The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament affembled.

Moft Gracious Sovereign,

JE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in Parliament affembled, beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that the fame invariable Sentiments of Duty and Affection which have influenced all our former Proceedings, will be fleadily directed, to promote the Honour of your Majefty's Government, and the Safety and Profperity of this Kingdom.

We cannot too ftrongly express the feeling Senfe we have of the prefent critical Juncture of Affairs, occafioned by the War in which your Majefty is neceffarily engaged, to defend the Rights of your Crown, and to protect the Commerce of your Subjects.

The unnatural Conjunction of these Powers with whom your Majefty is to contand, mult bring the Danger, to which we are exposed, fo much the nearer to our View, as to make us exert our utmost Ende vours to maintain Tranquillity at Home, and defeat any Attempt which the Enemies of our Prace may intend against us.

The free Enjoyment we have had of all our Religious and Civil Rights and Liberties, fince the Acceffion of your Majefty's mon Illustrious Houle, cannot fail of making the deepeft Impreflion on our Minds; and your Majefty's having appointed his Grace the Duke of Bedford to the Government of this Kingdom, at this important Crifis, affords us the most convincing Proof of the Continuance of that paternal Care and Tenderness, always shewn to your Majesty's faithful Subjects of this Kingdom.

When fuch formidable Defigns are layed to deprive us of all our constitutional Rights and Liberties, both Civil and Religious, it must raife the greatest Confidence, as well as the warmest Returns of Gratitude and Loyalty, in every truly Protestant Breast, to know, that they are committed, by your Majesty's great Wildom and Goodness, to the Care of a Governor fo eminently diftinguished by his high Birth, great Abilities, inherent Worth, and known Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon and Family, and descended from an Ancestor so univerfally and juftly beloved when living, and fo glorious in his Death, for endeavouring to fecure those invaluable Bleffings to us.

We are fully affured of your Majefty's Readirefs to confent to fuch Laws as may conduce to the Welfare of this Kingdom, which will encourage us to confider the State of the Charter Schools, fo wifely calculated to ftrengthen the Protestant Interest; and to think of the most proper Means of extending that most valuable Branch of our Trade the Linen Manufacture; the Care of our Tillage alfo, hitherto fo fatally neglected, is an Object of the moft interefting Nature, and cannot but engage us to apply ourfelves, in the most ferious Manner, to take such

Steps as may prevent the Calamities which are the neceffary Confequence of a Want of Corn, fo often feverely felt by this Kingdom : And we cannot omit taking this Opportunity of affuring your Majesty, that we shall most chearfully em-brace every Occasion of approving ourselves worthy the Continuance of your Majesty's Royal Favour and Protection.

We return our most humble Thanks to your Majesty, who, notwithstanding the heavy Expence of the prefent just and necessary War, has fuch Attention to the Circumstances and Condition of this Nation, as to afk only the ufual Supplies : And we do affure your Majefty we fhall, with the greatest Chearfulness, grant such Supplies as shall be necessary for the Support of your Majefty's Government of this Kingdom.

Having at all Times abundant Experience of your Majefty's Wildom and paternal Affection, and your gracious Disposition to approve whatever may conduce to the Profperity of this Kingdom, when the Senfe of your People is laid before your Majesty; we shall endeavour to frame fuch Laws for the Royal Affent, as may most effectually support and strengthen the Protestant Interest, and promote the Welfare of this Na-And we will confider the State of the tion. Charter-Schools, and what may be further done to promote their good Defign. And our most ferious Attention shall be given to the Improvement and Extention of the Linen Manufacture,



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
