AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 24th Day of February 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Thirteenth of January last; For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Twenty Eighth Day of this Instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able-Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Tenth Day of April next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Tenth Day of April next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Venice, Feb. 24. The remaining Battalions of the Regiments of *Giullay*, *Palfy*, *Forgatch*, and *Bathiani*, which lately marched out of *Austrian Lombardy*, have passed through the *Ve-*

netian State in several Divisions, amounting to 2573 Men, on their Way into *Germany*. On Saturday last died here, in an advanced Age, Signior *Piero Marcello*, Procurator of *St. Mark. Turin, March 1.* Yesterday *Madame de Savoye* entered into the 31st Year of her Age. Her Royal Highness received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers, and of the Nobility, as usual upon that Occasion. *M. de Rochecouart*, Bishop and Duke of *Laon*, Ambassador from the French King to the Pope, arrived here on the 24th past, and staid at *Turin* only one Day to be presented to his *Sardinian Majesty* and the rest of the Royal Family.

Hague, March 17. By Letters from *Wesel* we are informed, that that Town was full of Equipages and Baggage, which the French had sent away from their Army. They were preparing Hospitals at *Ruremonde*; and the rest of the Dispositions, making in all that Country, seemed to indicate, that they expected the French would retire that Way.

Hague, March 18. Letters from *Hanover* of the 14th Instant mention, that a Courier was just arrived there from *Prince Ferdinand* of *Druidwick's* Head Quarters at *Hille*, with the News, that the Town of *Minden* had surrendered by Capitulation, and that the Garrison, consisting of 3516 Men, had been made Prisoners of War; and that it was believed the March of the Army would be forthwith directed towards *Hamelen*. There are Letters from *Wilshausen* which say, that the French, who are still at *Munden* and at *Cassel*, intend to intrench themselves strongly there; and they had also Advice that the French in *East Friseland* had received counter Orders, and were conveying all their Magazines to *Embden*. According to the last Accounts received at *Hanover* from *Prince Henry* of *Prussia*, that *Prince's* Head Quarters were at *Flachs-Stocken*, three Leagues from *Wolfenbuttel*.
