The Commissioners of His Majest's Customs, in order to bring the Ossenders to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to such illegal, violent, and outragious Proceedings, do hereby promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall swith or any or either of them, so that they may be dealt with according to Law, to be paid by the Receiver General of His Majesty's Customs, on Conviction of each of the Said Offenders

And any of the Persons who were concerned in the Rescue of the Geods asoresaid, who shall, within three Months after Such Offence, discover two or more of their Accomplices, so as they be convicted thereof, will be intitled to a Reward of Fifty Pounds; and every such Person so discovering, will be clearly acquitted and discharged of his Offence aforesaid, by the Act of

the 9th of His present Majesty.
