AT the Court at St. James's, the 29th Day of March, 1758,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 1st of March 1754, (at which Time the Plague continued to rage in several Parts of the Levant, and also in some of the Kingdoms in Barbary) to require and command, That all Ships and Vessels coming from any of the Ports in those Places, (except only from Smyrna, which was at that Time apprehended to be free from the said contagious Distemper) should perform their Quarantine according to the Rules and Regulations contained in the said Order, which Order is still in Force.—And whereas Information hath been this Day given to His Majesty at this Board, that the Plague hath lately broke out at Smyrna, whereby great Numbers of People are daily carried off—And it being of the utmost Importance, to prevent the said Infection from being brought from thence into this Kingdom—His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore judge it necessary hereby to Order, Require and Command, that notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's aforementioned Order in Council, all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods and Merchandizes, now arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive, in any Port of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Smyrna, do make their Quarantine for Forty Days, and do likewise strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules and Regulations laid down in the aforementioned Order in Council of the 1st of March 1754, and thereby required to be observed by Ships and Vessels coming from the Levant and the Coast of Barbary—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said respective Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Fourth of February last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Tenth Day of April next:—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twentieth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twentieth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentieth

of

of September last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Twenty Ninth Day of April next—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit, and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twenty Ninth Day of April next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship, or lade, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to Transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or Carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for impowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; And also to impower His Majesty to restrain the Carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Letter from the Hague, March 31.

Letters of the 28th Instant from Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Vrekenhorst in the Country of Munster, bring the following Accounts; That the Enemy had been forced, by his Highness's March to Sassenberg, to abandon the Town of Munster, and were actually retreating; with Expedition, towards the Rhine in three Columns; That the Troops from Hesse composed the Left Column; that M. de Clermont was in the Middle one, which came from Paderborn; and M. de Villemur in that upon the Right, which came out of Munster; and that the Duc de Broglie was the least advanced of the Whole: That the Prince of Holstein was detached with a large Body of Horse and Foot to pursue the Enemy, and to use his utmost Endeavours to break in upon them: That the Country of Hesse was at present evacuated:

That the Enemy had left at Paderborn an Hospital of more than eight Hundred Men, and less considerable ones at Lipstadt and Munster: And that in all these Places had been found Quantities of Provision and Forage.

Whitehall Treasury Chambers, Dec. 1, 1757.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Whitehall, March 25, 1758.

It having been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Night of the 21st or 22d of February last, at a Place called Copenhagen House, in the Parish of Saint Mary Islington, a Quantity of Leather, which Joseph Such, who lives at the said Place, and is a Carrier by Trade, was preparing for Sale, was stolen from the said Premises; and since, in the Night of the last Day of February, his Warehouse was broke open, and another Parcel of Leather, and most of his working Tools, stolen thereout: That two Men were seen near the said House, one in a light coloured Coat, the other supposed in dark coloured Cloaths; which Men were pursued by the said Joseph Such and his Servants, but they escaped by the Darknes of the Night: That in the Warehouse from whence the said Leather and Tools were stolen, he found a Letter directed to "Gipsy Soutch or his Wife" of which the following is a Copy, viz.

gipsy Soutch

"time back you have we bused, we have them fast and will not let them lose, we will have our Revenge of you before we have done we will lay a trap we catch you if we can we won't we catch you one of these Nights either Gipsy Soutch or his Wife and when we have you we will tell you ho we be but we won't we will not let you go to sell any body else for we will blow your Brains out and set fire of the House some night wen you little think of it so the Devil take take you all."

His Majesty for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said Robberies, and the Author or Authors of the said Letter, (except the Person who wrote the said Letter) is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon, and also a Reward of

of Fifty Pounds to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, to any one who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Robberies, and writing the said Letter (except as before excepted) to be paid upon the Conviction of any one or more of them.
