Cologne, June 26.

YESTER-DAY Morning His Majesty's Army took Possession of Nuys, after the French had quitted it; but they first fold, gave away, or destroyed their great Magazine. They had their Head Quarters Yesterday at Wohringen; and they were to have been here To-day; but some Alteration has been made since. They pretend they will stand their Ground.

Head Quarters at Osterad, June 27.

The 24th Instant, the Day after the Battle of Crevelt, Major General Wangenheim, with four Battalions and four Squadrons, marched and incamped at Osterad, to sustain the Light Troops that were in Pursuit of the French. The 25th Te Deum was sung in our Camp, with a *Feu de Joye*, and a general Discharge of all our Artillery. The 26th Major General Wangenheim, with his Corps, advanced to Nuys; and this Day the Army marched in four Columns, and incamped in this Neighbourhood, leaving a Camp at Crevelt, consisting of six Battalions and ten Squadrons, under the Command of the Hereditary Prince, and the Prince of Holstein.

The Enemy are retreated towards Cologne; and by our Accounts Yesterday, their Head Quarters were already at Wering: They have abandoned at Nuys a Magazine of Flour, and another of Oats, which, it is believed, they would have totally destroyed, if our Light Troops would have given them Time; but there is a great Quantity still remaining, that is fit for Service, besides a large Magazine of Oats.

His Serene Highness has made a Present to the Hanoverian Artillery, of a Pair of Kettle Drums we took from the Enemy on the 23d, for their gallant Behaviour on that Day; and, to do them Justice, no Artillery was ever better served, or did more Execution.

Our advanced Guards send in Prisoners every Hour, and a great many French wounded Officers and Soldiers, who could not keep up with the Army, are fallen into our Hands.

Count Gisors, the only Son of Marshal Belleisle, died Yesterday at Nuys, of a Wound he received from a Musquet Ball in the late Engagement.

June 28. Yesterday the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick marched towards Ruremonde; as did the Prince of Holstein to Gladbeck. Duffeldorff has been summoned: Every Thing is ready to bombard the Town, if the Commanding Officer refuses to surrender it.

P. S. The Bombardment of Duffeldorff is actually begun.

Hague, June 30. General Yorke, His Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, arrived here this Morning from Berlin.

And Whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have received Information, That a Loan of Money for that Purpose is at this Time negotiating in this Kingdom; Their Lordships do hereby promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person, by whose Discovery any Subject of His Majesty, or any Person residing within this Realm, shall be convicted of lending or advancing directly or indirectly, or of causing or procuring to be so lent or advanced, or of subscribing for, or contributing to, or of soliciting or contracting for or remitting, either in Coin or Bullion, or by Bill or Bills of Exchange, or by any other Means whatsoever, any Sum or Sums of Money, to or for the Use or Purpose aforesaid. The said Reward to be paid immediately on the Conviction of every such Offender, by the Solicitor of the Treasury; without Deduction, their Lordships having given Directions for the immediate Prosecution of such Offenders.

Whereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, it is enacted, That from and after the 5th Day of July, One thousand seven hundred and fifty eight, no Person whatsoever, unless he be authorized and enabled by having taken out such Licence as by the said Act is prescribed, shall sell or utter by any Retail Measure, or in Bottles, in any Quantity less than twenty five Gallons, any Kind of Liquor made in Great Britain, by Infusion, Fermentation, or otherwise, from Foreign Fruit, or Sugar, or from British Fruit, or Sugar, or from Fruit or Sugar mixed with any other Ingredients commonly called Sweets, or made Wine; or any Kind of Liquor made in Great Britain, and known by the Name of Sweets or made Wines, of whatsoever Materials, or in whatsoever Manner the same may be made, upon Pain to forfeit for every such Offence One Hundred Pounds; Therefore Notice is hereby given to all Persons who sell Sweets, or made Wines, by Retail, forthwith to take out Licences at the said Office for the selling thereof, or they will be prosecuted for the said Penalty of One Hundred Pounds: And all Persons applying for such Licences who sell Ale and Spirituous Liquors, are required to bring their Ale and Spirituous Liquor Licences with them.

WHEREAS by an Act made last Session of Parliament, the Duty of Six-pence per Ounce upon wrought Plate, granted by an Act made in the sixth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, intitled, 'An Act for laying a Duty upon wrought Plate, &c.' did, after the 1st Day of June 1758, cease and determine; and whereas by the said Act of last Session of Parliament it is enacted, that in lieu thereof there shall, from and after the 5th Day of July 1758, be paid a Duty of Forty Shillings for every Licence to be taken out by each Person trading in, selling or vending Gold or Silver Plate; and that no Person shall presume to trade in, vend or sell any Gold or Silver Plate, without first taking out a Licence for that Purpose, and paying down forty Shillings for the same, at the Chief Office of Excise in London, if such Licence be taken out within the Limits or Jurisdiction of the said Chief Office; but if it be taken out without the Limits aforesaid, that then such Duty shall be paid at the Office of Excise next adjoining to the Place where the Person taken it out shall reside and inhabit; and thereby every Person who shall take out such Licence, is required to take out a fresh Licence ten Days at least before the Expiration of twelve Calendar Months after the taking out the first Licence, before he presumes to trade in, vend, or sell any Gold or Silver Plate; and in the same Manner to renew such Licence from Year to Year, paying down the like Sum of Forty Shillings for each new Licence at the Places and Times before mentioned, under the Penalty of forfeiting Twenty Pounds for each Offence. And it is further enacted, that all Persons using the Trade of selling or vending Gold or Silver Plate, or any Goods or Wares composed of Gold or Silver, or any Goods or Wares in which any Gold

or Silver is or shall be manufactured; and also all Persons employed to sell any Gold or Silver Plate, or any such Goods or Wares aforesaid, at any Auction or publick Sale, or by Commission, shall respectively be deemed Traders in, Sellers or Venders of Gold and Silver Plate, within the Intent and Meaning of this Act, and shall take out a Licence for the same; provided that this Act shall not extend to subject Persons to any Penalty for or in respect of his, her, or their trading in, vending or selling, Gold or Silver Lace, or Gold or Silver Wire, Thread, or Fringe, without taking out such Licence as aforesaid.
