

Having with certain Troops passed the River *Tesse*, had surprized 300 Rebels in a Wood, killed 80 of them upon the place, and taken many of the rest Prisoners, with the famous Rebel *Fergatz*, who commanded them. General *Cope* who commands the Imperial Forces in *Silesia*, has by an Express sent advice hither, that 3000 *Suedes* are marched towards the Dutchy of *Crossen*, which belongs to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and is under the Emperors protection.

Hamburg, March 18. We have not any thing new from *Pomeran*. The three Dukes of *Brunswick* and *Lunenburgh*, have for several days been together at *Zell*, where great endeavors have been used to bring the Duke of *Hanover* to leave the Engagements he at present has, though, as we understand, without any success. It is said, that the Bishop of *Osnabrig*, who is the younger Brother, will go into the Field this Summer, and head the *Lunenburgh* Troops; the Duke of *Zell* resolving to remain at home, to observe the motions of the *Suedes*. The Crown of *Denmark* hitherto gives the *Suedes* all assurances of friendship and amity, while the Allies on the other side seem confident, it will suddenly declare for them.

Strasburgh, March 18. The Governor of *Rhinfelden* having resolved to attack the Fort of *Hunningen*, possessed by the *French*, and situate about a quarter of a League from *Basse*, he two days since embarked several Companies of Foot in Boats prepared for that purpose, who passed down the *Rhine*, and being come near the said Fort went ashore, with thoughts to have surprized the *French*; but they were better upon their guard than was expected, and so warmly received the *Imperialists*, that they were forced to quit their design, and return home. The Bishop of *Basse* is however much offended at it, for that to the prejudice of his Neutrality, the *Imperialists* passed through his Territories; and the *French* report, that they intend very suddenly to return the Visit to the whole of *Rhinfelden*. Several *French* Troops arrive continually in *Alsacia* from *Burgundy* and *Lorraine*, and it is said, they will form a Body of an Army to pass the *Rhine* at *Brissac*, and act on that side. The *Confederate* Troops do not yet move out of their Winter quarters, so that we have great reason to fear, it will be late ere they come into the Field; and that the *French* will have all the beginning of the Summer, to do what they please without the least opposition.

Cologne, March 22. On Tuesday last, 300 *Imperial* Horse, who came from the Frontiers of *Westphalia*, where they had had their Quarters, passed the *Rhine* here, and marched towards the *Meuse*, whither it is thought the rest will likewise follow. From *Francfort* of the 20 instant they write, That Colonel *Gallas*, who with his *Imperial* Regiment is Quartered in the Neighborhood of that City, had demanded a very large Sum of money of the Magistrates thereof, threatening that upon refusal, he would burn several Villages belonging to the Town. Monsieur *Fazio* has summoned the Members of this Diocess to repair within eight days to *Alpen*, where he has his Quarters, and to bring the Contributions demanded with them; for that otherwise he will proceed to execution.

Liege, March 23. The *French* continue to demolish *Mascyk*, which it is said they would not do, if they could be assured the Allies would not possess themselves afterwards of the place, and make use of it against them. Several great Convoys have lately arrived at *Maestricht*, so that they are there sufficiently provided with all kind of stores. From *Charleroy* they write, that great provision is likewise made there for the Army, which, it's

believed, will come and encamp where it did the last year between *Pietron* and *Fontaine l'Evesque*. The *Spaniards* at *Namur*, and in the Province of *Luxemburg*, are putting themselves into a posture of defence, apprehending the *French* will ere long be at their doors. The Baggage of the Cardinal of *Baden*, which was lately taken by the *French*, for that a great quantity of Arms was found packed up amongst other things, and carried to *Maestricht*, hath, as we hear, been sold there, and the money distributed amongst the Soldiers of that Garrison.

Brussels, March 26. The weather being very fair here, even beyond what is usual at this season, will, we fear, hasten the *French* into the Campaign, for which they make vast preparations. It is very much feared that we shall ere long hear they have besieged *Namur*, which place having made themselves Masters of, they may with greater ease execute the design its thought they have, to rid the Diocess of *Liege* of the *Imperialists*, and then to reduce the Country of *Luxemburg*; to prevent which, our Governour, the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, has sent to desire the Prince of *Lorraine*, who at present commands the *Imperial* Forces quartered in the Diocess of *Cologne*, to send 3 or 4000 Men to the assistance of Monsieur de *Louwiguy*, who has the Government of *Luxemburg pro interim*, for that it is impossible for his Excellency to send him any Succors from hence. It is thought the Prince of *Orange* will presently after his return from *Cleves*, begin to assemble his Troops, and that he will be in the Field as early as the *French*, but that will do but little good, unless the other *Confederates* that are to join with him are likewise so. The Forces of these Countries, which his Excellency is now going to recruit, will hardly be in a posture to go into the Field, till the middle or the latter end of *June*; but in the mean time care will be taken to supply all our Frontier places with sufficient Garrisons.
