P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Twenty Fourth of February last, For paying the respective Bounties therein mentioned, to all Able and Ordinary Seamen, and also to all Able-bodied Landmen, who should voluntarily enter themselves in His Majesty's Royal Navy; and likewise for paying the Rewards to Persons discovering Seamen who should conceal themselves, will expire upon the Tenth Day of April next: — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, That the Bounties and Rewards thereby given, should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years; and of Thirty Shillings for every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, be continued to be paid to such Seamen and Landmen respectively, who shall, on or before the Twentieth Day of May next, enter themselves in the Royal Navy, in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fourth Day of January 1757: And likewise, That the Rewards of Two Pounds for every Able, and Twenty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, be continued to be paid to any Persons who shall, on or before the said Twentieth Day of May next, discover any Seaman or Seamen who shall conceal themselves, so as such Seaman or Seamen be taken for His Majesty's Service. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twentieth of September last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or

Ammunition, will expire upon the Twenty Ninth Day of April next—And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some longer Time—His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby Order, Require, Prohibit, and Command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Twentieth Ninth Day of April next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or Ship, or Lade, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to Transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or Carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty; or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty Ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, “An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; And also to empower His Majesty to restrain the Carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition.”—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Rome, March 18. A printed Paper, translated from the Portuguese Language, is handed about this City, containing an Account of the Usurpation which the Jesuits have attempted of Part of the Spanish and Portuguese Dominions in America, with a Design to make themselves independent of those Powers. On the 13th Instant the Pope held a Consistory, in which he disposed of 18 Archbishopricks and Bishopricks, agreeable to the Nomination of the respective Sovereigns. The Secretary of State has received Notice of the Decease, on the 2d Instant, of Cardinal Tencin, Archbishop of Lyons, by which there is 15 Hats vacant in the College of Cardinals.

Florence.

Florence, March 25. A few Days ago anchored at Leghorn from Naples, His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Rainbow, Captain Baffer, who is careening and repairing there. They are raising Men to compleat the Garrisons at Leghorn, Porto Ferrajo, and Florence. The Troops that remain at present in Tuscany, consist only of 12 Companies, and those composed of Invalids and Recruits. By the last Accounts which Marshal Botta received from the Commanding Officer of the Tuscan Troops that are on their March from hence to Germany, they have suffered greatly by the Badness of the Roads in Lombardy; many Soldiers are fallen sick, and others have deserted.

Copenhagen, April 1. Yesterday was celebrated, in the usual Manner, the Anniversary of his Danish Majesty's Birth Day; on which Occasion several Promotions were made, especially of General Officers in the Army; but the List is not yet published.

From Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Munster, April 8.

The Castle of Vechte has surrendered by Capitulation within these few Days. It was besieged by a Captain, with a Detachment of 150 Men from Bremen. The Garrison consisted of seven Companies; but what will hardly be credited is, that upwards of 100 Pieces of Cannon and Mortars were found in the Place.

A Courier is just arrived, and there are Advices, that General Fouquet had drove the Austrians from the County of Glatz, and afterwards taken Possession of a Magazine at Trautenau.

The Siege of Schweidnitz begun on the 30th past.

Hague, April 11. Letters from Venlo of the 8th Instant say, That the French had thrown two Bridges over the Meuse near Ruremonde; that Troops pass there successively; and that upwards of two thousand Waggon, loaded with Baggage, from their Army, had already passed. This makes it believed that their present Plan is to go either with their whole Force, or at least in a very considerable Body, behind the Meuse.

They write from Emerick, that the advanced Guard of the Allied Army had been the 8th at Dulmen.

WHEREAS adhering to the King's Enemies, by giving to them Aid or Comfort, either within his Realm, or elsewhere, is High Treason, and the Concealment thereof is Misprision of Treason;

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on Tuesday the 11th Instant, at Eleven o'Clock at Night, the Temporary Bridge erected for a Passage during the Alteration of London Bridge was set on Fire, and in the Space of a few Hours burnt down and entirely consumed, whereby the Passage over the said Bridge is totally destroyed: And whereas there are the strongest Grounds to believe, that the said Temporary Bridge was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by the Contrivance or Conspiracy of evil disposed and wicked Persons, His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Perpetrator or Perpetrators of a Crime so very infamous and detestable, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Persons concerned in contriving the same, (except the Person or Persons who actually set the said Temporary Bridge on Fire) who shall discover the Person or Persons who set the said Bridge on Fire, so that he, she, or they, be apprehended and convicted thereof.
