fent state of affairs in these Countreys will permit; Oth new Maistre de Camp General, Don Hieronimo de Quignones, is expected here with much impatience, his Excellency desiring greatly to have his advice in several matters relating to the War, which ought to be dispatched forthwith. We do not yet hear, that the Prince of Orange is returned to the Hague, from his Conference with the Elector of Brandenburg at Cleves. It is much disputed how the Forces of the several fallice will act this Summer, whether joyntly or separately. From Viena they write, that the Imperial Army will act by it self, under the sole Conduct of the Count de Monzetuculi, who has obtained of the Emperor, all he demanded concerning his said Com mand.

Ditto, April 2. The Chapter of Liege, has, as we are rold, sent to the Prince of Orange, to the Imperial Generals at Bonne, and to our Governor for affistance, in order to the obliging the French, to quit again the Cittadel there; and we are told that the Spanish Troops, that are quartered in Luxemburg, and the Imperialifts in the Diocess of Liege, begin to march, and that the Prince of Orange will likewife fend several Troops to joyn with them. On the other fide, the French also draw their Forces together, to oppose the Confederates, so that 'we may suddainly expect to hear of some action, and the rather, for that the Matter in question, viz. Whether the French shall be possessed of the Castle of Liegeor not, may deserve it. Another great Convoy is lately arrived at Charleroy, and at Acth we hear, the French are gathering a Body of an Army. Our last Letters from .Madrid, tell us of the arrival of the Count de Monte-.rey: That Count Egmont has been declared General of the Forreign Cavalry; and the Prince de Vaude-ment, Admiral of these Countreys. Don Pedro de Ronquillos, who is going in qualicy of Envoye Extraordinary for England, on the part of the Crown of Spain, is fill here, expecting his final Instructions from Madrid.

Hague, March 29. This morning his Highness returned hither from Cleves, where he arrived the 20 in . stant, and after having had feveral Conferences with the Elector of Brandenburg, parted again the 23. It is re-ported, that his Electoral Highness will make a turn hither, so soon as he is in a condition to travel, being at present indisposed of the Gout. On Monday last the Heer Wicquefort, Resident here for the Dukes of Lunenburg, though, as is faid, a subject of this State, and at pretent, actually in its fervice, was arrested, and committed to prison, for having held correspondences, greatly to the prejudice of this State and its Allies. The 27 instant the Deputies of the several Admiralties held their last conference, at which, the Lieutenant-Admiral de Ruyter was present, for the regulating the matter of the Equipage for Sea this Summer; They have resolved, that the Squadron of Men of War defigned for the Baltique, under the Command of the Sieur de Ruyter, shall consilt of 12 large Men of War, of the first ranks, and 12 Fregats, belides Fireships and Ga-

Ditto, April 2. We are here extreamly troubled, at the news we receive of the French having made thems felves Masters of the Cittadel of Liege, by means of the correspondence they held with the Governor thereof, which is a great blow, and of infinite ill consequence to the affairs of the Allies; though we seem to flatter our selves with the hopes of getting it again out of their hands; for it is said, that the Imperial Troops quartered in that Diocess, do already begin to draw together; that some Forces will be forthwith sent from hence, to joyn with them, and that they, together with

the affistance of the Inhabitants of the City of Liege, who encline for the Emperor, will endeavor to force the Enemy to furrender it again into the possession of the Liegois. It is confidently faid, that the Electproof Brandenburg will make a step hither incegnito, in order to the holding a farther Conference, for the concluding feveral Matters, which were left unfinished at Cleves, because the Emperors mind in them was wanting, which has been fince communicated: and the Marquis de Grana, who arrived here this day, will affift at this Conference on the part of the Emperor. The States of Holland have made a Declaration in their Affembly, Copies of which they have ordered to be given to all the publick Ministers here, containing the reasons that have obliged them to imprison the Heer Wiequefort, and farther to proceed against him, as being their natural born, Subject, and at this present, in their actual pay, oc. His Highness has for a day or two been indisposed, and obliged to keep his Chamber ? but is at present much better, and yesterday his Highness gave publick Audience to the several Forreig Ministers. From Liege they write, that that City was in great disorder and confusion, that the Inhabitant shutting up their Shops and Houses, were continually in Arms, that feweral who declared for the French had been killed and that a Meffage had been fent from the Magistrates to the French in the Cittadel, to pray them to retire again, and that if they thought good. they should demolish it, but that they could not suffer they should continue in it.

Paris, April 3. The good news we have of late received from feveral parts, makes us promife our felves all fuecess this next Campagne, which will now be begun very suddainly; Frem Sicily we have daily an account of considerable advantage obtained by the Messingles, through the affistance of our Troots, over the Spaniards, who have been sorted to quit St. Placido, and the Scaletia, the two most considerable Poststhey posteride about Messina, where they had laid up great stores of all kind of Provision; besides which, the Duke de Vivonnie has made a Descent in Calabria, and by that means, amongst other purchase, taken great quantities of Provisions; and farther, to add to all these successes, we have advice that Canana and Trepany in Sicily, have likewise revolted. On the other side, our affairs in these parts, advance likewise much to our latissaction: and vesterday we had news of the Count d'Estrades, Governor of Massprich, having rendered himself Masser o the Castle of Lies, and put 3500 Men in it, though we hear it has occasioned some disturbance amongs the Inhabitants of the City. It is said that Orders have been sent sent massfricht, to secure the said Cittadel in our hands.
