*Whitehall, June 27.*

**T**HIS Morning an Expreſs arrived from Holland, with Letters from the Head Quarters of the King's Army commanded by Prince Ferdinand of Brunſwick, at Kempen on the Lower Rhine, dated the 23d Inſtant, containing a general Account, That, the ſame Day, his Highneſs had gained a complete Victory over the French. The Action begun about One o'Clock in the Afternoon, and laſted above Six Hours; when the Enemy was obliged to retreat in Confuſion towards Nuys and Cologne. The Loſs in Prince Ferdinand's Army was very moderate; and his Highneſs, as well as the Hereditary Prince of Brunſwick, and the other General Officers, were all well. The King's Infantry encamped upon the Field of Battle the Evening after the Action; and all the Horſe and Light Troops were ſent out in Purſuit of the Enemy, whoſe Communication with Ruremonde, and the Lower Maeſe, is entirely cut off. Theſe Letters were wrote at Nine o'Clock at Night; and a particular Relation of the Action is hourly expected.

Another Expreſs arrived about the ſame Time, by the Way of Fluſhing in Zealand, from His Maſteſty's Reſident at Cologne, with Letters of the 24th Inſtant, containing the ſame Account as above, and theſe further Circumſtances, That the French themſelves did Juſtice to Prince Ferdinand's judicious Conduſt, and to the Bravery of his Troops; and repreſented their Loſs to be very great, eſpecially from the Execution done by the Artillery. The French Swiſs Regiment of Lochman had not above 150 Men left of the whole Corps, and by Four in the Afternoon they had loſt 25 Officers. The Regiments on both Wings of the French Army had ſuffered proportionably; and that of Count Giſors in particular, who is himſelf dangerously wounded; and, it is ſaid, that not an Officer in it has eſcaped unhurt.

*Rome, June 3.* The Magiſtrate of Health, on Notice that the Plague had broke out at Smyrna, in the Morea, and ſome Iſlands in the Archipelago, has, by a publick Notification, ordered, that all Veſſels coming from the Levant into the Eccleſiaſtical Ports, ſhall, for the Future, perform Forty Days Quarantine.

*Florence, June 3.* On the 22d paſt failed from Leghorne His Britannick Maſteſty's Ship Preſton, Capt. Evans, eſcorting, at the Requeſt of this Government, as far as the Iſland of Sardinia, two Tunefine Shebecks, which, a few Weeks ago, took Shelter at Leghorne, being purſued by the Pope's two Frigates and the Neapolitan Shebecks. On the 26th three French Prizes, with valuable Cargoes from Alexandria, St. John d'Acric, &c. for Marſeilles, were ſent into Leghorne by the Volunteer Privateer, Capt. Kent. A few Days before, three other French Prizes, laden with Goods from the Levant, were ſent to Leghorne by His Britannick Maſteſty's Ships the Rainbow and Deal Caſtle, and Enterprize Privateer, ſo that, within theſe few Weeks paſt, about ten French Prizes have been ſent into Leghorne.

*Florence, June 10.* Laſt Week anchored at Leghorne from a Cruize, His Britannick Maſteſty's Ship the Ambuſcade, Capt. Gwynn, with a French Snow that he had taken a few Days before off Marſeilles.

*Turin, June 7.* Madame Louiſe appeared in publick on Monday for the firſt Time ſince her Royal Highneſs's Illneſs.
