HIS Day His Majesty, and the Royal Family, came from St. James's to refide here for the Summer.

Whitehall, April 29.
An Express arrived here on Thursday the 25th Instant, in the Evening, with Advices from Holland, That Schweidnitz surrendered on the 16th Instant, one of the Works of the Place having been taken, the Night before, by Storm. The Garrison was forced to surrender itself Prisoners of War. It consisted in 250 Officers, and 3200 private Men. The Blockade

has besides cost the Enemy 3500 Men, who have perished by Diseases.

And Yesterday a Messenger arrived from Major General Yorke, with a Confirmation of the aforesaid Account; and farther, That the Siege had cost the Prussians about 200 Men killed and wounded, and that they had found in the Place 80 Pieces of Austrian Cannon, exclusive of all the Prussian Artillery, which was taken there by the Austrians last Year. Immediately after the Surrender of the Place, the Prustian Army was put in Motion on all Sides.

Whitehall, April 29. The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ in the University of Oxford, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Translation of the most Reverend Father in God Thomas late Bishop thereof to the Archbishopick of Canterbury; and also to issue his Letters under his Royal Signature, recommending the Right Reverend Father in God John Bishop of Bristol, to be by them chosen Bishop of the said See of Oxford.

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negociating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of caufing or procuring to be fo lent or advanced, or of fubfcribing for, or contributing to, or of folliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatfoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. faid Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every fuch Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury, without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Profecution of such Offenders.
