## PRESENT,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council, of the Ninth of November laft, For paying the respective Bounties there-

in mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themfelves in His Majesty's Royal Navy ; and likewife for paying the Rewards to Perfons discovering Seamen who should conceal themfelves, will expire upon the Fourteenth Day of this Inftant January : And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majefty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, fhould be continued to be paid for fome Time longer ; His Majefty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to fuch Seamen and Landmen refpectively, who shall, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, enter themfelves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majefty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewife, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Perfons who fhall, on or before the faid Twenty-eighth Day of February next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themfelves, fo as fuch Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themfelves accordingly.

Extracts of two Letters from Vice Admiral Cotes, Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships at Jamaica, to Mr. Clevland, dated the 5th and 31ft of December, 1757.

and 31/f of December, 1757. The 20th of November His Majefty's Ship Affiltance chafed a French Privateer of 18 Guns, and a Schooner Privateer with a Prize, into Tiberoon Bay, on the Weft End of Hifpaniola, where the French had a Battery of five Guns. The Veffels hauled clofe to the Shore, under Cover of the Battery; but it falling calm, Captain Weller was obliged to tow in with his Boats. The 21ft he burnt the Snow and Schooner, funk the Prize, and difmounted all the Guns on the Shore. He had two Men killed in the Action, and his Mafts and Rigging much damaged. The Privateer Snow was late the Duke Pacquet, taken in January laft, commanded by one Palanqui, who has done great Prejudice to our Trade in this and the late War.

The 24th of November the Prince's Mary returned from cruizing off Monto Christi, and brought in a Dutch Ship loaded with Sugar, Coffee, and Indigo, one of the Fleet that failed from Cape François under Convoy of the French Ships on the 13th of November. It appears by the Confession of her Men, that the carried out from Holland to Cape François, Cannon, Powder, Shot, and other Military Stores, and was returning freighted with their Produce. I have ordered her to be tried in the Admiralty Court.

I failed from Port Royal the 6th of December with His Majefty's Ships the Augusta and Princess Mary. The 13th I made the Augusta's Signal to chace off Cape Tiberoon, who took a signal to chace off Cape Tiberoon, who took a fmall French Sloop loaded with Sugar; and the French state Fire to a large Ship in the Bay, to prevent her falling into our Hands. She blew up before the Augusta's Boat could get on board, I have fince been informed the mounted 16 Guns, and had 65 Men on board.

The 14th we took two French Privateers with our Boats, one of 8 Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, the other of four Carriage and eight Swivels : Most of their Men swam ashore.

By the Prifoners I was informed that a rich Fleet was ready to fail from Port au Prince, under Convoy of two armed Merchant Ships of 24 Guns each. I directly fent a good failing fmall Sloop, that I have hired for a Tender, to look into that Port, who returned with an Account, that eight loaded Ships were come out of the Harbour into the Road, and lay with their Mizen Topfails loofe unmoored, I immediately ordered
