

*Berlin, October 4.* According to the last Letters from the King's Army, his Majesty, after having waited in vain fifteen Days in the Neighbourhood of Erfurth for the Army of the Empire, and that of France, and not judging it proper to attack two Armies of such superior Force, in their Entrenchments, has marched towards Naumbourg, and, on the 2d Instant, fixed his Head Quarters at Buttelstadt. The Russian Army still continues to file off by Tilsit, towards the Frontiers. The Corps under the Command of General Fermor, had passed the Memel on the 26th of September, and the rest of the Columns were preparing to pass it on four Bridges. All the rest of Prussia is entirely evacuated. Our Army has still 12,000 Bushels of Meal at Gumbinnen. According to the Letters of the 30th of September, the Russians have entirely passed the Memel. They abandoned Tilsit the 27th, and our Army entered it on the 29th. The Fort of Penamunde in Pomerania surrendered to the Swedes on the 23d of September, after having defended itself for nine Days. The Garrison, consisting of 171 Men of the Militia, were made Prisoners of War. There has been a brisk Cannonade between the two Armies in Silesia, on the 26th, near the Village of Parchwitz. Our Loss thereby amounts to 100 Men, that of the Enemy is considerably more.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that some Weeks since, a Libel was pasted up, in a very publick Place in the City of Edinburgh, falsely accusing the Magistrates, and some of the principal Dealers in Grain, in that City, as guilty of Male-Practices in relation to the Prices of Grain, and inviting the Mob to rise and murder them all; and that many incendiary and seditious Letters have, since, been sent to the Magistrates and Dealers, and some of the other Inhabitants of the said City; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons who wrote the Libel, and Letters above-mentioned, is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of his or their Accomplices in the said Facts, who shall discover him or them, the Authors or Writers of the said Libel and Letters, so that he, or they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and likewise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to the Person or Persons who shall make such Discovery; to be paid by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of one or more of the Persons guilty of the said Crimes.
