

Name of Sweets or made Wines, of whatsoever Materials, or in whatsoever Manner the same may be made, upon Pain to forfeit for every such Offence One Hundred Pounds; Therefore Notice is hereby given to all Persons who sell Sweets, or made Wines, by Retail, forthwith to take out Licences at the said Office for the selling thereof, or they will be prosecuted for the said Penalty of One Hundred Pounds: And all Persons applying for such Licences who sell Ale and Spirituous Liquors, are required to bring their Ale and Spirituous Liquor Licences with them.
