Naples, February 26. He 16 spanish Men of War that were forced to retire hither, after having been engaged the 11 instanç, against Monsseur de Ebvonne and the ships under his Command, have put all their fick and wounded Men ashore here, which make up a very confiderable number; to foon as they are Re-fitted, and in a condition again to put to Sea, we are rold, they will Sail towards Sacily; and attempt once more to block up Messina by Sea, and we chope with better specess than hitherto they have had. Our Viceroy is not a little troubled to fee things go fo Ill; for before the arrival of Monfieur de Vivonne at Meffina, the Spaniards feemed to have some reason to promise themselves a good and speedy conclusion of that great work, which now is like to cost them yet much time and pains. We have advice of the arrival of two Veffels at, Gaette in Sfeily, having Transported a German Regimenrahither from Final, being commanded by the Come de Buquoy. The Royalists, we hear, have been obliged to quit the Tour de Fare of Messina, and to retire to the Scaletta, on pretence, that the Fortifications they intended to make there, were not finished.

Madrid, March 2. The Mestre de Camp General of the Forces of this Crown in Catalonia, is together with some other of the principal Officers, on his way hither, to give her Majesty an account of the posture of things in those Parts, and to take her Commands concerning the next Campagne. It is faid that the French in Roufillon have been already recruited with 4000 Foot, and 800 Horse; and that they will be in a condition to take the Field the latter end of the next month for the beginming of the following: Three hundred thousand Crowns are ordered to be fent for the use of the Fleet in Sivily and the half of that Sum bath two days fince been reminer by Bills of Exchange, to the Marquels of Villa France Viceroy of Sicily. In the mean time feveral Men of War are fitting out at Gad 2, and will (as is faid) be ready to Sail about the middle of the next month, for the Reinforcement of the faid Fleet. From Gadiz they write, that by certain Veffels put in there, they had news of the death of the Marquels de Melagom Vice-roy of Peru; and brother to the Duke d. Albuquerque.

Cologne, March 19. The Elector of Brandenburgh has, as we understand, in his passage rowards Gleves, been visited by the Bishop of Muniter. The 17, his Electoral Highnels arrived at Wefel, and the next day intended to continue his journey to Cleves, whither the Marquel's de Grana is likewife gone from Bon. The French Troops which affembled about Maestricht, and very much alarmed the Imperialift's quartered in Liege, being difperled again, or at least giving the Imperiatiffs no farther apprehension of any design upon them. From the Palatinate they write; that the Elector Palatine had by way of prevention feized on a small place, though of great importance, called Gernsheim; and scituate on the Rhine, having had notice that the French designed to have gotten it into their hands; at which the Elector of Mayence, to whom it belongs is however not very well pleafed.

Brussels, March 22. The five Regiments designed to come hither from Holland for the Reinforcement of several of our Garisons, are actually on their march, one of them, is the Count de Horne's Regiment of Marine, confissing in 2000 Men. Several Colonels in the service of thele Countries, have of late quitted their Regiments, which his Excellency has refolved to reform, in order to the recruiting the other Troops. It is expected that the Prince of Orange will now very fiddenly affign the Rendezvous of his Army somewhere in Brabant, to which it is faid our Forces are to join, and fo to act under the conduct of his Highness, for the security of these Proin their preparations, which are for great, that according to the general report, they will be stronger this Cam-pagne, than they have been during this War. People here are much concerned to heart of the distrace the Spapilb. Armada suffered from Monsieur de Vivonne, who forced his way through them, and entred Messina, to the great prejudice of the affairs of the Crown of spain in thole parts.
