French ship bound hither from Scandcroen and Cyprus,

estiemed worth 80000 p. of eight.

'Tis faid the Emprets has changed her resolution of parting from Milan the fourth, deferring her journey for some time, expecting the arrival of the Counters d' Eril her chief Lady of Honor, some daies since arrived at Finale.

The Count d'Aglie has complemented the Empress in the name of the Duke of Savoy, but is not fatisfied in his Reception, nor the countenance the Spaniards make him, which has not a little disgusted likewise many of the Princes and Forreign Ministers that have there attended, which caules the Republiques of Venice and Genoua, to defer their complement till she be out or the Territories of Milan.

Venice, Octob. 15. Since the blowing up of Macasca we have heard no news of the Turks, which gives us caute to believe they intend no farther attemps this year, yet General Cornaro continues his care and diligence for the defence of all places that may be in any probability attacqued by them, putting in strong Garrisons, and good store of Pro visions of all forts; himfelf at present is gone for Spalate, with a defigne to pals further to Zara.

Our Convoy sent out the beginning of this week, bound to the Levant for the service of the Fleet, has had very good weather, and we hope will fuddenly arrive there, and care is taking to fet out more ships to sollow them: A new Galeass, and some fresh Gallies are also arming out for the Fleet, to supply the room of some of the old ones which are called home to be refitted : To morrow Siegnior Gerolamo Contarini, one of the Senate is to go from hence to his Charge, as General of the Forces at Palma.

The Sinate has chosen their Captain General of the Fleet, Seignfor Francesco Morosini, to be P. oveditor General to the

Seigneur Bellagno, Ambassador from the Senate to the Court of Savoy, and chosen by them to go in the same Qualification to Spain, went lately to Moncallier, a pleasant leat of their Highnesses, for his last Audience, accompanied by the Count de Cumana Knight of the Order, and the Count Muratore Maiter of the Ceremonies, in his Highnesses Coach, with a great Train of the Court; where he took leave of his Highnels, who is much facisfied with his Addresses, and prudent management of Assairs. He was asterwards admitted to the Prince of Piedmont, and then to the Princels, and is prepa ing for his speet y journey to Madrid.

He Infection being much spread about the Town of Battel in Suff x, though the Inhabitants thereof (thanks be to God) continue as yet free from it; It is thought fit, for the prevention of its farther spreading, to give time y Notice to all Perfons, That their Fair, ufually kept on the Eleventh of N vember, is not to be kept this Year.

Genoua, Octob 13 Yesterday the Empress was to part from Milan, and 'tis believed this State will shortly dispatch away their Envoyes to attend her with their complements at Vienna.

The Spanish Resident has taken seme disgust here, and is gone without taking his leave of the Pallace.

Five hundred Bales of Silk are here arrived by Felucaes

from Messina; the greater part of them for France.

A Genous Je Petach is here arrived with Oals from Puglia, belonging to the Sandi Durazzi of this place, bound for Oftend, and another Vessel of this place gene for Puglia to lade Oyls upon the fame account.

We have great hopes that our Convoy is fafely arrived at Constantinople, notwithstanding the great and confident reports of some Vessels arrived at Legorne to the contrary; yet

we have not as yet any certainty.

Many ships of this place daily come in here from Sicily with Corn, intended for Cadiz; where 'tis faid, four Durch ships are taking in Moneys and Goods for those parts. have a warm report here that a Vessel of this place bound from

Malaga for Oftend, is taken by the Argerives.

Hague, Oftob. 24, On Thursday last arrived here the Prince of Orange. Amerongen is again returned hither,

whither to continue this Winter, or to pass Ambassador for Denmark, is not yet resolved.

We talk high of carrying on the War the next year with the affishance of our Allies, though the people are rather generully carried on to defires of Peace, being extreamly fentible of the Calamicies of the War, which has for the present quite ruined our Trade; however, we are hurried on by the prevailing Faction to other Councils, and great preparations for new ships, whereof some are already upon the stocks, equal to the fi it and second Rates of the English ships, which they intend shall be armed with the largest Guns ; for which purpole, at Amsterdam, they are beginning to melt down several of their small Guns, which are to be cast into great ones of 36, and 48 pound Bullet.

We have this farther account of our three Eaft-India ships formerly driven off our Coasts by storm, That one of them is arrived at the Elbe, a second put into Copenhagen; but the third springing a Leak, was cast away with all her Merchandize to a very confiderable value : But the men timely efferting her, went aboard her Companion that escaped to

Copenhagen.

Several Merchants ships are now fitting out for a Winter Trade, which, we hope, will be secured by our Squadron, which has Orders for that purpole to keep the Sca: And we are lending out two Men of War for the Elbe, to secure our own ships in those parts; and by Crusing up and down, to take what account they can of the English.

Middleburgh, Gaob. 25. This Week arrived here two Veilels from France, and another from Flanders, laden with Salt; but a ship of this place bound homewards through the

Channel, is fallen into the hands of the English.

Amsterdam, Octob. 25. A Danes ship, with another French Vessel, arriving here on Saturday lait, brings us the ill News of one of our East-India thips funk about the Dogger-fands. We are also advised, that Capr. Jan Gideon? Van der Burgh, who had spent his Masts by the storm, and was by Order from the Lieutenant-Admiral sent in to Haure de Grace, is now returned with two Merchant-men, and two Fireships, and safely arrived between the Vly and the Texel. Several Scots Capers have of late appeared on our Coasts, but we know not yet what hurt they have done.

Edenburgh, Offob. 18. Here are two Prize fhips brought up to Leith by Capt. Henry, one laden with Stock-fish, the other with Salt; and several others brought up laden with

Salt and Timber.

Newcistle, October 19. A Ship-boat with eight Hollanders, we e lately put on shoare near Balmeberough-Caple, who pretend to have lost their ship upon the Coait of Norway, and had been fix daies at Sea in their boat; though the largeness of their boat perswades us they belonged rather to some Man of Warr that has been cast away, the Men a e at prefent fecu ed.

Minchead, October 19. A Barque arriving two daies fince in this Port from Milferd, informes us of a Prize, a new ship of 200 Tuns, laden with Wine and Brandy from Bourdeaux, taken by the Saphire, and by her Men brought in thither. There were two others in her Company, but in thith: r. the Saphire obliged to stient some Guiny ships under his Convoy from Kingfale, had not leiture to pursue

West-Cones, October 20. On Thursday last arrived here the Sancto Antonio of St. Sebastian, having from thence Convoyed 400 Soldiers for Oftend, and is returning for the same Employment to Transpore thither more Soldiers. On the eleventh initiant coming our from Oftend, he discovered in Calais Road between twenty and twenty five sail, which he ju ged to be the Squadron of Vander Zaen, he speaks of great Fortifications in Flanders, where they very much apprehend that the great preparations in France are defigned upon them. Six Flanders thips are fayled from hence bound for France for the new Vintage. Two French Prizes are even now brought in hither, taken by a Privateer, one of them laden with Sugar and Brandy, the other with Salt.
