The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS upon Intelligence being received, that the Plague was broke out, at Lisbon, the Right Honour-able William Pitt, Esq; one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, in order to prevent the Infection being brought into thefe Kingdoms, by the Arrival of any Pacquet Boats from thence, iffued an Order to the Poftmafters General, directing, amongst other Things, that in Cafe any Pacquet Boat should arrive at Falmouth from Lifbon, no Mail, Letter, Perfon, or Thing, of any Kind whatfoever, fhould be permitted to come, or be fent on fhore till further Orders; but before the faid Order could reach Falmouth, a Lisbon Pacquet arrived at that Port, and landed her Mail, which was brought up from thence to Staines, where it was flopped and properly featred. -- And whereas His Majefty was pleafed, by His Or-der in Council of the 28th of this Inftant, to direct, That one of His Majefty's Principal Se-, cretaries of State should forthwith islue an Order to the Poftmasters General, directing them to take the faid Mail immediately under their Charge, and to caufe the fame to be opened, and the Letters contained therein to be inspected, effectual Care being first taken to burify the faid Letters, by fuch proper Methods as are ufually practifed here or in other Countries; and that the faid Mail should remain, at Staines, and not be brought forward until it thould have undergone the Purifications as aforefaid: And that after the faid Poftmasters should have inspected the faid Mail, they were thereby required to report to His Majesty's most Ho-nourable Privy Council the State of Health at Lifbon, as it should appear to them, upon such Infpection, to have been at the Time of the Writing of the faid Letters, in order to receive fuch further Directions, as His Majefty in Council should judge proper, with regard to the isluing and delivering of the faid Letters, as well as with Regard to the Admiffion of any other Things brought on Board the faid Pacquet. And whereas in Pursuance of the aforesaid Order in Council, the faid Postmasters General have this Day reported, That they have caufed the faid Mail to be opened at Staines, and the Letters therein to be inspected, after having first taken

AT the Court at Kenfington, the 31ft Day from the Mafter of the Pacquet Boat, who had this Mail in Charge, they do not find the leaft Notice taken of any Plague, or any Suspicion of a Contagious Diftemper being at Lifbon at the Time this Pacquet was dispatched from thence, and therefore the faid Postmasters General defire to receive fuch further Directions as His Majesty in Council shall judge proper to give with regard to the Iffuing and Delivery of the Letters, as well as with regard to the Ad-miffion of any other Things brought on Board the faid Pacquet.——His Majefty taking the faid Report into His Royal Confideration, is pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the Right Honourable William Pitt, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do iffue an Order to the Poftmasters General, to cause all the Letters contained in the faid Mail to be forthwith iffued and delivered. ——And that with regard to all fuct Orders as have been iffued for the Stopping of the faid Pacquet or Mail, or of any Ships or Veffels from Lifbon----His Majefty is further pleafed to order, That the fame be, and they are hereby revoked and difch .rged. And the Right Honourable the Lords Cammiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, The Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, The Lord Commiffioners of the Admiralty, The Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, The Mafter Ge-neral of the Ordnance, and His Majefty's Sccretary at War, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

> HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of August last, For paying the respective Bounties therein men-

tioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majefty's Royal Navy; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons difcovering Seamen who should conceal themfelves, is near expiring : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer ; fuch effectual Care to purify the Letters, as to them appeared most adviseable for that Purpose : And that by the best Information they are able to procure from the Infpection of the faid Let-ters, as also from those they have received from their Agents at Lisbon and Falmouth, as well as there is the continue to be part for tome is more infigure ; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Thirty
