AT the Court at *Kensington*, the 20th Day of *September*, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of August last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Fifteenth Day of November next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Fifteenth Day of November next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Copy of a Letter from Mr. Secretary Pitt to Sir Edward Hawke, and to Sir John Mordaunt, dated *Whitehall*, September 15, 1757, dispatched by the *Viper Sloop*, and received by them on board the *Ramilies* the 22d Day of September.

Sir,

**H**IS Majesty, by His Secret Instructions, dated the 5th Day of August last, having directed the Return of the Fleet under your Command, together with the Land Forces on board, "so as to be in England at, or about, as near as may be, the End of September, unless the Circumstances of the Ships and Forces, shall necessarily require their Return sooner;" I am now to signify to you the King's Pleasure, that you do not consider the abovementioned Time, limited for your Return, as intended, in any Manner, to affect, or interfere with the full Execution of the first and principal Object of the Expedition; namely, "Attempting, as far as shall be found practicable, a Descent on the French Coast, at or near Rochefort, in order to attack, if practicable, and, by a vigorous Impression, force that Place, and to burn and destroy, to the utmost of your Power, all Shipping, Docks, Magazines, and Arsenals, that shall be found there, and exert such other Efforts, as shall be judged most proper for annoying the Enemy." And with Regard to any other particular Attempt, which, agreeably to your Orders, you shall have commenced, and in the Execution whereof you shall be actually engaged, It is also His Majesty's Pleasure, that you do not desist from, or break up the same, merely and solely on Account of the Time, limited for your Return, by the Instructions abovementioned; but that, notwithstanding the same, you do continue, with the Fleet, during such a farther Number of Days, as may afford a competent Time, for the Completion of any Operation under the above Circumstances; After which you are to take Care to return, with the Fleet under your Command, and the Forces on board, in the Manner directed by your former Instructions.

*Berlin, October 4.* According to the last Letters from the King's Army, his Majesty, after having waited in vain fifteen Days in the Neighbourhood of Erfurth for the Army of the Empire, and that of France, and not judging it proper to attack two Armies of such superior Force, in their Entrenchments, has marched towards Naumbourg, and, on the 2d Instant, fixed his Head Quarters at Buttelstadt. The Russian Army still continues to file off by Tilsit, towards the Frontiers. The Corps under the Command of General Fermor, had passed the Memel on the 26th of September, and the rest of the Columns were preparing to pass it on four Bridges. All the rest of Prussia is entirely evacuated. Our Army has still 12,000 Bushels of Meal at Gumbinnen. According to the Letters of the 30th of September, the Russians have entirely passed the Memel. They abandoned Tilsit the 27th, and our Army entered it on the 29th. The Fort of Penamunde in Pomerania surrendered to the Swedes on the 23d of September, after having defended itself for nine Days. The Garrison, consisting of 171 Men of the Militia, were made Prisoners of War. There has been a brisk Cannonade between the two Armies in Silesia, on the 26th, near the Village of Parchwitz. Our Loss thereby amounts to 100 Men, that of the Enemy is considerably more.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that some Weeks since, a Libel was pasted up, in a very publick Place in the City of Edinburgh, falsely accusing the Magistrates, and some of the principal Dealers in Grain, in that City, as guilty of Male-Practices in relation to the Prices of Grain, and inviting the Mob to rise and murder them all; and that many incendiary and seditious Letters have, since, been sent to the Magistrates and Dealers, and some of the other Inhabitants of the said City; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons who wrote the Libel, and Letters above-mentioned, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of his or their Accomplices in the said Facts, who shall discover him or them, the Authors or Writers of the said Libel and Letters, so that he, or they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and likewise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to the Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery; to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Persons guilty of the said Crimes.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That on Wednesday the Fifth Day of this Instant October, the Wind-Mill belonging to the Right Honourable the Earl of Hardwicke, situate upon Orwell-Hill, in the Parish of Halton in the County of Cambridge, was burnt down; The Fire beginning, (as it is apprehended) between Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Evening, and the Whole having been consumed

in about four Hours; and that there are strong Grounds of Suspicion that the said Mill was wilfully set on Fire by some evil-disposed and wicked Persons: His Majesty, to the End that such audacious and heinous Crimes may be discovered and punished with the utmost Rigour of Law, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the Offenders concerned in burning the said Mill, or any of their Accomplices, who shall first discover, and give Information against, any other of the said Offenders, so as he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement, the said Earl of Hardwicke hereby promises to pay to such Discoverer as aforesaid, the Sum of One Hundred Pounds as a Reward, upon the Conviction of any of the said Offenders.
