Whitby, October 18.

N Sunday last a Squadron of Dutch ships appeared to the East of this place, and upon Monday and Tuesday more Northwards, in a farther offing, being about 11 sail, but a great storm arising on Wednesday morning, forced them off our Coasts, since which time we have no farther news of them

Deale, Offober 19. Yesterday came in here a permission
Vessel from Deepe, as also a Venetian and a Lubecker from other parts of France. This day arrived a Vessel from Virginia of 300 Funs. This Town is God be praised in a good condition of health; and begins again to fill with Inhabi-

Hull, October 19. This evening arrived here a Vessel from Gottenberg, laden with Flax and Iron, who eight daies since met with a Durch Man of Warr of 30 Guns off Scarberough, who commanded him aboard, examined his papers, and broke open his Merchants letters, and then dismiss him; he met since with exceeding ill weather, which much endangerd him, especially in his Entry into Humber, where he has been four daies together tost by the storm.

Warfan, Octob. 2. His Majeffy continues still to divertise himself in inuring, but the Nobility in all parts are hastening to the respective Diets in their several Districks. The Soldiers are highly districted, especially those that have been in his Majestics service, that no distinction is made between them, and those that were in service against him; all of them cryout for their pay, which is a point of some difficulty, their arrears being great, and no probable way in view to raise so vast a sum as is necessary for the present satisfaction of all parties, especially considering the poor condition of the Countrey in all places ruined by the Wars. And 'tis much saved less the Army prove mutinous, who cannot want encouragement to it from some discontented great ones.

We have little probability of concluding with the Muscovites, though the present necessity of their affairs will oblige them for some time to continue the Truce, having their torces much distracted and divided.

In Ukrania the Collacks have so far prevailed, as to beat them out of Perislam, one of the chiefest Towns beyond the Boristhemes, where they have placed a frong sarion

Bristheres, where they have placed a strong garison.

Hamburgh, October 6. The Swedes continue to press hard upon Bremen, and talk high as is they should give a good account of the siege before Christmass, having drawn a Line about it, that nothing can easily goe into them. The besieged de pair not of relief; and it is said that by Letters found about Major General Referent taken by the Swedes, as he was attempting to enter the Town, they have discovered a resign continued in an Assembly at Bylefelt, between the Dukes of Lunenburg and Brunswick, and the Dutties from Wolfenbuttel to succor the besiege; that small credit is given to this report, since every day sress forces are permitted to pass through the Duke of Lunenburghs Country to reinforce the besiegers. The Swedes Cannon have of late plaid hard upon the Town, and a party of Swedes making a near appreach to the Town, drove away a considerable number of their Cattl. Some Sollies have been lately made by the Town, but with little success.

Vienna, October 6. This Court having long finde determined to tend a Resident into France, has at the last made choice of the Sieur di Vicz, a Counsellor in the Chamber of Tirol; a person somethy employed by the late Archiduke Ferdinando Carlo to Paris, about the assaires of Allitia.

A Courrier arrived two daies fince from Adrianople, with

Letters from the Emperors Resident there, which amongst other things tell us, that the Sultan having sent for Paviotre, Grand Truchman or Interpreter to the Court, dispatche him away with lett Instructions to Constantinople, and 'cis said with order to pass with Ballarino a Minister of the Republique of Venice into Morea, to attend the Grand Visier; and 'tis generally thought that a Treaty will be effectually set on soot to put an end to that tedious Warr.

We have here news from the Rhine, the 400 of the Prince Palatines horse had made an Incursion into the Territories of the Elector of Meniz, but were suddenly attaqued by a strong party of the Lorrainers, who cutting of 300 of them, recovered all their plunder, and that very considerable forces were sent to the succor of the Elector Pelatine from the Duke of Newbourg, and 600 more suddenly expected from the Duke of Brunswick, for which the Elector had advanced a very considerable sum of moneys.

The Cardinal Landigrave of Hesse is by the Emperor nominated Protector of the German Nation, in the Court of Rome, in the place of Cardinal Colonna lately decessed. Count Radolph Zyndssendorph privy Counseller to His Imperial Majelt, is dispatcht in much hast to the Marques of Brandenburgh, his business not yet publishe.

The Governor of Buda, with thirty Turks, is come to a place about two miles distant from this City; from whence he has sent several excellent Horses, and other things of value, to be presented to several of the Nobility in this Court. Divers Waggons having been sent him from hence with all sorts of Provisions for his entertainment.

'Tis reported, that the Emperor intends to relieve the City of Bremen, and that the charge of it is committed to Count Montecuculi; the truth of which, time will manifest.

Rome, Ostob. 9. The Pope of late much fixed from his former pains, was on Wednelday last in so good a condition as to go abroad, visiting St. Peters Church, and taking a walk in several parts of the City, especially in those places where his new buildings are going forwards.

Yesterday he gave audience to the French Ambassador, which continued about half an hour; and after him, to the Venetian. And this morning Cardinal Sforza had audience about the estains of Spain, which lasted but a very little while, he having not essent sed of any essairs of moment with any of the Foreign Ministers, but onely with the Duke de Chautnes; which not pleasing him, he put off to another time, onely granting to him his proposal for the promotion of the Duke de Vendosme to a Cardinalship as soon as any shall be made, which is not thought will be hastned, several other interests being likewise to be complied with.

On Munday next 'ris thought there will be a Confissory, after which his Holiness intends to take the Air in the Courtry at the Castle Gandolphe, four Leagues from hence. Not with anding this intervel, his Holiness is not yet recovered, his Physicians and others being still in the same apprehensions for him as formerly, that in all probability he cannot continue long.

Cardinal de Retz upon his arrival at Sarfane, upon the confines between the Great Dake and the Republick of Genzua, has received orders to put a ftop to his further voyage, till farther order from the King of France. In obedience to which, he is returned into the County of Lucca, and intents to ftay fome time with the Abbot Cenami, in a fair hous of his four leagues from the City.

'Tis faid the Emprets has changed her resolution of parting from Milan the fourth, deferring her journey for some time, expecting the arrival of the Counters d' Eril her chief Lady of Honor, some daies since arrived at Finale.

The Count d'Aglie has complemented the Empress in the name of the Duke of Savoy, but is not fatisfied in his Reception, nor the countenance the Spaniards make him, which has not a little disgusted likewise many of the Princes and Forreign Ministers that have there attended, which caules the Republiques of Venice and Genoua, to defer their complement till she be out or the Territories of Milan.

Venice, Octob. 15. Since the blowing up of Macasca we have heard no news of the Turks, which gives us caute to believe they intend no farther attemps this year, yet General Cornaro continues his care and diligence for the defence of all places that may be in any probability attacqued by them, putting in strong Garrisons, and good store of Pro visions of all forts; himfelf at present is gone for Spalate,

with a defigne to pals further to Zara.

Our Convoy sent out the beginning of this week, bound to the Levant for the service of the Fleet, has had very good weather, and we hope will fuddenly arrive there, and care is taking to fet out more ships to sollow them: A new Galeass, and some fresh Gallies are also arming out for the Fleet, to supply the room of some of the old ones which are called home to be refitted: To morrow Siegnior Gerolamo Contarini, one of the Senate is to go from hence to his Charge, as General of the Forces at Palma.

The Sinate has chosen their Captain General of the Fleet, Seignfor Francesco Morosini, to be P. oveditor General to the

Seigneur Bellagno, Ambassador from the Senate to the Court of Savoy, and chosen by them to go in the same Qualification to Spain, went lately to Moncallier, a pleasant leat of their Highnesses, for his last Audience, accompanied by the Count de Cumana Knight of the Order, and the Count Muratore Maiter of the Ceremonies, in his Highnesses Coach, with a great Train of the Court; where he took leave of his Highnels, who is much facisfied with his Addresses, and prudent management of Assairs. He was asterwards admitted to the Prince of Piedmont, and then to the Princels, and is prepa ing for his speet y journey to Madrid.

He Infection being much spread about the Town of Battel in Suff x, though the Inhabitants thereof (thanks be to God) continue as yet free from it; It is thought fit, for the prevention of its farther spreading, to give time y Notice to all Perfons, That their Fair, ufually kept on the Eleventh of N vember, is not to be kept this Year.

Genoua, Octob 13 Yesterday the Empress was to part from Milan, and 'tis believed this State will shortly dispatch away their Envoyes to attend her with their complements at Vienna.

The Spanish Resident has taken seme disgust here, and is gone without taking his leave of the Pallace.

Five hundred Bales of Silk are here arrived by Felucaes

from Messina; the greater part of them for France.

A Genous Je Petach is here arrived with Oals from Puglia, belonging to the Sandi Durazzi of this place, bound for Oftend, and another Vessel of this place gene for Puglia to lade Oyls upon the fame account.

We have great hopes that our Convoy is fafely arrived at Constantinople, notwithstanding the great and confident reports of some Vessels arrived at Legorne to the contrary; yet

we have not as yet any certainty.

Many ships of this place daily come in here from Sicily with Corn, intended for Cadiz; where 'tis faid, four Durch ships are taking in Moneys and Goods for those parts. have a warm report here that a Vessel of this place bound from

Malaga for Oftend, is taken by the Argerives.

Hague, Oftob. 24, On Thursday last arrived here the Prince of Orange. Amerongen is again returned hither,

whither to continue this Winter, or to pass Ambassador for Denmark, is not yet resolved.

We talk high of carrying on the War the next year with the affishance of our Allies, though the people are rather generully carried on to defires of Peace, being extreamly fentible of the Calamicies of the War, which has for the present quite ruined our Trade; however, we are hurried on by the prevailing Faction to other Councils, and great preparations for new ships, whereof some are already upon the stocks, equal to the fi it and second Rates of the English ships, which they intend shall be armed with the largest Guns ; for which purpole, at Amsterdam, they are beginning to melt down several of their small Guns, which are to be cast into great ones of 36, and 48 pound Bullet.

We have this farther account of our three Eaft-India ships formerly driven off our Coasts by storm, That one of them is arrived at the Elbe, a second put into Copenhagen; but the third springing a Leak, was cast away with all her Merchandize to a very confiderable value : But the men timely efferting her, went aboard her Companion that escaped to

Copenhagen.

Several Merchants ships are now fitting out for a Winter Trade, which, we hope, will be secured by our Squadron, which has Orders for that purpole to keep the Sca: And we are lending out two Men of War for the Elbe, to secure our own ships in those parts; and by Crusing up and down, to take what account they can of the English.

Middleburgh, Gaob. 25. This Week arrived here two Veilels from France, and another from Flanders, laden with Salt; but a ship of this place bound homewards through the

Channel, is fallen into the hands of the English.

Amsterdam, Octob. 25. A Danes ship, with another French Vessel, arriving here on Saturday lait, brings us the ill News of one of our East-India thips funk about the Dogger-fands. We are also advised, that Capr. Jan Gideon? Van der Burgh, who had spent his Masts by the storm, and was by Order from the Lieutenant-Admiral sent in to Haure de Grace, is now returned with two Merchant-men, and two Fireships, and safely arrived between the Vly and the Texel. Several Scots Capers have of late appeared on our Coasts, but we know not yet what hurt they have done.

Edenburgh, Offob. 18. Here are two Prize fhips brought up to Leith by Capt. Henry, one laden with Stock-fish, the other with Salt; and several others brought up laden with

Salt and Timber.

Newcistle, October 19. A Ship-boat with eight Hollanders, we e lately put on shoare near Balmeberough-Caple, who pretend to have lost their ship upon the Coait of Norway, and had been fix daies at Sea in their boat; though the largeness of their boat perswades us they belonged rather to some Man of Warr that has been cast away, the Men a e at prefent fecu ed.

Minchead, October 19. A Barque arriving two daies fince in this Port from Milferd, informes us of a Prize, a new ship of 200 Tuns, laden with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux, taken by the Saphire, and by her Men brought in thither. There were two others in her Company, but in thith: r. the Saphire obliged to stient some Guiny ships under his Convoy from Kingfale, had not leiture to pursue

West-Cones, October 20. On Thursday last arrived here the Sancto Antonio of St. Sebastian, having from thence Convoyed 400 Soldiers for Oftend, and is returning for the same Employment to Transpore thither more Soldiers. On the eleventh initiant coming our from Oftend, he discovered in Calais Road between twenty and twenty five sail, which he ju ged to be the Squadron of Vander Zaen, he speaks of great Fortifications in Flanders, where they very much apprehend that the great preparations in France are defigned upon them. Six Flanders thips are fayled from hence bound for France for the new Vintage. Two French Prizes are even now brought in hither, taken by a Privateer, one of them laden with Sugar and Brandy, the other with Salt.
