Leghorn, May 22. On Saturday laft arrived] here a Tartane laden with Corn, taken by His Britannick Majefty's Ship Rainbow, near Toulon. The Enterprize Privateer has brought into this Port three Tartanes laden with Timber for Ship building, from the Roman State, on Ac-count of the French King.

His Britannick Majefty's Naples, May 16. Ship the Ambufcade failed from hence on Friday upon a Cruize. By Letters from Malta, the Rofe Frigate, with feveral French Merchant Ships richly laden, were still in that Port the 29th of April, but were foon to fail for Marfeilles.

Whitehall, June 10.

Late on Thursday Night, Lieutenant Difhington, of the Tartar Cutter, arrived with Letters from his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, and the Honourable Captain Howe, dated in Cancelle Bay the 6th Instant, giving an Account, that after the Fleet had been kept by contrary Winds, feveral Days, in Sight of the French Coast, Part of the Troops had been fortunate enough to make good their Landing on the 5th at Night, without any Thing that could be called Oppolition. A fmall Battery or two opposed the Landing, which Mr. Howe foon filenced with his Ships, and the Refiftance the Grenadiers found from the Peafants was too trifling to be mentioned. The first landing confifted of as many of the Foot Guards as could be difembarked, with Major General Dury ; the Grenadiers of the Army with Major General Moltyn; the whole commanded by Lord George Sackville. The Troops behaved with the utmost Regularity, and the Remainder are difembarking as fast as possible.

Admiralty Office, June 10. N the 9th of March laft, His Majefty's O Ship the Naffau of 64 Guns, the Har-wich of 50 Guns, Rye of 24 Guns, with the Swan Sloop, and two Buffes, failed from Plymouth for the Coast of Africa, under the Command of Captain Marsh, having on Board 200 Marines under Major Mafon, with a De-tachment of Artillery People under Captain Walker. On the 24th of April this Squadron arrived off the River Senegal, and after founding the Entrance, the finall Veffels and Boats got over the Bar the 29th, there not being Water for any Thing larger than the Swan Sloop to go in. The Enemy with fewen Veffels, three of which were armed with Ten Guns each, made a onew of attacking our Small Craft, and kepta Kind of running Fire, but were foon repulfed, and obliged to active up the River. The Marines and Seamen, to the Number of 700, landed, and got the A tillery on Shore; and next Day, (the 30th) when they were ready for proceeding to attack Fort Lewis, which is upon a fmall IfImd about twelve Miles up the River from the Bar, Deputies arrived from the fupestor Council of Senegal with Articles upon which they proposed to capitulate. Captain Marth and Major Mason made fome Alterations therein. On the tft of May they were agreed to, and were in Subitance as follows.

I. The Forts; Storehoufes, Vessels, Arms, Provisions, and every Thing belonging to the Gompany opon the River Senegal, to be put into the Polleffor of the English.

II. All the White People, belonging to the Selegal Computy, to be conducted to France, with their private Effects ; Merchandize and uncoined Treafure excepted.

III. The Free Mulattoes, or Negroes, to remain fo; not to be molefted in their Religion or Effects, and to have Liberty to retire, if they chufe it.

In Confequence of these Articles, Major Mafon, with the Marines, took Poffeffion of Fort Lewis the 2d of May. In it were found 232 French Officers and Soldiers ; 92 Pieces of Cannon ; with Treasure, Slaves, and Metchandize, to a very confiderable Value.

The King has been pleafed to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Briftol, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the fame being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God John late Bifhop thereof to the See of Oxford; and likewife a Letter recommending unto the faid Dean and Chapter Philip Yonge, Doctor in Divinity, one of His Majefty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Canon Refidentiary of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, London, to be by them elected Bifhop of the faid See of Briffol.
