The Lords of His Majefty's most Honourable Privy Council.

IS Majefty having been pleafed to appoint the Right Honourable Henry Earl of Darlington to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Durham, his Lordfhip this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Westminster, June 9.

This Day, the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honourable Houfe of Commons by Mr. Quarme, Deputy Gentleman-Ufher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majefly's Commiffion, for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houje of Peers, to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, impowering his Royal Highnefs the Duke of Cumberland, the Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, the Lord Prefident of the Council, and feveral other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Bills was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to,

An Act for granting to kis Majefly feveral Rates and Duties upon Offices and Penfious, and upon Houfes, and upon Windows or Lights, and for raifing the Sum of free Millions by Annuities and a Lottery to be charged on the faid Rates and Duties.

An Act for applying a Sum of Money granted this Seffion of Parliament, for rebuilding London-Bridge, and for rendering more effectual, an Act paffed in the 29th Year of his prefent Majefly's Reign, intituled, An Act to improve, widen, and enlarge the Paffage over and through London Bridge.

An Act to enforce and render more effectual, An Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of his prefent Majefty, intituled, An Act for annexing certain forfeited Eftates in Scotland to the Crown unalienably, and for making Satisfaction to the lawful Creditors thereupon, and to eflablish a Method of managing the same, and applying the Rents and Profits thereof, for the better civilizing and improving the Highlands of Scotland, and preventing Diforders there for the future.

An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen employed in the Royal Navy, and for establishing a regular Method for the punctual, frequent, and certain Payment of their Wages, and for enabling them more easily and readily to remit the fame for the Support of their Wives and Families, and for preventing Frauds and subufes attending such Payments.

An AII for further explaining the Laws touching the Electors of Knights of the Shire to ferve in this prefent Parliament for that Part of Great Britain called England.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Third Year of the Reign of King William and Queen Mary, intituled, An Act for the better Explanation and fupplying the Defects of the former Laws, for the Settlement of the Poor, fo far as the fame relates to Apprentices gaining a Settlement by Indenture; and alfo to impower Justices of the Peace to determine Differences between Masters and Mistreffes, and their Servants, in Husbandry, touching their Wages, though such Servants are bired for iefs Time than a Year.

An AET for allowing further Time for Involment of Deeds and Wills, made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers.

An Act for allowing a further Time for holding the first Meetings of Commissioners or Trustees, for putting in Execution, certain Acts made in the last Session of Parliament.

An Act to explain, amend, and render more effettual, An Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, initialed, An Act for appointing a sufficient Number of Constables for the Service of the City and Liberty of Westminster, and to compel proper Persons to take upon them the Office of Jurymen to present Nusances and other Offences within the said City and Liberty.

An AEI to encourage the Growth and Cultivation of Madder, in that Part of Great Britain called England, by ascertaining the Tythe thereof there.

An Act for the Encouragement of the Exportation of Culm to Lifbon, in the Kingdom of Portugal.

An Act for the more cafy and fpeedy Recovery of fmall Debts, within the Western Division of the Hundred of Brixton, in the County of Surrey.

An Act for the more cafy and speedy Recovery of finall Debts, within the Borough of Great Yarmouth, and the Liberties thereof.

An Act for establishing a free Market for the Sale of Corn and Grain, within the City or Liberty of Westminster.

An All for draining and preferving certain Fen Lands, Low Grounds, and Commons, in the Parishes of Chatteris and Doddington, in the Isle of Ely, in the County of Cambridge.

An Act for draining and preferving certain Fen Lands, and Low Grounds in the Ifle of Ely, and County of Cambridge, between the Cam, otherwife Grant Ouze, and Mildenhall Rivers, and hounded on the South East, by the hard Lands of Isleham, Fordham, Soham, and Wicken; and for impowering the Governor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty, of the Company of Conservators of the great Level of the Fens called Bedford Level, to fell certain Lands within the faid Limits, commonly called Invested Lands.

Leghorn, May 22. On Saturday laft arrived] here a Tartane laden with Corn, taken by His Britannick Majefty's Ship Rainbow, near Toulon. The Enterprize Privateer has brought into this Port three Tartanes laden with Timber for Ship building, from the Roman State, on Ac-count of the French King.

His Britannick Majefty's Naples, May 16. Ship the Ambufcade failed from hence on Friday upon a Cruize. By Letters from Malta, the Rofe Frigate, with feveral French Merchant Ships richly laden, were still in that Port the 29th of April, but were foon to fail for Marfeilles.

Whitehall, June 10.

Late on Thursday Night, Lieutenant Difhington, of the Tartar Cutter, arrived with Letters from his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, and the Honourable Captain Howe, dated in Cancelle Bay the 6th Instant, giving an Account, that after the Fleet had been kept by contrary Winds, feveral Days, in Sight of the French Coast, Part of the Troops had been fortunate enough to make good their Landing on the 5th at Night, without any Thing that could be called Oppolition. A small Battery or two opposed the Landing, which Mr. Howe foon filenced with his Ships, and the Refiftance the Grenadiers found from the Peafants was too trifling to be mentioned. The first landing confifted of as many of the Foot Guards as could be difembarked, with Major General Dury ; the Grenadiers of the Army with Major General Moltyn; the whole commanded by Lord George Sackville. The Troops behaved with the utmost Regularity, and the Remainder are difembarking as fast as possible.

Admiralty Office, June 10. N the 9th of March laft, His Majefty's O Ship the Naffau of 64 Guns, the Har-wich of 50 Guns, Rye of 24 Guns, with the Swan Sloop, and two Buffes, failed from Plymouth for the Coast of Africa, under the Command of Captain Marsh, having on Board 200 Marines under Major Mafon, with a De-tachment of Artillery People under Captain Walker. On the 24th of April this Squadron arrived off the River Senegal, and after founding the Entrance, the finall Veffels and Boats got over the Bar the 29th, there not being Water for any Thing larger than the Swan Sloop to go in. The Enemy with fewen Veffels, three of which were armed with Ten Guns each, made a onew of attacking our Small Craft, and kepta Kind of running Fire, but were foon repulfed, and obliged to active up the River. The Marines and Seamen, to the Number of 700, landed, and got the A tillery on Shore; and next Day, (the 30th) when they were ready for proceeding to attack Fort Lewis, which is upon a fmall IfImd about twelve Miles up the River from the Bar, Deputies arrived from the fupesior Council of Senegal with Articles upon which they proposed to capitulate. Captain Marth and Major Mason made fome Alterations therein. On the tft of May they were agreed to, and were in Subitance as follows.

I. The Forts; Storehoufes, Vessels, Arms, Provisions, and every Thing belonging to the Gompany opon the River Senegal, to be put into the Polleffor of the English.

II. All the White People, belonging to the Selegal Computy, to be conducted to France, with their private Effects ; Merchandize and uncoined Treafure excepted.

III. The Free Mulattoes, or Negroes, to remain fo; not to be molefted in their Religion or Effects, and to have Liberty to retire, if they chufe it.

In Confequence of these Articles, Major Mafon, with the Marines, took Poffeffion of Fort Lewis the 2d of May. In it were found 232 French Officers and Soldiers ; 92 Pieces of Cannon ; with Treasure, Slaves, and Metchandize, to a very confiderable Value.

The King has been pleafed to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Briftol, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the fame being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God John late Bifhop thereof to the See of Oxford; and likewife a Letter recommending unto the faid Dean and Chapter Philip Yonge, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Majefty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Canon Refidentiary of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, London, to be by them elected Bifhop of the faid See of Briffol.
