AT the Court at Kensington, the 20th Day of September, 1757,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of August last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, is near expiring: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Fifteenth Day of November next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January last: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Fifteenth Day of November next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Rome, Sept. 24. One Hundred and Forty-nine Moors, who were lately sold to the Order of Malta, were embarked a few Days ago at Civita Vecchia for that Island. On the 19th Instant, circular Intimations were given for the Consistory, which the Pope has fixed for the 26th Instant, in order to dispatch many Ecclesiastical Affairs, that have been suspended on Account of his Illness.

Florence, Oct. 1. On the 23d a Battalion of the First Tuscan Regiment arrived here from Leghorn, to reinforce this Garrison. On the 24th anchored at Leghorne from Cagliari, his Britannick Majesty's Ships the Guernsey and Lyme, convoying from thence four French Prizes, viz. two from the Levant, (one of which, from Alexandretta; is said to be worth about 25000l.) and two from Marseilles, which Admiral Osborn's Squadron took; a few Weeks ago, near the Island of Sardinia.

Hague, Oct. 21. We know little of the Operations of the Armies, which still keep the Field. The Accounts we have, are, that the French make no Progress, and seem very eager to get into Winter Quarters, if the King of Prussia will let them; but that that Prince had made some Motions within these few Days, in order to surprize the Prince of Soubize, in which he was very near succeeding, having got to Erfurth again. In Silesia, the Austrians, who are advanced near Breslau, pretend that they will attack the Prince of Bevern between the Oder and the Lob; but there is a Report as if they had been repulsed, which gains the more Credit, as the last Accounts from Vienna and Brussels are very dry upon the Subject. It seems agreed on all Sides, that if Prince Charles does not succeed in forcing the Prince of Bevern to abandon the Capital of Silesia, they, on their Side, will be under a Necessity of abandoning the Province for Want of Subsistence.
