War for this next 'ummer, which 'tis not doubtea but theProvince of Holland will readily agree to, though the Provinces of Gelderland, Overyffel and Utrocht, may, it is likely, make fome difficulty in it; and the Deputies of the latter here, have already declared by order of their principals, that they are no way in a condition to furnish the part that is affigned them by the faid flate of the The States of Holland are at present affembled, War. at the opening of their Seffion the Raedt Pentionaris acquainted them, that his Highnels being informed of feveral Corruptions that were practifed in the obtaining of the Magiffracy in the respective Towns, defired an Oath may for the future be taken by all perfons upon their entring into the Magistracy, that they have neither given nor promifed any monies for the obtaining of

Ditto. The fix Regiments that this State has promifed to fend to the affiftance of the Spanift Netherlands, are already on their march towards Brabant, whither (it is thought) his Highnefs will, prefeurly after his return from Gleves, follow with the reft of his Troops, who have orders to be ready to march by the first of the next month. The Deputies of the Admiratties have finally refolved to fit out 40 Men of War, greateft part of which are defigned to be employed in the Baltique, under the Command of Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter; and the reft in the Mediterranean, under Monfieur Van Tromp; thefe fhips will be fitted out with fo much diligence, that, it is thought, they will be ready to go to Sea about the latter end of the next month. The Danifh Ambaffador continues (as we are told) to affure this State, that the King his Mafter will make good the obligation of the Treaty between them, when ever he fhall be called upon by the Allies, provided that the monies flipulated be punctually paid. And from Stockholme they writes that orders were given to all Merchant fhips outward bound, to be careful how they put into any Port of Denmark, and this State. His Highnefs will be back here from Cleve on Sunday or Monday next as fartheft.

Paris, March 23. His Majefty of Great Britain having, as Mediator, by his Amba...ador here fignified to the Moit Christian King, that the States General and their Allies had agreed to Nimegaen for the place of Treaty, his Moit Christian Majefty, after having cauled the matter to be communicated to the Baroit Spar., Ambafiador Extraordinary at this Cowit from the Crown of Sneden, has declared his acceptance of the faid place of Nimegaen, and his readincis to fend his Ambafiadors thither jointly with thole of the King of Aneden his Allie, in order to the beginning the Negotiation there : However, that his Majefty first expects fatisfaction in she preliminary points in queftion between his Majefty and the Emperor, viz. That Prince William of Fauftenburgh be put into the hands of fome.Neutral Prince till the Conclusion of the Peace, and that the Monies feized at Cologne be reftored.
