

*Excise Office, London, June 28, 1758.*

**W**HEREAS by an Act made last Session of Parliament, the Duty of Six-pence per Ounce upon wrought Plate, granted by an Act made in the sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intitled, 'An Act for laying a Duty upon wrought Plate, &c.' did, after the 1st Day of June 1758, cease and determine; and whereas by the said Act of last Session of Parliament it is enacted, that in lieu thereof there shall, from and after the 5th Day of July 1758, be paid a Duty of Forty Shillings for every Licence to be taken out by each Person trading in, selling or vending Gold or Silver Plate; and that no Person shall presume to trade in, vend or sell any Gold or Silver Plate, without first taking out a Licence for that Purpose, and paying down forty Shillings for the same, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, if such Licence be taken out within the Limits or Jurisdiction of the said Chief Office; but if it be taken out without the Limits aforesaid, that then such Duty shall be paid at the Office of Excise next adjoining to the Place where the Person taken it out shall reside and inhabit; and thereby every Person who shall take out such Licence, is required to take out a fresh Licence ten Days at least before the Expiration of twelve Calendar Months after the taking out the first Licence, before he presumes to trade in, vend, or sell any Gold or Silver Plate; and in the same Manner to renew such Licence from Year to Year, paying down the like Sum of Forty Shillings for each new Licence at the Places and Times before mentioned, under the Penalty of forfeiting Twenty Pounds for each Offence. And it is further enacted, that all Persons using the Trade of selling or vending Gold or Silver Plate, or any Goods or Wares composed of Gold or Silver, or any Goods or Wares in which any Gold or Silver is or shall be manufactured; and also all Persons employed to sell any Gold or Silver Plate, or any such Goods or Wares aforesaid, at any Auction or publick Sale, or by Commission, shall respectively be deemed Traders in, Sellers or Venders of Gold and Silver Plate, within the Intent and Meaning of this Act, and shall take out a Licence for the same; provided that this Act shall not extend to subject Persons to any Penalty for or in respect of his, her, or their trading in, vending or selling, Gold or Silver Lace, or Gold or Silver Wire, Thread, or Fringe, without taking out such Licence as aforesaid.

The Commissioners of Excise do hereby give Notice, that on the 30th of this Instant June, and on every Day afterwards (Sundays and Holidays excepted) constant Attendance will be given at the Excise-Office in the Old Jewry, from Eight o'Clock in the Morning till Two in the Afternoon, for receiving such Duties, and granting such Licences, in Pursuance of the said Act, from and to all Persons who are required by the said Act to take out the said Licences, residing or inhabiting within the Bills of Mortality, or the Parish of St. Mary le Bonne, being the Limits of the said Chief Office of Excise. And also that on the 5th Day of July ensuing, the Date hereof, and every Day afterwards (Sundays excepted) constant Attendance will be given at the several Offices of Excise in England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, for receiving such Duties, and granting such Licences, from and to all Persons not residing or inhabiting within the said Limits of the said Chief Office.

And the Commissioners of Excise do hereby further give Notice, that Attendance will be given the 5th Day of July next, and for thirty Days afterwards, (Sundays and Holidays excepted) at the Excise-Office in the Old Jewry, from Eight o'Clock in the Morning till Two in the Afternoon, for receiving such fresh Notices, Entries and Duties, as are required by the Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, to be made and paid within thirty Days after the 5th Day of July next, for Silver Plate chargeable on Persons, and Bodies Politick or Corporate, owing, using, having or keeping the same, and inhabiting or being situate within the aforesaid Limits of the Chief Office of Excise; and that the like Attendance will also be given at the several Offices of Excise in England, Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, for receiving the like Notices, Entries, and Duties, from the several Persons, Bodies Politick or

Corporate, not inhabiting or being situate within the said Limits of the said Chief Office of Excise, and who are required by the said last-mentioned Act to give, make, and pay the same.

And the said Commissioners do hereby remind all Persons, and Bodies Politick or Corporate, that the Time for making fresh Entries for such Plate, and paying the Duties for the subsequent Year, will commence on the 5th Day of July next, when, or within thirty Days after, all Persons, Bodies Politick and Corporate, are obliged, by the said last-mentioned Act, under the Penalties therein set forth, to make such fresh Entries, and pay such respective Duties chargeable by the said Act on the Silver Plate which they shall then respectively own, use, have, or keep; the said Duties NOT BEING REPEALED by the said Act of the last Session of Parliament.
