Cologne, June 26. ESTERDAY Morning His Majefty's Army took Poffeffion of Nuys, after the French had quitted it; but they first fold, gave away, or destroyed, at Magazine. They had their Head their great Magazine. They had their Head Quarters Yefterday at Wohringen ; and they were to have been here To-day; but fome Al-teration has been made fince. They pretend they will fland their Ground.

Head Quarters at Osterad, June 27.

The 24th Instant, the Day after the Battle of Crevelt, Major General Wangenheim, with four Battalions and four Squadrons, marched and incamped at Offerad, to fuffain the Light Troops that were in Pursuit of the French. The 25th Te Deum was fung in our Camp, with a Feu de Joye, and a general Discharge of all our Artillery. The 26th Major General Wangenheim, with his Corps, advanced to Nuys; and this Day the Army marched in four Columns, and incamped in this Neighbourhood, leaving a Camp at Crevelt, confifting of fix Battalions and ten Squadrons, under the Command of the Hereditary Prince, and the Prince of Holftein.

The Enemy are retreated towards Cologne; and by our Accounts Yesterday, their Head Quarters were already at Wering: They have abandoned at Nuys a Magazine of Flour, and another of Oats, which, it is believed, they would have totally defroyed, if our Light Troops would have given them Time; but there is a great Quantity ftill remaining, that is fit for Service, belides a large Magazine of Oats.

His Serene Highness has made a Present to the Haneverian Artillery, of a Pair of Kettle Drums we took from the Enemy on the 23d, for their gallant Behaviour on that Day; and, to do them Juffice, no Artillery was ever better ferved, or did more Execution.

Our advanced Guards fend in Prifoners every Hour, and a great many French wounded Officers and Soldiers, who could not keep up with the Army, are fallen into our Hands.

Count Gifors, the only Son of Marshal Belleiste, died Yesterday at Nuys, of a Wound he received from a Musquet Ball in the late Engagement.

June 28. Yefferday the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick marched towards Ruremonde; as did the Prince of Holftein to Gladbeck. Duffeldorff has been fummoned : Every Thing is ready to bombard the Town, if the Com-

manding Officer refules to furrender it. P.S. The Bombardment of Duffeldorff is actually begun.

Hague, June 30. General Yorke, His Bri-tannick Majefty's Minister Plenipotentiary, arrived here this Morning from Berlin.
