Whitby, October 18.

**O**N Sunday last a Squadron of Dutch Ships appeared to the East of this place, and upon Monday and Tuesday more Northwards, in a farther offing, being about 11 sail, but a great storm arising on Wednesday morning, forced them off our Coasts, since which time we have no farther news of them.

**Deale, October 19.** Yesterday came in here a permission Vessel from *Deepe*, as also a *Venetian* and a *Lubecker* from other parts of *France*. This day arrived a Vessel from *Virginia* of 300 Tuns. This Town is God be praised in a good condition of health; and begins again to fill with Inhabitants.

**Hull, October 19.** This evening arrived here a Vessel from *Gottenberg*, laden with Flax and Iron, who eight daies since met with a Dutch Man of Warr of 30 Guns off *Scarborough*, who commanded him aboard, examined his papers, and broke open his Merchants letters, and then dismissed him; he met since with exceeding ill weather, which much endangered him, especially in his Entry into *Humber*, where he has been four daies together tost by the storm.

**Warsaw, Octob. 2.** His Majesty continues still to diversify himself in hunting, but the Nobility in all parts are hastening to the respective Diets in their several Districks. The Soldiers are highly dissatisfied, especially those that have been in his Majesty's service, that no distinction is made between them, and those that were in service against him; all of them cry out for their pay, which is a point of some difficulty, their arrears being great, and no probable way in view to raise so vast a sum as is necessary for the present satisfaction of all parties, especially considering the poor condition of the Countrey in all places ruined by the Wars. And 'tis much feared lest the Army prove mutinous, who cannot want encouragement to it from some discontented great ones.

We have little probability of concluding with the *Muscovites*, though the present necessity of their affairs will oblige them for some time to continue the Truce, having their forces much distracted and divided.

In *Ukrania* the *Cossacks* have so far prevailed, as to beat them out of *Perislaw*, one of the chiefest Towns beyond the *Boristhenes*, where they have placed a strong garison.

**Hamburg, October 6.** The *Swedes* continue to press hard upon *Bremen*, and talk high as if they should give a good account of the siege before Christmas, having drawn a Line about it, that nothing can easily goe into them. The besieged despair not of relief; and 'tis said that by Letters found about Major General *Siffelen* taken by the *Swedes*, as he was attempting to enter the Town, they have discovered a design continued in an Assembly at *Bylesfelt*, between the Dukes of *Lunenburg* and *Brunswick*, and the *D. parties* from *Wolfenbuttel* to succor the besiege; that small credit is given to this report, since every day fresh forces are permitted to pass through the Duke of *Lunenburgs* Country to reinforce the besiegers. The *Swedes* Cannon have of late plaid hard upon the Town, and a party of *Swedes* making a near approach to the Town, drove away a considerable number of their Cart. Some *Sillies* have been lately made by the Town, but with little success.

**Vienna, October 6.** This Court having long since determined to send a Resident into *France*, has at the last made choice of the *Sieur de Vicz*, a Counsellor in the Chamber of *Tirol*; a person formerly employed by the late Archduke *Ferdinando Carlo* to *Paris*, about the affaires of *Alsitz*.

A Courier arrived two daies since from *Adrianople*, with

Letters from the Emperors Resident there, which amongst other things tell us, that the *Sultan* having sent for *Pavotto*, Grand Truchman or Interpreter to the Court, dispatched him away with secret Instructions to *Constantinople*, and 'tis said with order to pass with *Ballarino* a Minister of the Republicque of *Venice* into *Morca*, to attend the Grand Vezier; and 'tis generally thought that a Treaty will be effectually set on foot to put an end to that tedious Warr.

We have here news from the *Rhine*, that 400 of the Prince *Palatines* horse had made an Incurision into the Territories of the Elector of *Mentz*, but were suddenly attacked by a strong party of the *Lorrainers*, who cutting off 300 of them, recovered all their plunder, and that very considerable forces were sent to the succor of the Elector *Palatine* from the Duke of *Newbourg*, and 600 more suddenly expected from the Duke of *Brunswick*, for which the Elector had advanced a very considerable sum of money.

The Cardinal *Landgrave* of *Hesse* is by the Emperor nominated Protector of the *German Nation*, in the Court of *Rome*, in the place of Cardinal *Colonna* lately deceased. Count *Radolph Zyndendorph* privy Counsellor to His Imperial Majesty, is dispatched in much hast to the *Marquels of Brandenburg*, his business not yet published.

The Governor of *Buda*, with thirty Turks, is come to a place about two miles distant from this City, from whence he has sent several excellent Horses, and other things of value, to be presented to several of the Nobility in this Court. Divers Waggons having been sent him from hence with all sorts of Provisions for his entertainment.

'Tis reported, that the Emperor intends to relieve the City of *Bremerz*, and that the charge of it is committed to Count *Montecuculi*; the truth of which, time will manifest.

**Rome, Octob. 9.** The Pope of late much freed from his former pains, was on Wednesday last in good a concition as to go abroad, visiting *St. Peters Church*, and taking a walk in several parts of the City, especially in those places where his new buildings are going forwards.

Yesterday he gave audience to the French Ambassador, which continued about half an hour; and after him, to the *Venetian*. And this morning Cardinal *Sforza* had audience about the affairs of *Spain*, which lasted but a very little while, he having notwithstanding of any affair of moment with any of the Foreign Ministers, but onely with the Duke de *Chaulnes*; which not pleasing him, he put off to another time, onely granting to him his proposal for the promotion of the Duke de *Vendosme* to a Cardinalship as soon as any shall be made, which is not thought will be hastned, several other interests being likewise to be complied with.

On Monday next 'tis thought there will be a Consistory, after which his Holiness intends to take the Air in the Country at the Castle *Gandolphe*, four Leagues from hence. Notwithstanding this interval, his Holiness is not yet recovered, his Physicians and others being still in the same apprehensions for him as formerly, that in all probability he cannot continue long.

Cardinal de *Retz* upon his arrival at *Sarsane*, upon the confines between the Great Duke and the Republick of *Genova*, has received orders to put a stop to his further voyage, till farther order from the King of *France*. In obedience to which, he is returned into the County of *Lucca*, and intends to stay some time with the Abbot *Cenami*, in a fair height of his four leagues from the City.

**Legorne, October 11.** On the sixth instant arrived here the *Madonna del buon Porto*, a French Ship, wanting 20 daies from *Alexandria*, who affirms that an Algerive had taken a
